School Board Sets Date for Another Package Building Plan Referendum

BOND ISSUE TO BE VOTED ON FOR THIRD TIME DEC. 13

The Board of Education, in special session Monday night, chose Dec. 13 as the date of the next school bond referendum and on a vote of 4 to 2, passed a resolution to borrow an amount not to exceed \$2,660,000 for a package building plan.

The "no" votes were cast by Thomas Gundrum and Richard Theusch. Gerald Secor was unable to attend but in a letter to the board said he would be in favor of the same package that was voted down Sept. 13.

Gundrum said he is in favor of taking one school project at a time. For now, he would be in favor of building only in Kewaskum, meanwhile taking a look at some other type of attendance plan that would make best use of facilities.

Theusch suggested the building project be postponed until spring and "that we contact the architects to see if we can't get the per square foot cost down." He added "it would be better to let this cool off—people are sick of having a referendum jammed down their throats; you are not gaining any votes that way."

Board members were given a report on the results of a questionnaire sent to electors in which they asked to state their preference on holding another referendum. Of the 733 who responded, 386 indicated "yes" and 347 said "no."

Of those who said "yes," 310 favored a package plan; 29 favored a plan excluding an addition at Wayne School and 46 favored a plan minus an addition at the Farmington School.

All but seven responses had comments. The board felt some showed the elector was uninformed or misinformed and so it was decided to hold one informational meeting at each school sometime before the Dec. 13 voting. When electors go to the polls, they will vote in the school in the area in which they live, rather than in Kewaskum as was done last time.

Gundrum asked, "Are we going to have to go on split-shift anyway?" Supt. Floyd Brenholt said he didn't know, that he would have to talk with the principals. Gundrum asked, "Why not try split-shift and let the people see how they like it? If they find the bad features aren't that great, maybe they will just as soon have it."

Brenholt reported he visited Winneconne where split-shift is being used and he was told the biggest disadvantage is in running the junior high until late afternoon. Students are too tired then to learn as they should.

Theusch commented on the increase in taxes that will result from the proposed building project and the problem some will have paying them. Allen Tessar then told Theusch, "You accepted a position on the school board to do what is best for the children. I am not in favor of higher taxes but I am in favor of education. It's still up to the people to de-

cide." Brenholt commented that "school board members occupy the hot seat when actually the fault lies with the State Legislature." He said he believes that taxes should be based upon ability to pay and that the income tax is the only proper way. "Put the pressure on Madison," he said. "I don't feel the local community should make kids suffer because Madison isn't doing things right."

He added that he feels this school district has the financial ability to do better and "we owe the voters another opportunity to vote."

Need Volunteer Workers Now for Hospital Drive

The General Teams Division of the St. Joseph's Community Hospital Expansion and Development Campaign has issued an urgent appeal for volunteer workers.

The General Teams Division is expected to begin making its contacts in early November but volunteers are asked to offer their services now since the division is presently organizing its workers.

"Booby" and Marion Bohn have operated the store for the past ten years and want to take this opportunity to thank the public for their patronage and support. They also ask the public to support the new owners as well.

The merchandise was moved over the past weekend and the Coulters are now open for business as of Monday, Nov. 1. A grand opening will be held at a later date.

Adult Recreation Program to Begin At School Nov. 10

The Kewaskum Community Schools will again sponsor an adult recreation program beginning Nov. 10 for all residents of the Kewaskum school district which includes Beechwood, Farmington and Wayne, at the Kewaskum Elementary School gymnasium. Since it is a "fun" program, adults should not hesitate to take part.

The program will be free of charge and will be open to any and only adult residents of the Kewaskum school district, 18 years of age or older, who are no longer attending high school. High school students and/or other children will not be allowed. This is an "adult" program for the district. Adults will have an opportunity to get some recreational physical exercise through basketball, volleyball, etc. The program depends on those who participate.

Beginning on Nov. 10 and 11, Wednesdays from 8:00 - 10:00 p.m. will be for men and 8:00 - 10:00 p.m. on Thursdays for women. There will be no program operating during vacation periods or on days when the school is closed due to custodial work schedule conflicts. Locker room and shower-room facilities will be available. Participants will be responsible for their own towel, soap, etc.

It is hoped that the adults of the district will avail themselves of the program during the winter months ahead when other recreational activities are curtailed.

Youth Wounded in Hunting Accident

A youth identified as Roger Ager, 17, of Milwaukee was accidentally shot by a companion while squirrel hunting on the west side of Mauthe Lake northeast of Kewaskum last Thursday. He was treated at St. Joseph's Community Hospital in West Bend and then released.

Village Hires Employee Under EEA Program

LIQUOR STORE LICENSE APPROVED FOR KELLER

The Village Board voted to hire a general employe under a two-year program of the Emergency Employment Act when it met in regular session Monday night.

John Reysen, who resides in the village, was chosen from two applications and he was to begin work immediately. Under the program, the village will be reimbursed by the federal government for salary up to \$7,100 per year.

Board members discussed the various aspects of hiring before making a decision. One said he was not in favor of hiring someone "just because someone is paying us to." Another felt "we will have created a need for another man if we decide to go along with it."

Asked if he could use another man, Supt. of Public Works Armin Oppermann said there is plenty of work and possibly a man would be needed by next spring anyway. All sewers need rodding and hiring of one more person would relieve a key man from general labor for more specialized work elsewhere.

A liquor store license was approved for Sylvester Keller, after being tabled from last week's agenda. The bid of Central Engineering, Milwaukee, for a snow plow at a cost of \$2,834.40 installed, was accepted. The item will be included in the 1972 budget and payment will be deferred until Jan. 15.

Police Chief Donald Hlavaty was present to ask the board's decision on his request for another full-time man. He was promised an answer after the police protection committee confers.

It was decided to ask for quotations and set up specifications for a new front end loader after Oppermann reported an estimate showed it would cost \$5,500 to overhaul the present one. He was authorized to sell some obsolete village equipment.

The board approved buying liability insurance for all of the Kewaskum auxiliary police and approved five building permits for Jos. Schneider of Random Lake and two for Radke Homes, Milwaukee.

Fire Dept. Sponsors Campaign Here for Muscular Dystrophy

The Kewaskum Fire Department has accepted the sponsorship of the 1971 Canister Campaign for Muscular Dystrophy in Kewaskum, it was announced today by Gene Subotnik, president of the Milwaukee Area Chapter, Muscular Dystrophy Associations of America, Inc.

Fire Chief Armin Oppermann will act as chairman and he will be assisted by the members of his department in placing the familiar Jerry Lewis hourglass canisters in business places. This will be the fourth year the fire department has chosen muscular dystrophy as their service project.

Since 1954 helping in the fight against muscular dystrophy has been one of the fire fighters' favorite projects. Fire fighters have helped raise funds, served as chapter officers and helped provide recreation for muscular dystrophy patients on the national, state and local levels.

Muscular dystrophy is a chronic disease which gradually destroys the voluntary muscles of the body. It is found in all parts of the world. Approximately two-thirds of the known victims are children. The exact cause of the disease is not yet known. There is no cure.

Muscular Dystrophy Associations of America, Inc., a non-profit organization, conducts its annual campaign to raise funds for services to local patients suffering with muscular dystrophy and allied neuromuscular diseases, as well as for its extensive research

program.

Kewaskum is in the Milwaukee Area Chapter which has six counties to serve. The chapter is one of over 300 in the United States that provide wheelchairs, braces, other orthopedic appliances, physical therapy and educational and recreational programs for MD patients.

Over 30 million dollars have been spent for research since the association was formed in 1950. Last year 105 research projects were conducted in 23 states and 12 foreign countries. Research scientists at Marquette University and University of Wisconsin - Madison have received \$367,505 of this.

In the past 14 years the Milwaukee Area Chapter has spent \$276,000 to help local MD patients with orthopedic equipment, free clinic examinations and consultations, physical therapy and recreation, especially summer camp.

For the first time this past summer patients were able to attend a summer camp designed around their specific needs and limitations. Milwaukee area high school students volunteered as high schoolers to enable MD patients to go swimming, horseback riding, canoeing and any outdoor activity possible at summer camp.

The annual Washington County Conservation speaking contest was held on Wednesday evening, Oct. 27, at the courthouse annex, West Bend.

"Pollution Starts at Home" was the winning speech given by Sharon Kurer, West Bend, in the elementary division; Alex Flynn, R 1 Random Lake, won the junior high contest with his speech entitled "Misuse of our Oceans" and the senior high winner was Judy Kamps, R. 4, West Bend, with "The Individual in Ecology." Close seconds were speeches given by John Dettman, Boltonville; Grace Flynn, Random Lake, and Dean Schmidt, Kewaskum. The winners went to Elkhorn on Nov. 4 for a ten county area wide contest.

The event is sponsored annually by the Washington County Soil and Water Conservation District. This year the newly formed Junior Board of Supervisors organized the event led by Advisors Tim Meyer, horticulture, conservation instructor at West Bend West High School and Roy Esser, Vo-Ag instructor at Kewaskum High. Meyer emphasized that win or lose, the fact that all of the speakers are aware of the existing environmental problems and have definite ideas on the solutions of them, is the important thing. And that they take time to speak out.

High school students will know more about soils in Washington County. "Soil Survey Reports" are being used as text books in Washington county schools. Tim Meyer of West Bend, Earl Vivian of Slinger and Roy Esser of Kewaskum have received sufficient copies for class room use.

This report will enable high school students to learn about soil types, their management and use. The report classifies all soils according to possibilities and limitations for many uses.

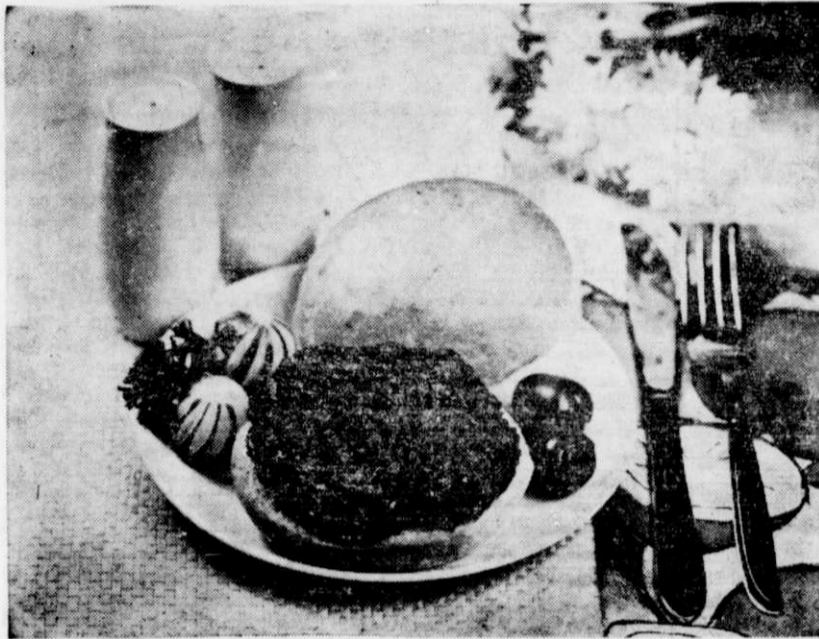

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Six Interceptions Give Mayville Title and 14-0 Win Over Indians

FRUSTRATING NIGHT FOR KEWASKUM TEAM

Six interceptions and some bad breaks cost Kewaskum the Scenic Moraine championship and allowed Mayville to retain their crown as they defeated the Indians in the big title game here Friday night, 14-0. Probably the largest crowd ever to see a game here witnessed this crucial battle and included many, many fans from Mayville as well as from West Bend and other Scenic schools.

After holding first place throughout the campaign, a whole season's efforts went right out the window for the Indians with the Mayville loss. And the Cardinals won the title by only a slim, half-game margin. They wound up with 5 wins, 1 loss and 1 tie (5½ - 1½), while Kewaskum finished with 5 wins and 2 losses to tie for second with Germantown.

The week before everything went right in the Indians' 27-0 victory over Pewaukee but against Mayville it was just the opposite. And to think that Pewaukee, the team Kewaskum beat so decisively, tied Mayville. Hard to believe the Indians should lose to them but as they say, a football takes some strange bounces. Mayville had to win its last two games to repeat as champion and did just that, over the two other top teams, Kewaskum and Germantown.

It was the Indians' second straight runner-up finish. Last year they were 6-1, their only loss coming at Mayville. Kewaskum still hasn't scored a point against the Cardinals, although they ran up a total of 120 during the season, compared to their opponents' 55. It was the Indians' only shutout of the year and the first time Mayville had shut out an opponent.

It was a frustrating night indeed for Kewaskum, their worst of the season, and came when it counted the most. On the other hand it was Mayville's finest performance. Taking nothing away from Mayville, they came to play, pilfered passes, made the big plays, and performed almost flawlessly on defense.

This is the kind of night it was. Not only did Kewaskum have six passes intercepted. They lost the ball on a fumble, had a punt blocked and on fourth down had a long punt which would have put Mayville deep in its own terri-

tory, called back when the officials ruled the kicker's knee touched the ground trying to pick up a low pass from center. The ball was turned over to Mayville on about Kewaskum's 16 yard line and they quickly turned it into a touchdown. Three times the Indians were inside Mayville's 10 yard line and each time an intercepted pass prevented them from scoring. And a sure touchdown pass was dropped right at the goal line before halftime.

Indian quarterback Dale Luedtke had plenty of time on most of his passes. On most of them he waited a little too long. He seemed to be passing the ball farther and higher than usual and as he lofted them they were up for grabs by the alert Cardinal defenders. It was surprising Kewaskum kept passing, even on some short yardage plays, and with double or even triple coverage on the receivers. It wasn't that their rushing game was bottled up. They outrushed Mayville, 107 yards to 103, and made 7 first downs rushing to the Cardinals' 5. In fact the statistics belonged to the Indians but games are won on points. Kewaskum had 13 first downs to Mayville's 10, they were well ahead in total yards, 247 to 177, yards rushing 107 to 103, yards passing 140 to 74—but those interceptions.

Kewaskum had any number of scoring opportunities. In the first quarter they worked the ball down to Mayville's 25 yard line but with 4th down and only about a half yard to go they chose to pass and failed and were forced to turn over the ball. Before the half Luedtke heaved a long pass to Tom Theusch at the goal line. He was in the clear for a sure score but couldn't hang onto the ball. Three

times Kewaskum was inside Mayville's 10 yard stripe but interceptions stopped them. Whenever Kewaskum moved down the field, Mayville picked off one of their passes.

On the other hand both of Mayville's scores came on breaks in the second quarter. The first break came when the referee ruled that Glen Eichstedt touched his knee to the ground trying to field that low snap from center. He got off his longest punt of the night on the play, a boomer deep into Cardinal territory but the play was declared dead on Kewaskum's 16 yard line, where Mayville took over. The Cardinals scored on Mark Eckersdorfer's short plunge. Soon after that an interception gave Mayville the ball on the Kewaskum 49. They marched to the one yard line and Eckersdorfer again carried it over after the Indians held on two short plunges. Both extra points were kicked by Jeff Hufflein. Mayville missed on two field goal attempts.

Dale Toellner collected 3 interceptions for Mayville, one an acrobatic one, Art Okon two and end Mike Liegl one. Liegl pilfered his in the end zone on the final minute of play. The height of frustration for Kewaskum came in the final few minutes when it swept inside Mayville's 10 yard line twice only to have interceptions end the threat each time. Even though it was late in the game the Indians at last had a golden opportunity to at least score. Behind 14-0, Kewaskum never gave up but fought back and moved the ball well up to the point where the pass-pilfering Cardinals committed their larceny.

The Kewaskum defense played another good game with Gary Marx and Larry Williams standing out with numerous tackles and assists. Both teams hit hard. As Coach Joe Harlow said, "it was the passes they caught—ours and their own. They caught everything by reception and interception that didn't hit the ground." Mayville's defense made things happen—most of it bad for Kewaskum.

Soph Mark Mayer led Mayville with 49 yards in 14 carries. Terry Backhaus paced the Indians with 47 yards in 11 carries. Jim Gaffke was held to 39 yards in 11 carries.

In other Scenic games Hartland edged Kettle Moraine 27-20, Germantown blanked Slinger 17-0, and Pewaukee shaded Grafton 8-7.
