### Hospital Drive Nearing \$1.5 Million Mark

The St. Joseph's Community Hospital, West Bend, Expansion and Development Campaign is nearing the \$1.5 million mark, according to an announcement made this week by Bernard C. Ziegler, general campaign chairman.

Pledges to date total \$1,478,000, or 61.6% of the announced goal of \$2.4 million to be raised by public subscription.

At the drive's kick-off dinner held on Oct. 6, it was announced that advance gifts totaling \$1,234,000 had already been pledged. This means that an additional \$244,000 has been raised during the drive's initial stages. The campaign is scheduled to run until early December.

Ziegler emphasized that, though he is pleased with the progress of the drive to date, the biggest part of the job is yet to come.

"The bulk of the amount raised so far has come from key people and organizations in the community," he said. "The remainder must now come almost exclusively from the general public. Our special gifts division, for example, is just beginning to make its contacts while the important employees' division is still in the final organizational training stages and has not yet begun its effort."

"The days ahead will, therefore, be crucial to the success of the hospital drive," Ziegler said. "Given a total, dedicated community-wide effort, however, I am confident we will reach our goal."

The Wimmer Lumber Co. sawmill and two tool sheds on State Hwy. 28 and Mill Road about one mile east of Kewaskum were destroyed in an early morning fire Tuesday. Destroyed with the 34 by 70 foot one story frame sawmill were its contents.

The mill is owned by John Wimmer of Milwaukee and Emil Shulka, R. 2, Kewaskum, with Shulka in charge of operations. The blaze was discovered by Vern Kapec, a caretaker, who resides in a trailer on the property, about 5 a. m. Kapec saw flames coming from the mill and immediately called the Kewaskum fire department.

Shulka reported that the fire destroyed the sawmill and all equipment including motors, trimmers, edgers, conveyors, saws, tools, other machinery and supplies, and some sawed lumber. He said doors on the mill, which can be closed for protection against the elements, had just been replaced for the winter season. New belting and new saws had also been installed.

One of the two tool sheds near the mill was demolished while the other was badly damaged. Shulka said the fire closed down operations at the plant but that wood logging crews are continuing their work in bringing in logs already cut. The plant employs nine men.

Both Shulka and Fire Chief Armin Oppermann said the cause of the fire was not determined, but it apparently broke out in the sawmill itself. Firemen were called at 5:15 a. m. and Oppermann said the building was 75 per cent destroyed when they arrived. Twenty-two firemen responded to the alarm and most remained more than 2½ hours with other men on stand-by duty until 8:30 a. m.

Although Shulka said he could not place an estimate on the loss, he believed it would cost about \$100,000 to replace the building and equipment. He said he did not know immediately what steps would be taken for the future but was hopeful that plans can be made to rebuild and obtain new or used equipment to resume work.

The fire chief reported that the blaze may possibly have started from a heating block unit in the mill or an electrical short. The firm saws logs into rough lumber.

**NOTICE OF PUBLIC HEARINGS IN THE MATTER OF THE LOCATION OF THE NATIONAL SYSTEM OF INTERSTATE AND DEFENSE HIGHWAYS AND THE STATE TRUNK HIGHWAY SYSTEM BETWEEN THE CITY OF MILWAUKEE AND THE CITY OF GREEN BAY, BROWN, OUTAGAMIE, CALUMET, MANITOWOC, FOND DU LAC, SHEBOYGAN, WASHINGTON AND OZAUKEE COUNTIES**

Notice is hereby given to the localities concerned and to all interested persons that the Wisconsin Department of Transportation, Division of Highways, through its Highway Commission, will hold public hearings in the Armory Building, 930 North 18th Street, Manitowoc, Wisconsin 54220, at 10:00 o'clock in the forenoon on Wednesday, December 15, 1971, and at the Kohler Memorial Theater, 230 School Street, Kohler, Wisconsin 53044, at 10:00 o'clock in the forenoon on Thursday, December 16, 1971, at which time all persons will be given opportunity to be heard concerning their views on the Division of Highway's proposal, under the authority of Section 84.29, Wisconsin Statutes, to establish and construct a state trunk highway as a route of the National System of Interstate and Defense Highways, hereinafter referred to as the Interstate System. These hearings relate to establishing such routing in Brown, Outagamie, Calumet, Manitowoc, Fond du Lac, Sheboygan, Washington and Ozaukee Counties.

The portion of the Interstate System to be established through these hearings is part of the Milwaukee-Green Bay route authorized by the Congress of the United States and assigned to the United States Department of Transportation, Federal Highway Administration, on December 13, 1968. This section of the Milwaukee-Green Bay route begins about one mile northeast of the Village of Saukville, in Ozaukee County, and continues northerly in a broad corridor to near the south limits of the City of Green Bay, on the east side of the Fox River, in Brown County. The entire section will be discussed and all interested persons will have opportunity to appear

and be heard on the entire proposed route at either of the hearing locations mentioned above.

On December 1 and 2, 1970, the Highway Commission held public hearings in Plymouth and Reedsville as part of its consideration of several alternate routes proposed by its staff. These proposed corridors were generally on a direct line between the Village of Saukville in Ozaukee County and the Town of Bellevue in Brown County.

The Highway Commission now deems that the public interests would be best served by holding public hearings to consider additional proposed corridors lying generally along the Lake Michigan shoreline in the vicinity of present Highway 141.

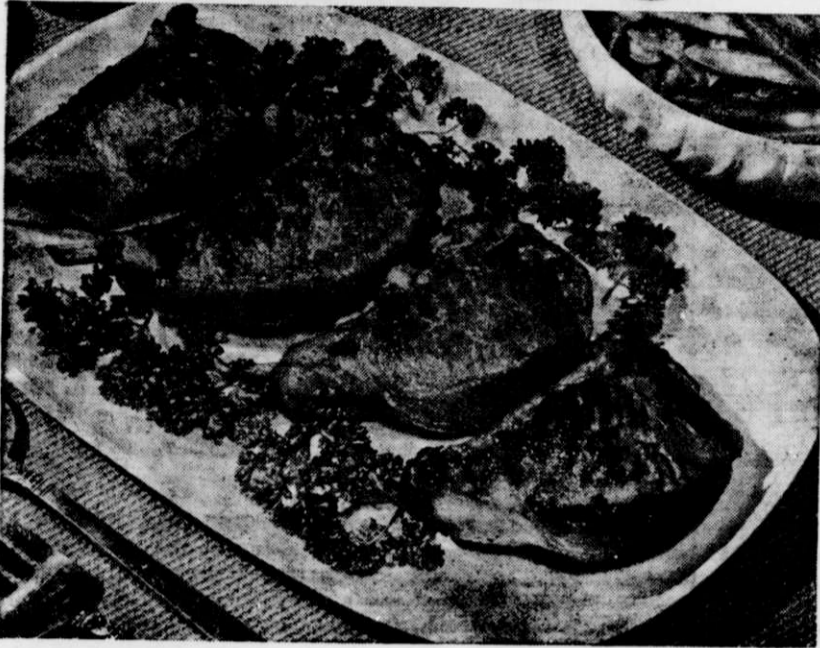

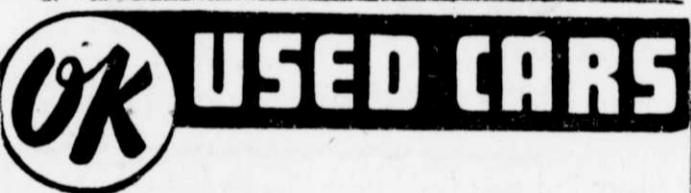

## Gaffke, Rodenkirch, Schmidt Named To Scenic All-Conference Team

**GAFFKE PICKED ON BOTH OFFENSE AND DEFENSE; TOP CONFERENCE RUSHER**

Scenic Moraine Conference coaches met at Pewaukee to select an all-conference team this week. Competition for places on the all-star squad was very keen.

Kewaskum's Jim Gaffke, only a junior, was selected on both the offensive and defensive squad. He was named as a back on offense and cornerback on defense. Gaffke also placed third in the conference in individual scoring with 36 points. Other Kewaskum all-conference selections were Kim Rodenkirch, who was named as an offensive tackle and was a unanimous choice for the second year in a row, and Jim Schmidt as a defensive lineman. Both are seniors. Rodenkirch, incidentally, is also the heaviest member named to the squad at 230 pounds.

Along with Gaffke, three other players were picked on both the offensive and defensive squad. They are Mark Hauser, a 3 year starter for Slinger, who repeated as a running back and safety; Frank Blau of Germantown, who was named for the second year as a safety and was the choice as a first team quarterback; and Kim Carter of Kettle Moraine, who made both teams as a guard on offense and interior lineman on defense. All are seniors but Gaffke.

Blau, Germantown quarterback, for the past three years, barely nosed out Kettle Moraine's fine quarterback, Jay Seeboth. These two tied for top scoring honors with 60 points apiece, with Blau's scoring including 3 field goals, 6 touchdowns and 15 points after touchdowns. Seeboth's 60 points all were scored on 10 touchdowns. Third high scorer Gaffke scored 36 on 6 TD's. Noll of Kettle Moraine, Hauser of Slinger and Stieve of Mayville tied for 4th place with 26 points each, all on 4 TD's and 2 PAT's.

Gaffke, who will be back to worry opposing Scenic coaches next year, led the conference in rushing with 515 yards in 103 carries for a 5.0 average. Seeboth was second in rushing and Blau third. Gaffke was also a very fine kick-off return player. He carried one kick back all the way against Kettle Moraine 82 yards for a TD. On defense he had 4 interceptions, broke up 4 passes, recovered 2 fumbles and forced 2 or 3 more with hard tackling. Gaffke's being top rusher makes it 3 years in succession that Kewaskum has had the top rusher in the league. Although not big, Coach Joe Harlow calls Gaffke "the complete football player" and is glad he has another year to go.

In the team department, Germantown and Kewaskum dominated the selections. Germantown had 5 boys named to 6 positions and Kewaskum had 3 players selected to 4 positions. Besides Roden-

kirch, the only other unanimous choice of the coaches was end Tim Cummens of Kettle Moaine. Rodenkirch was a unanimous choice at a position where there was many fine tackles, all over 6'1" and all over 200 lbs. Rodenkirch, a 3 year starter for the Indians, was tabbed as one of the best offensive linemen in this area by the coaches and a top college prospect. All 3 years that Kim has been a starter at tackle for the Indians they led the conference in rushing and total offense.

Schmidt, Kewaskum's other selection, was an honorable mention choice last year. He was a stalwart in the Indians' defensive line, which yielded only 53 yards.

Champion Mayville placed only 3 on the first team—Jeff Stieve at defensive end, Todd Zangl at linebacker and Dale Toellner as running back. Stieve and Zangl were repeaters.

Kewaskum also had 3 players who received honorable mention. On defense Mitch Ogi and Gary Marx received votes, as did Harry Ramthun as an offensive guard.

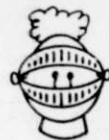

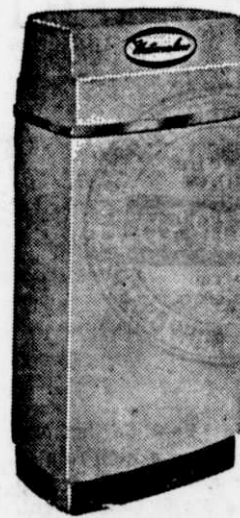
