## Board Sets Informational Meetings Prior to School Bond Referendum

POLICY ON EARLY GRADUATION APPROVED

Plans for informational meetings and publicity prior to the Dec. 13 school bond referendum were set by the Board of Education of Kewaskum Community Schools district Monday night. Electors will vote Dec. 13 on a \$2,660,000 bond issue for building expansions.

Public informational meetings are scheduled at the following schools: Wayne, Dec. 1; Kewaskum High School, Dec. 2; Farmington, Dec. 6 and Beechwood, Dec. 7. All meetings are at 8 p. m.

For those reluctant to personally ask a question, there will be opportunity for written questions. A sequence of five informational flyers will be mailed to electors between Nov. 19 and Dec. 8.

"We will also hold meetings on the proposed building program with all high school students," Supt. Floyd Brenholt said, adding "there are varying ideas on it floating around."

Methods of figuring salaries after the Nov. 13 lifting of the wage-price freeze were discussed. Brenholt reported, "in talking with the State Department of Public Instruction, we have the go-ahead to use what ever formula benefits teachers the most."

On that basis, the board approved a motion which states: "Following the termination of Phase I of the wage-price freeze, employe salaries for the remainder of the 1971-72 pay periods be calculated in the legal manner which will assure the employe the highest percentage possible of their 1971-72 contracted salary."

On a second reading, a policy on early graduation from high school was approved. The policy provides that a student will be expected to attend four years and earn 18 credits before receiving a high school diploma, except that the final semester of attendance may be waived under the following circumstances: written parental request for early graduation; written student request plus statement giving his purpose in requesting it; and approval by a school committee to be made up of the high school principal, one guidance counselor and three high school faculty members acquainted with the student through class participation.

First reading was given to a policy on teacher evaluation and supervision which "is designed to assist teachers in growth and development of their professional abilities as well as to identify areas of strength and weakness." A thorough, fair and objective evaluation will follow classroom observation and a principal-teacher conference. "If the teacher had a serious problem, such as in discipline, we would help overcome that problem," Brenholt explained.

Evaluation will be made on the basis of relationships with students such as being fair and impartial; having self-control and a helpful attitude, etc.; classroom competency; cooperative relations with staff; community relations; (Continued on page 2)

## Joseph Arends Killed in Crash On Wednesday

A rural Campbellsport man was fatally injured in an auto crash at 5:35 p. m. Wednesday on Hwy. 28 and W. Sheboygan Rd. two miles north of Batavia.

He was Joseph Arends, 86, of Long Lake, R. 2, Campbellsport, a brother-in-law of Math Kohn of Kewaskum.

Details on the crash were not available, but it was reported that Arends' car and one driven by James Weigel, Sr. 29, of Cascade collided when Arends filed to stop at the intersection. Weigel suffered a fractured arm.

Arends was born Feb. 28, 1885 in the Town of Fredonia, Ozaukee County. For the past 20 years he had lived at Long Lake and prior to that at Barton and Oconomowoc. He was a retired factory employe.

Arends married Adeline Lehnerz at St. Michael's Catholic Church, St. Michaels, and she predeceased him. Surviving are one brother, Edward Arends, of Portland, Oreg., a sister-in-law, and many nieces and nephews.

He was a member of St. Michael's Church near Parnell, the Holy Name Society, St. Joseph's Society and Order of Catholic Foresters.

Visitation at Miller's Funeral Home, Kewaskum, will be after 3 p. m. Sunday and a Rosary Vigil will be held at 8 p. m. Funeral services will be held at 10:30 a. m. on Monday from the funeral home and at 11 a. m. at St. John of God Catholic Church in the Town of Farmington. Father Wm. Bonesho, pastor, will officiate and burial take place in St. Michael's Cemetery, St. Michaels.

Two men recently discontinued their active association as members of the Kewaskum Fire Department. Ted Rohlinger retired from the department and Dennis Konkol resigned due to being transferred to Madison in his position with the Department of Natural Resources.

Rohlinger, a veteran member, retired after 20 years of service with the department and has been placed on the honorary list. He

joined the department in 1951. Konkol, a member for seven years, joined the department in 1964. Both firemen were active in the firemen's training classes.

## Good News for Local Taxpayers

Village Commissioner William Martin has good news for taxpayers in Kewaskum. A rough draft of the 1972 budget results in a net tax rate 16 cents lower than the 1971 rate instead of his original estimate of an increase of up to \$6 per \$1,000 of assessed valuation.

Martin said that in his original computation he neglected to take into consideration that the assessed valuation of the village has increased by \$1.4 million. The budget in its rough draft totals

\$965,725.51. It calls for a tax levy of \$673,523.01 and a tax rate of \$42.17 from which is deducted a state tax credit of \$2.59 for a net tax rate of \$39.58 compared with \$39.72 last year.

## Pick Architect For New Bank

Bank of Kewaskum officials have selected Zwack Associated Limited of Sheboygan to start work on plans for a new bank building on Fond du Lac Ave.

The architectural firm was picked by the building committee for the bank, consisting of Wayland Tessar and James Reigle, after they had interviewed a number of concerns who were interested in the job. Since the selection Tessar and Gerald Zimnel of the bank have had several meetings with members of the firm, who are working on the floor plans now. It is not known how long it will take for the plans to be completed but it is hoped that groundbreaking will take place next spring.

professional attitudes; and personal characteristics.

The new format also will include student opinions and reactions which will be made in written, unsigned form. Teachers will be allowed a rebuttal in the form of a self-evaluation report. The entire program is on the high school level.

Proposed purchase of 10 three to four-inch trees at a cost of \$70 each was tabled after board member Allen Tessar suggested looking into buying trees from a grower on a dig-your-own basis. "Though they might only be two-inch trees, they are available for less money," he said. Five would be planted at Beechwood and five at Farmington.

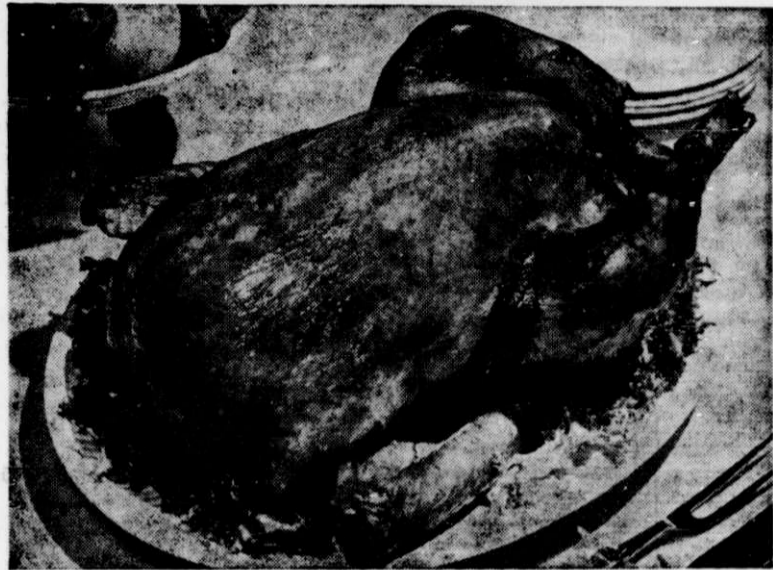
