Voters Turn Down School Bond Issue for Third Time

PROPOSAL REJECTED BY VOTE OF 1089 TO 681

Voters of the Kewaskum Community Schools District on Monday turned down the third attempt in less than a year at a school bond issue. The proposed \$2,660,000 issue was defeated on a vote of 1,089 to 681.

Results of the four polling places was: Town of Farmington, 105 yes and 296 no; Town of Wayne, 87 yes and 164 no; Beechwood (Towns of Scott and Mitchell), 59 yes and 108 no; and Kewaskum High School (Village of Kewaskum and Towns of Kewaskum, Auburn, Barton and Ashford), 430 yes and 521 no.

The turnout of 1,780 voters on Monday was midway between the other two referendum elections. On April 6, an all-time high of 2,041 voters turned out to defeat a \$2.9 million issue, on a vote of 685 yes and 1,356 no. On Sept. 13, a total of 1,041 defeated a \$2.6 million issue on a vote of 455 yes and 586 no.

The issue was rejected at all four polling places in the school district with the Town of Farmington turning in the largest No vote by almost a 3 to 1 margin.

School Board Begins Plans For Split Shift

NEW SCIENCE PROGRAM FOR GRADES 7 AND 8 APPROVED

Following the defeat of the \$2.6 million bond issue Monday that would have provided additions to schools in the Kewaskum district, members of the Board of Education centered their attention on alternatives Monday night.

Though no official action was taken, they looked ahead to going on the split-shift program. Supt. Floyd Brenholt was authorized to begin working with architects on plans for a building just big enough to serve as an open concept area during an overlap period in the morning when all students would be in attendance.

Split shift for Grades 7-12 was previously discussed. Tentatively, Grades 10-12 would attend from 7:30 a. m. to about noon and Grades 7-9 from 10:30 a. m. to 3:45. The building would be converted to a shop area later.

Brenholt said Tuesday, "This is our thinking without consulting the architects. Perhaps after meeting with them, they will have another approach."

A woman from the Wayne area asked, "What will it (split shift) mean for Wayne next year?" There the gym was converted into open concept classroom space at the start of the 1971 school year. The Industrial Commission has approved use of the gym only for this year.

Brenholt replied, "We will probably be bringing some students from Wayne and Farmington into

Kewaskum. But chances are it would not be the lower grades."

Another woman asked "What does the state say about split-shifting?" inasmuch as each class under split shift would be shortened by 12 minutes. Brenholt replied that the state only specifies the number of days school shall be in session, adding, "I am sure they are not jumping up and down with joy over prospect of long-term split-shifting."

Another question from one of the 14 spectators was whether any consideration has been given to renting other facilities or going on the 45-15 Plan. Brenholt replied that the only feasible way the 45-15 Plan could work is to have all first graders attend the Wayne School, for instance; all second graders attend Beechwood; all third and fourth graders at Farmington, etc. "Under such a plan, we could effect some savings," he said.

Brenholt commented that "split shift won't be best in terms of family living" but in terms of education it would be better over present overcrowded conditions. "We have to do something," he observed.

Edwards commented that "split shift still is better than trying to crowd more pupils into a classroom."

A new science program for Grades 7 and 8 with a more individual learning approach was approved. It will be known as the ISCS, Intermediate Science Curriculum Study.

The new program was outlined by James Hansen and Floyd Brenner, science instructors for Grades 7 and 8, respectively, in the Kewaskum Junior High. They pointed out that adopting the new program would not discontinue the present one but it would provide a more varied science program, designed for students of varied abilities.

A student will pick up daily where he left off the day before and he will proceed at his own pace. Eventually, there will be no grade levels, they pointed out.

The new program will include remedial and enrichment areas to benefit the student who needs much teacher help as well as the one who needs no help. Cost of books and study materials will be \$1,300 for Grade 8 and \$1,200 for Grade 7, plus an additional cost if the Holy Trinity School pupils take the course. They presently go to the junior high for science instruction.

"Can we do this without hiring teacher aides?" Board Chairman Richard L. Edwards wanted to know. "It will mean extra work but it will be worth it," replied Hansen.

According to Hansen, "the new program includes earth science, which is presently in rough draft but not yet published; chemical science which will be presented by Brenner at mid-semester; physical science to be introduced at the start of the 1972 school year and life science which we are in the process of presenting now."

Residents are urged to have their decorations lighted each evening between the holidays. The theme of the decorations may be religious, traditional, humorous, modern, unusual lighting, etc.

Most residents have already decorated their homes for the season. All are asked to cooperate and it is hoped there will be numerous beautifully lighted, original and attractive entries in the contest.

Prize winners will be announced after the judging takes place.

Local Officials Attend Hearing Urging Support of 4-Lane Highway to Kewaskum

A busload of approximately 40 persons from the West Bend and Kewaskum area went to Madison last Tuesday to appear before the state's Senate Transportation Committee urging support for the construction of a new, four-lane highway south from Kewaskum.

State Sen. Dale McKenna has introduced a bill which would authorize a conditional reallocation of state bonding funds for improvements to Hwy. 45 from its intersection with U.S. Hwy. 41 north almost to Kewaskum and including a bypass around West Bend.

Sen. McKenna in his bill asks for the release of about \$15 million to construct a 13.5 mile, four-lane highway. He said funds could be released from bonding money approved by the 1969 legislature for a project in the Janesville area. Plans for that project have been discontinued.

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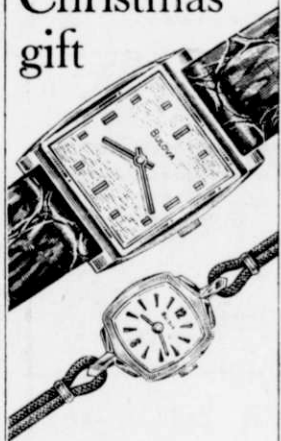

Mayville Halts Indians 5 Game Winning Streak

The Kewaskum Indians' 5 game winning streak, which included 3 non-conference wins and 2 in Scenic games, was brought to an abrupt end Tuesday night at Mayville when the unbeaten, defending champion Cardinals took care of them to the tune of 74-47. Previously the Indians had won their 5th straight at Kettle Moraine last Friday, 72-60. The setback at Mayville dropped them out of a first place tie, now shared by the Cardinals and Germantown.

The Indians were too much for Kettle Moraine, outscoring them in every quarter in their best performance of the young season. Tom Theusch, who hit on 8 of 9 free throws and added 5 baskets, and Glen Eichstedt, also with 18 points and 9 rebounds, paced the Indians. Jim Gaffke and Craig Carr each added 14 points as 4 players scored in double figures. Scaff of the Lasers led all scorers in a losing effort with 21 points.

Kewaskum connected on 22 of 28 free throws for 79 per cent and this is where the game was won. The Lasers got only 8 free throws and made good on 6 of them.

At Mayville Tuesday the Cardinals gained revenge for 2 setbacks handed them by the Indians last year, one of which knocked them out of tournament play. After a slow start, Mayville poured it on to gain a decisive victory by 27 points, 74-47.

Kewaskum took a 12-7 lead in the first quarter and it looked like another typical barn-burner between these teams. But Mayville dazzled their home crowd with 27 points in the second period while snuffing out the Indians on 8 to take a 34-20 halftime lead. After that it was never close.

Tension showed as only one point was scored in the first 2 minutes, that by Mayville. Then each team got a couple of buckets and with the score at 6-5 Kewaskum scored 6 straight points and

went on top 12-7 at the quarter. The Cardinals went into their zone press in the second quarter, which has always been troublesome and hard to figure out for the Indians. They immediately went to town and with the score 19-18, scored 10 points in a row. Stieve with 9 points, Heim with 8 and Welak with 6 led the onslaught. Mayville's strong press and domination of the boards hurt the Indians.

Turnovers and mistakes plagued Mayville in the third stanza and Kewaskum crept to with 7 points, 36-29. Sure enough the Cardinals went back to the press and the Indians were in trouble again. They threw the ball away and were unable to get their shots off. Meanwhile Mayville built up their lead to 15 again with 8 straight points. The Cardinals' big 6-5 veteran center, Jeff Stieve, at one time in the last quarter scored 8 in a row himself, 6 of them on rebounds, and Kewaskum could not close the gap.

With 3 starters back from last year's championship team, Mayville will be tough to beat. Stieve, an all-state footballer, stood out for the Cardinals with 23 points for scoring honors, snared a dozen or so rebounds and blocked 3 shots. Their leading scorer, Heim, was close behind with 19. Mitch Misko paced Kewaskum with 17. The Indians really miss Misko's taller twin brother, Mark, who starred in Ohio last year and is attending high school but is not with the team. Both Misko boys transferred here from Ohio.

This Friday Kewaskum hosts undefeated Germantown in another big game. The Warhawks, tied with Mayville, are led by the Henry brothers.
