Board Hears Report on Building Needs for Split-Shift Program

PLAN \$154,000 BUILDING EQUAL TO 9 CLASSROOMS

Supt. Floyd Brenholt reported Monday night to the Board of Education on the progress made with the architects on the building needed for the split-shift program.

He said that Schutte-Mochon, Inc., architects, have estimated that the cost of a metal building of some 8,000 square feet would be \$154,000 which includes heating and air-conditioning.

Though the building would be built in open concept, it would be the equivalent of nine classrooms plus toilet facilities. The structure would be situated 20 feet from the present high school, connected to it by a corridor.

Brenholt told the board, "These are only tentative and basic figures. I cannot answer a lot of questions because I have not seen the plans."

The architects have recommended that in the future the building be used for home economics, art and some shop classes. "They feel this is a better approach than our original idea to convert the building totally to shop in the future," Brenholt reported.

The structure would be built of a type of metal paneling of which both the interior and exterior surfaces are pre-finished. Brenholt said he was told that these panels can be removed to become another wall, in the event of future expansion.

He also said, "Jack Fieweger (architect) has said we can assure ourselves that this building can be integrated into the high school in the future, and it would not block future needed construction on the high school site." Brenholt added, "If we can get going on this, we may get in by fall." A board meeting with the architects will be scheduled for Jan. 3 or 10.

The board denied a request from the Campbellsport school district asking that the Kewaskum district pay tuition for two moving students of a family which is moving to the Kewaskum district from Campbellsport. Both wish to finish high school in Campbellsport and its board has agreed provided Kewaskum pays the tuition.

Denial was based on a provision in state law which states that the school board of a district may permit a resident pupil who has gained 12th grade status to complete that grade without payment of tuition, even though his parents move out of the district.

The board authorized payment of an annual flat fee of \$100 to the auxiliary police force of Kewaskum for their services at athletic games, beginning with the present school year. Hiring of a part-time janitor at the high school was approved.

The board discussed a problem presented by three bus drivers at the Dec. 13 meetings who said supervision problems arise when children must wait in their busses, which are loading in Kewaskum, for the bus to return from West Bend parochial and special school classes.

Brenholt pointed out that the waiting time is usually only five to ten minutes and the decision was that it is no problem to the board's way of thinking.

Paul Schoenberger, guidance counselor, will be appointed director of summer school to succeed Kenneth Erickson. Because of the work which will be involved with the new program for fall, Erickson asked to be relieved of summer school.

Brenholt and board members Gerald Secor and Thomas Gundrum will attend the Wisconsin Association of School Boards conference in Milwaukee in January.

The board adjourned into executive session for a board-superintendent evaluating session and for teacher negotiations.

Lack of Subs Shortens Cage Ball Marathon

The cage ball marathon at Kewaskum High School was shortened to 24½ hours instead of the scheduled 48 hours because the tired girls didn't get enough relief and simply ran out of substitutes. When they called it quits the senior girls were slightly ahead of the junior girls in their 24½-hour game, 1,267 to 1,088.

The holiday vacation marathon began at 8 a. m. Monday when two 8-girl teams took the floor and was to continue until 8 a. m. Wednesday. It was halted at 8:30 a. m. Tuesday when the girls became "too pooped to participate." Cage ball is like volleyball, except the ball is 10 times larger. Approximately 80 senior and junior girls were scheduled to participate.

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5th and 6th Grade Intramural Basketball Program to Begin in School District

The 5th and 6th grade intramural basketball program for the Kewaskum Community Schools will begin its 1972 season with practice sessions at the elementary schools beginning the week of Jan. 3. The purpose of the program is to offer those boys interested a chance to learn the basic skills in the game of basketball; skills to be included are dribbling, shooting, passing, offensive and defensive strategy, team co-operation, sportsmanship and understanding of the rules. The program is not intended to produce any "superstars" as all participants will be given approximately equal time in both the instructional phase and the competitive phase of the practice sessions.

Each participant will be engaged in 16 hours of the practice sessions over an 8-week period. All practices begin the week of Jan. 3 and end the week of Feb. 21.

Farmington school: Place of practice — Farmington. Day and time — Tuesday, 3:45 - 4:45; Friday, 3:00 - 4:00. Date of first practice —

Tuesday, Jan. 4.

Kewaskum school: Place of practice — Kewaskum High School. Day and time — Saturday, 8:30 - 10:30. Date of first practice — Saturday, Jan. 8.

Wayne school: Place of practice — Kewaskum High School. Day and time — Saturday, 8:30 - 10:30. Date of first practice — Saturday, Jan. 8.

The program will culminate with a play day on Feb. 27. As in past years at the conclusion of the 8 weeks (16 hours) of practice sessions there will be an all-district play day. The basic purpose of the play-day is to inform the parents of "what's been going on" during these practice sessions by displaying those basketball skills, previously practiced, while participating in a game situation. Each team participating in the play day will be composed of players from each of the 4 elementary schools; in other words, there will be no "school against school" competition where all the players on a team are from the same school as in previous years.

This is an intramural program and should not be confused or thought of as being connected with the physical education pro-

gram. Participation in the program is on a voluntary basis; no prizes, grades, trophies, ribbons, etc. will be included in the program. The program is open to all interested boys who are in the 5th and 6th grade and attend a public school within the district; information sheets and practice schedules have been distributed to all eligible students prior to Christmas vacation.

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ORDINANCE NO. 71-3

TO PROVIDE FOR FINANCING SEWAGE SERVICE IN THE VILLAGE OF KEWASKUM

The Village Board of the Village of Kewaskum do ordain as follows:

SECTION I. Repeals ordinance numbers 4-54, 58-3, 69-1, and 69-3 in their entirety and hereby re-creates an **ORDINANCE TO PROVIDE FOR FINANCING SEWAGE SERVICE IN THE VILLAGE OF KEWASKUM** as follows:

SECTION II. DEFINITIONS. For the purpose of this ordinance, the terms "Sewage", "Sewerage System", "Sewerage Service," "Industrial Wastes" and "User" are defined as follows:

A. "Sewage" is the water-carried waste created in and to be conducted away from residences, industrial and commercial premises, public buildings as defined in Section 101.01, Wisconsin Statutes and other structures and premises, excluding, however, industrial wastes as hereinafter defined.

B. "Sewerage System" includes all street lateral, main and intercepting sewers and structures, conduits, pipelines by which sewage or industrial waste is collected, transported, treated and disposed of. This shall not include plumbing inside or in connection with buildings served, or service

pipes from a building to the street lateral.

C. "Sewerage Service" comprises the use of and benefit from the sewerage system including the collection, transportation, pumping, treatment and final disposition of sewage.

D. "Industrial Wastes" are those particular liquids or other wastes resulting from any process of industry, manufacture, trade or business or the development of any natural resources.

E. "User" is the owner or owners of any lot, parcel of land, building or premises discharging sanitary sewage, industrial wastes or other liquids into the sanitary sewerage system.

F. The definitions of the previously adopted "Standard Specifications for Sewer Construction in Wisconsin" shall also apply.

SECTION III. SEWERAGE SERVICE CHARGES. For the purposes as provided herein there is hereby levied and assessed upon each lot, parcel of land, building or premises having any sewer connection with the sanitary sewerage system of said Village, or discharging sewage, industrial wastes or other liquids, either directly or indirectly into the Village sanitary sewerage system, a sewerage service charge payable as herein provided and in amounts as determined.

A. The following sewage service charges shall be levied upon all users of the sewerage works system. The charges shall be as follows, depending upon the specific classification of the user. All charges presented are in **dollars per calendar quarter (three months)** unless otherwise stated. Sewerage service charges shall be pro-rated where said service is for a period of less than one calendar quarter of a year.

1. Residential Users: Each single family residential unit (e.g. single family residence, flat apartment) \$14.00

2. Commercial and Industrial Users:

a. For all commercial and industrial users which are connected to the public water supply system and have their total supply metered, a flat charge shall be imposed depending on the size of the installed water meter.

If the waste water discharged from commercial and industrial users served with a water meter 2" or less in size contains a 5-day BOD greater than 300 mg/L, the rate per quarter will be determined under Section 2.c.

b. For all commercial and industrial users in which the water supply is not metered, the charge will be based on the classification of user as follows:

(1.) Establishments in which patrons do not normally use sewer facilities

(a) Number of employees is five or less \$21.00

(b) Number of employees is more than five \$35.00

(2.) Establishments in which patrons use the sanitary sewer facilities

(a) Number of employees is five or less \$32.00

(b) Number of employees is more than five \$46.00

(3.) Motels, hotels and other establishments providing lodging for the public shall pay a charge in addition to the charge specified under Section a. and b. of Paragraph 2. This charge shall be imposed for each living unit provided with sanitary sewer facilities \$8.50.

c. For "wet" industries such as dairies, canneries, food processing plants, etc., a quarterly rate will be based on the following unit costs: \$0.11 per 1000 gallons of waste discharged into the sanitary sewer system, plus

\$0.03 per pound of 5-day Biochemical Oxygen Demand discharged into the sanitary sewer system plus \$0.01 per pound of suspended solids discharged into the sanitary sewer system.

d. For commercial establishments such as car wash centers, laundromats, etc., a volumetric rate shall be employed as follows: \$0.30 per 1000 gallons of water discharged into the sanitary sewer system.

Waste water discharged into the sanitary sewer system shall be metered whenever required by the Village. The meters shall be of an approved type and installed as directed by the Village. The cost of the meter and installation shall be borne by the owner. Maintenance and operation of the meters shall be performed by the Village.

e. All "wet" industries and commercial establishments which pay sewage service charges on the basis of water meter size as provided in Section 2a. must pay a volumetric surcharge in addition to the flat charge designated if the water consumption exceeds 3 million gallons per calendar quarter. The surcharge shall be as follows:

\$0.30 per gallon of water consumption in excess of 3 million gallons in any calendar quarter.

f. An organic load analysis of a waste water will be made each quarter or, in addition, when in the opinion of the Village engineer, an excess load is being imposed on the waste water treatment plant by a particular discharge. The cost of the waste survey is to be borne by the Village. The waste water analysis for the purpose of establishing the quarterly rate shall be made on samples collected on a normal working day at each "wet" industry. The person discharging the waste water must cooperate fully with the Village engineer when the waste water survey is conducted by providing a suitable access to

sampling points and available flow records.

3. For schools the charge shall be \$1.00 per person per calendar quarter.

4. For all other users connected to the sewerage works system which do not fall under Sections a., b., c., and d., the minimum charge per calendar quarter will be \$14.00. It shall be the responsibility of the Village engineer to classify a specific user under one of the charge sections provided herein if a dispute develops in this regard.

5. That an annual charge of \$20,000.00 shall be paid by the Village as a sewerage service charge for the services and benefits received by said Village from said system; said sewerage service charges to be paid in equal quarterly installments as the regular sewerage service charges are paid by other users, and said payments by the Village shall be handled in the same manner as the payments from other users, and be placed in the special and separate fund provided for herein.

SECTION IV. Other General Provisions

A. Adjustments to the sewage service charge, for commercial and industrial users falling under Section III A2a. or A2b., can be made if large quantities of water are consumed but diverted from the sanitary waters or product waters. The Village engineer must be provided with reliable evidence of such diversions, as for example, flow measurements obtained at expense of the user, before any adjustments can be mutually agreed upon by the Village engineer and the user.

B. Storm water from roof leaders and ground water from foundation drain tiles shall not be discharged into the sanitary sewer system.

C. No User shall discharge into the sanitary sewer system any waste water or materials which are dangerous or which may have a deleterious effect on the waste treatment plant or which may obstruct or cause a malfunction of the sewer system. Some examples wastes with very high or low pH of prohibited discharges are: excessive grease and oils, inflammable or explosive wastes, excessive settleable solids or solids which can obstruct flow, toxic or poisonous substances, radioactive wastes, or any discharges which can cause noxious or malodorous gases. If a user of the sewerage system discharges any deleterious substance therein, he shall be required to discontinue the discharge of such substance into the sewerage sys-

tem. If, after 10 days notice in writing, such user continues to discharge such deleterious substance into the sewerage system, he shall be subject upon conviction to a fine of not less than \$5.00 nor more than \$50.00. Each day in which such violation continues to exist after notice to discontinue such discharge shall be deemed as separate violation.

SECTION V. The sewerage service charges taxes or levied pursuant to this chapter shall be payable to the Village Treasurer, at the same time as water bills in the district in which the property is located are payable.

A. A penalty of Ten Percent (10%) shall be added to all bills for sewerage service not paid within fifteen (15) days of the date of said bill.

SECTION VI. The sewerage service charges taxes or levied pursuant to this chapter shall be a lien upon the property served pursuant to section 66.069 and 66.076 (7) Wisconsin Statutes, and shall be collected in the manner therein provided.

SECTION VII. The funds received from sewerage service charges shall be deposited at regular intervals in a depository to be designated by the Village Board. Said funds shall be available for the payment of the cost of construction, cost and expenses of management, maintenance, depreciation and repair of the sewerage treatment plant, and to provide funds for the retirement of bonds as they mature, and interest thereon.

SECTION VIII. The amount received from the collection of the charges authorized by the ordinance shall be credited to a sanitary sewerage system. When appropriate by the Village Board, the credits to said account shall be available for the payment of principal and interest of bonds issued and outstanding, or which may be issued, to provide funds for said sewerage system, or part thereof and all of a part of the expenses for additions and improvements and other necessary disbursements or indebtedness, and the Village Board may by resolution place such surplus or any part thereof for any such purpose.

SECTION IX. That all sewerage service charges shall commence on the 1st day of January, 1972, and the first quarterly installment thereon shall be due and payable on the 25th day of April, 1972, with subsequent installments due and payable on the 25th day of the first month after the end of each quarter.

SECTION X. Effect. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force on and after December 31, 1971.

Mr. Brenholt reported on changes caused by the new state aid legislation regarding tax rate and new amounts certified to the clerks of the various municipalities.

Discussion was held regarding methods of figuring teacher salaries after the freeze. John Jadro moved that following the termination of Phase I of the wage-price freeze, employee salaries for the remainder of the 1971-72 pay periods be calculated in the legal manner which will assure the employees the highest percentage possible of their 1971-72

contracted salary. Gerald Secor seconded. Motion carried.

Mr. Edwards read a post card signed "Property Tax Payers" dated Nov. 9 asking the school board to check into obtaining insurance thru the Commissioner of Insurance, State Capitol, Madison, Wisconsin and further stating there would be a savings on the premiums listed in the Nov. 5 Statesman to Minnesota Mutual for \$415.54 and Metropolitan Insurance for \$1,221.66. Mr. Edwards explained that the Minnesota Mutual billing was thru the state group insurance company and covered employee life insurance and that the Metropolitan figures covered tax sheltered annuities elected by employees and therefore was not a cost of the district since the deductions are made from payroll checks. He also explained that at one time the district insurance had been partially purchased from the state, however upon a review, the board had decided to have one insurance agent on a local basis for property, liability and workmen's

compensation since he tried to keep the inventory on a current basis which the state insurance did not provide with their service. Mr. Brenholt submitted a proposal for planting 5 trees each at Beechwood and Farmington for site improvement for a cost of \$700.00. After discussion the board denied the request.

Mr. Brenholt explained the forms for staff evaluation and the 1972-73 budget format materials which had been distributed to board members.

Gerald Zimmel moved to adjourn. Gerald Secor seconded. Motion carried.

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
