## Woolman Hired As Third Full-Time Police Officer on Local Force

VILLAGE TO HAVE ROUND THE CLOCK PROTECTION

Gary Woolman, 21, of 1185 Hillside Drive, Kewaskum, has been hired as a full-time patrolman on the Kewaskum police force. He becomes the third full-time person on the force, giving Kewaskum round the clock police protection.

Woolman's appointment was ratified by the Village Board Monday night. He began a two to four week training session Monday. He is one of 11 who took a written test in December, after which five were selected for interviews.

A graduate of Kewaskum Community High School, Woolman also attended the University of Wisconsin, Washington County Campus. For the past three years, he has been customer service manager at Enger-Kress Co., West Bend. He also has been a member of Kewaskum's auxiliary police force.

Until now, the police force consisted of Chief Donald Hlavaty, full-time patrolman David St. Louis and part-time officers George Allmann and Neil Dennis. The latter two will become relief men.

Other board action included issuing an operator's license to Frances Zemski and approving three building permits for Embassy Homes and one for Wimmer-Blatter, in Bel-Ric Acres. Both are Milwaukee firms. Edward Brandt was reappointed village assessor and general building inspector at \$140 per month.

The board authorized purchase of \$12,000 worth of phosphate removal equipment for the sewage treatment plant; to be installed by village workers and \$300 for cabinets in the sewage plant laboratory.

Eugene Bohn of Bohn Insurance Agency explained the increases in workmen's compensation rates effective Jan. 1, 1972. He said the increase in coverage for the ambulance driver and attendant in making out of town runs will increase from \$5 to \$9.08 per run.

## Change Garbage Pickup Schedule

Beginning January 17, 1972, garbage will be picked up one day per week instead of two times per week as at present. On Monday of each week all pickups will be made from Fond du Lac Avenue (including both sides of Fond du Lac Avenue) and east. On Tuesday of each week all pickups will be made from the area west of Fond du Lac Avenue. This schedule will continue until May 1, 1972, after which time we will return to twice per week pickup on Monday and Friday.

Trash (cans, bottles, metal, etc.) pickup will continue on the present basis, once every other Wednesday.

The Village encourages the use of plastic bags for garbage storage and as pickup containers. Preferably the bags should be inserted in a garbage can (if at all possible) for safety's sake and then placed at the curb for pickup. We hope this method will speed pickup and conserve man-hours.

The members of the Village board and the employees of the Village crew ask your cooperation. This trial period will show whether expenses can be cut and will allow Village employees to use their time for other needed work projects.

Becker said two more patrolmen are scheduled to be hired in the near future. The new employees bring the department employees near the 50 mark, including officials, investigators, deputies, clerks, dispatchers, jailers and other personnel.

## Board Discusses Plans for Proposed Building Needed for Split-Shifting

ESTIMATED COST \$154,407 TO HOUSE 250 STUDENTS

Plans for a proposed building needed for split-shifting were discussed during a meeting of the Board of Education and two representatives of the Schutte-Mochon architectural firm here Monday night. No action was taken, pending further study.

The board was given a cost estimate of \$154,407 for the structure that would house 250 students in open concept off the north edge of the high school building. It would have the equivalent of nine classrooms plus toilet rooms.

"I feel reasonably secure in this estimate," said Jack Fieweger, one of the architects present. The cost, broken down, includes \$85,263 for general construction; \$12,000 for plumbing; \$22,000 for heating and ventilating; \$17,000 for wiring; \$1,600 for painting and \$16,544 for contingencies and architectural fees.

The cost per square foot figures out to \$18.60 according to Fieweger. The building should be completed by Aug. 15 if bids can be advertised by March 15.

The building would be constructed of metal wall panels to make it expandable in three directions without having to redo any part of it. Plans do not call for a basement and Board Member Richard Theusch asked why. "To keep the cost down," replied Fieweger.

Fieweger suggested instead of a basement, "wouldn't it be wise to add on spaces to the main level to include some of the things you need now, like shop and band areas? Wouldn't it serve you better?" he asked.

Board Member Gerald Secor commented, "I think it is better we go with bare minimums to handle just what we need for split shifting. I am leery to hang anything on to the plans that we don't need to have."

John Jadro expressed the view that it would be better to rearrange the hours of split shifting so as not to have to spend \$154,000 for a building. To which Supt. Floyd Brenholt replied, "If it were just for split shifting, I would agree with your comment. But this building is not going to be wasted. If we leave split shifting, it will be used for other classroom purposes."

Board Chairman Richard Edwards wanted to know, "how will this building fit into future building plans?" "This building will not lock you in—you will still have flexibility," Architect Ray Juerrson told him.

After discussing the values of a basement in the proposed building from a useful point of view, the architects were instructed to make another cost study including basement plans, for presentation at a Jan. 17 meeting.

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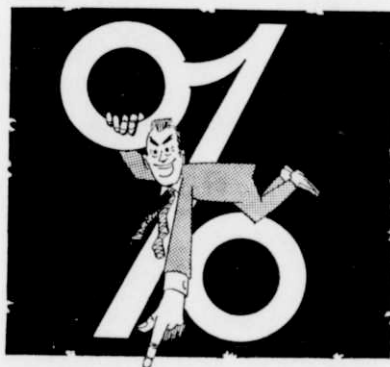
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### Marsha McNeill and Harvey Schaub Wed



Kewaskum's inbounds pass hit the backboard and the ball fell right into the hands of Lomira's Bob Bogenschneider, who sank an easy layup to put his team ahead, 56-53. With about 20 seconds left, Mitch Misko's shot rolled off the rim and Dave Giese grabbed it. He was fouled and sank one free throw to clinch the win.

The teams played evenly during the first three periods. The score was tied 14-14 at the quarter and 26-26 at halftime in the low scoring duel. Kewaskum led by one, 43-42, after 3 quarters and was ahead by 5 points at one time. But the Lions outscored them in the final period, 15-10, for the win.

Erickson and Giese paced the winners with 16 points apiece and Bogenschneider added 11. Misko was top gun for the Indians with 15, followed by Tom Theusch and Glen Eichstedt with 12 apiece.

The defeat was Kewaskum's third in a row after winning the first five, and left them with a 5-3 record. In the conference they are 2-2.

Tonight (Friday) the Indians get back into Scenic Moraine action at

Pewaukee and must win if they are to stay in the running. The Pirates also are 2-2 to date. In the big game tonight the two undefeated leaders, Mayville and Germantown (both 4-0) clash on the Mayville floor. This battle will settle first place for the present. In the two other games, Slinger (1-3) plays at Grafton (1-3) and Hartland (1-3) is at Kettle Moraine (1-3).

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## New Snowmobile Regulations Set for Kettle Moraine State Forest in Area

Snowmobiles no longer have open range on the Kettle Moraine State Forest according to Walter J. Adams, state forest superintendent. The new regulations permit SNOWMOBILING ONLY ON TRAILS marked for snowmobile use and areas posted as open snowmobile areas. This does not mean, however, that snowmobiles will not have ample room to enjoy the outdoors. Fifty-five miles of marked trails have been provided, and an additional 2,040 acres of open snowmobile area has been set up in three locations.

One is a 760 acre area in the Town of Mitchell, Sheboygan County, just off County Trunk Highway "A" east of the Parnell Lookout Tower. Another area is 1,120 acres in size, and is located just south of New Fane in Fond du Lac County and extends south to State Highway 28 and west of the Kettle Moraine Scenic Drive. The third area is located west of New Prospect, in the Town of Au-

burn, Fond du Lac County, and contains 160 acres. This area extends along County Trunks G and SS.

For convenience of the snowmobiler, the department plows out seven or eight parking areas adjacent to main highway crossing sites along the marked trails.

Maps of the areas open to snowmobiling can be obtained at the Kettle Moraine State Forest headquarters at Mauthe Lake, or by writing to the Department of Natural Resources, Box 426, Campbellsport, Wis. 53010.
