When contacted this week, Fire Chief Armin Oppermann reported that the Kewaskum Fire Department answered a total of 86 ambulance galls by the rescue squad and 19 fire calls during 1971.

Included in the 19 fire calls were only three in the Village of Kewaskum. There were 11 in the Town of Kewaskum, three in the Town of Auburn, and two state forest calls. This total of 19 does not include two mutual aid calls to assist the West Bend and Campbeilsport fire departments.
