# High School Principal Edward Connors Resigns After Student Protest "Sit-In"

Unauthorized School **Paper** Ridicule Factor in Decision

#### TWO MALE STUDENTS ARE SUSPENDED, ONE APOLOGIZES

Edward E. Connors, principal of Kewaskum Community High School, submitted his resignation to the board of education Wednesday morning, effective immediately.

Connors announced his resignation at a conference he called at 9 a. m. and said he would submit his resignation immediately following. During the 11/2 hour conference, he poured out problems that exist in the school that led to

his decision. "This is not a spur of the moment thing. It just came sooner than I had expected," he explained. In his letter of resignation he noted that he interviewed for the job in the spring of 1969. "At that time. I was informed of several problems that existed in the high school and was given an opportunity to decide if I was still interested." He said at that time the board probed his philosophy.

The letter went on, "Thus when I accepted 'the position of high school principal, I knew the path would not be easy. The staff was not accustomed to such routine

The proposed building, of open concept design, is needed during the overlap period when all students are in attendance.

One of some 20 electors present asked why the board had not chosen to go to a completely separated split shift in which high school would run from 7 a. m. until noon and junior high from noon until 5 p. m.

Brenholt replied that he feels running split shift on an overlap schedule is "definitely superior" to a separated schedule. "I have no statistics to prove it is definitely superior, but we did visit Winneconne where they are running a separated schedule, and they expressed a deep discontent running until 5 p. m.," he said.

The hour from 4 to 5 p.m. is wasted because the student is too tired at that hour, Brenholt noted, and this prompted the recommendation of the overlap schedule. He said he also feels it is less disruptive to family life
