## Celebrate 25th Anniversary of Scouting Sponsored by Kiwanis

All past donors have been called and new donors are asked to call Mrs. Mark Rodenkirch at 626-4021 or Mrs. Wayne Rimmel at 626-2210 for an appointment.

This year's goal has been set at 175 pints.

## 5 Area Town Boards To Hold Meeting on Waubeka Reservoir

Is the Waubeka reservoir dead? Not if the Milwaukee County Board and metropolitan developers have their way. The Milwaukee County Board passed a resolution Feb. 8 urging the Southeastern Wisconsin Regional Planning Commission to include the reservoir in the Milwaukee River Watershed plan. SEWRPC will vote on the plan at its Mar. 2 meeting in Waukesha.

Five town boards from the Waubeka reservoir area and Tri-County Civic Association are co-sponsoring a meeting on Feb. 28 at Farmington School. Richard Cutler, chairman of the Milwaukee River Study committee and SEWRPC Commissioner, will be present to inform the people on the details of the watershed plan as it was adopted by the committee Oct. 6. The committee voted 17 to 4 at that meeting not to include the reservoir in the final plan. Plans for pollution control; treatment plants; farm terracing; purchasing of environmental corridors and park lands and other plan elements have received little attention.

The towns sponsoring the meeting are Sherman and Scott in Sheboygan County; Fredonia in Ozaukee County and Trenton and Farmington in Washington County. Farmington School is located on Boltonville Road 1½ miles south of Boltonville and 1 mile north of Washington County Highway H. The school doors will be open at 7:30 p. m. and the meeting will start at 8 p. m.

**Survey Study of KHS Grads Shows School's Effectiveness**

A study encompassing the last three graduating classes from Kewaskum Community High School has recently been completed. The study consisted of a survey questionnaire requesting from the graduates information about their present occupations, and what high school courses could have and did benefit them the most.

The 416 graduates received questionnaires early in December. At the end of December, 169, or 40 per cent of the questionnaires were returned. Determined in three categories, 37 per cent of the replies came from college students, 15 per cent from public technical school students, and 47 per cent from those working at a full-time job. Twelve per cent of

these graduates are married, most of them holding full-time occupations.

Courses indicated frequently by the graduates as most beneficial to them in their present occupations are 1) English 2) typing 3) biology 4) college algebra 5) vocational agriculture 6) office practice 7) bookkeeping 8) auto mechanics 9) home economics.

Introduction psychology, advanced biology, advanced chemistry, more shop courses, calculus, and automotive machine operating are courses the graduates most often recommended for future curriculum.

The last survey question, "Did high school adequately prepare you for your present occupation?" was answered as follows: College students—48 per cent yes, 29 per cent no, 22 per cent not sure. Public technical students—40 per cent yes, 32 per cent no, 28 per cent not sure. Full-time employed—48 per cent yes, 24 per cent no, and 28 per cent not sure.

Some graduates comment: "Actually, there isn't any kind of class that can prepare you for factory work."

"The senior year for college-bound students should have been structured along college lines to more adequately prepare students for college life."

"In school we learn few of the basic skills needed to do our jobs."

"Generally a good all around curriculum is offered for college prep at KHS. I am not in a position to give an opinion as to curriculum from a vocational viewpoint."

"I feel the strengths and weaknesses of my high school curriculum (i.e. teachers inadequacies vs. adequacies, requirements, etc.) had a great influence in steering me toward my major ambition. As for preparing me, I feel I am following a course of study I was

best prepared for, not necessarily one of my own completely uninfluenced decisions."

The study was conducted by Miss Deborah Behnke, a senior, who conducted the survey in conjunction with the guidance department. The questionnaires were used as part of the information for a senior English research paper.

**27 Local Students Enrolled for Spring Semester at UWWC**

A total of 484 students from 41 area communities are enrolled for the spring semester at the University of Wisconsin Center - Washington County, West Bend.

The student body includes 337 full-time students, 270 men and 79 married students.

New students number 79 including 17 transfers from other colleges and 23 students re-entering after an absence of at least one semester. Spring enrollees include 397 continuing students who were on campus last fall.

is welcome to attend the meeting. According to Norbert Dettman, Town of Farmington chairman, the people in his town have been fighting the reservoir since the 30's and are angry about uninformed Milwaukee politicians asking for another costly delay in the vote on the river plan. The reservoir idea has been studied and rejected as unwise by the following agencies: 1938 - WPA/Wisconsin Public Service Commission; 1940 - Wisconsin State Planning Board;

1961 - U. S. Soil Conservation Service; 1964-65 - U. S. Army Corps of Engineers/Public Health Service, and Sept. 1971 - U. S. Army Corps of Engineers.

"We feel enough public money has been spent studying the reservoir and the Milwaukee River study plan should be approved as recommended immediately, so our people can live in peace," Dettmann said.

National FFA WEEK is scheduled in February to honor George Washington who was an outstanding farmer as well as a great leader.

### Barber, Tavern Owner at Wayne, R. Jaeger Dies

Raymond "Spitz" Jaeger, 64, a barber and tavern owner at Wayne, where he had been a resident for the past 17 years, died early Thursday, Feb. 17, at St. Agnes Hospital, Fond du Lac, after ailing for about five months.

He was born Aug. 31, 1907 in the Town of Ashford, Fond du Lac County, a son of the late William and Mary Fleischmann Jaeger. He lived in the Campbellsport area until the time of his marriage to Malinda Luedtke at St. John's Catholic Church parsonage in Byron on April 22, 1931. The couple then moved to Wayne where Mr. Jaeger operated a barber shop. About 20 years ago they purchased a tavern in Wayne and operated both businesses since that time.

Surviving are his wife, three sisters, Mrs. Mary Krowski and Mrs. Helen Kramer of Milwaukee and Mrs. Harry (Dorothea) Schaefer of Long Lake, rural Campbellsport; one brother, Sylvester of Fond du Lac; sisters-in-law, brothers-in-law, nieces, nephews and other relatives.

TO THE MILWAUKEE RIVER WATER SHED STUDY COMMITTEE

Considering all the public concern being expressed in recent times concerning the sharp rise in property taxation and other forms of taxes which have become a burden to many of our people, also the concern over the rise of National, State, and Municipal indebtedness and the difficulties in maintaining balanced budgets, all of which clearly indicates that these facts of our existence are outrunning the growth of our economy.

Also the demands and expectations of our present day society for more and more costly public services, which it appears are motivated and nurtured by the promises and opinions of our political and intellectual leaders, and which must result in constantly increasing taxes and indebtedness, and which often also results in the removal of land and improvements from the tax base through transfer to government ownership for the creation of more highways, reservoirs, parks, etc., does not constitute a prudent public policy.

This trend towards constantly rising costs and constantly reduced areas from which to realize the revenue that is necessary to support ambitious public projects is a policy of playing both ends against the middle, and while some segments of the population may have an existence like living in a Fool's Paradise for a time, in the end this trend of our modern society and way of thinking can well lead to our economic disaster. For this reason and others as well, I must be opposed to any recommendation for reconsideration of the Waubesa Reservoir.

My observations and this expression of opinion are based on forty years of experience in public service as a school and town official in our local area, having dealt with public expenditures and taxation during all that time. I have been a resident of the upper Milwaukee River Water Shed all of my life and well remember our experiences during the March, 1918 and the August, 1924 floods and the lesser floods on other occasions.

I have owned and worked the family farm since 1925, and worked with my father before then.

The lay of the land in reference to the fall per mile in the upper water shed area is such that much crop land will be covered with a few feet of water at best and in dry seasons and with draw downs projected for the lower river area of the water shed, will result in an all around detriment to the upper water shed region instead of the expected and projected benefits.

Instead, we can look forward to mud flats, cattails, and mosquito havens.

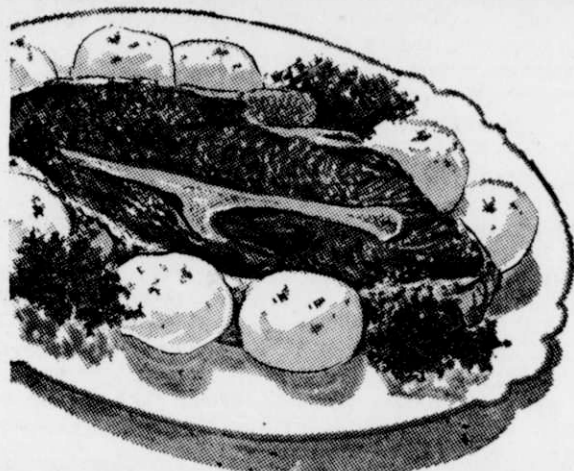

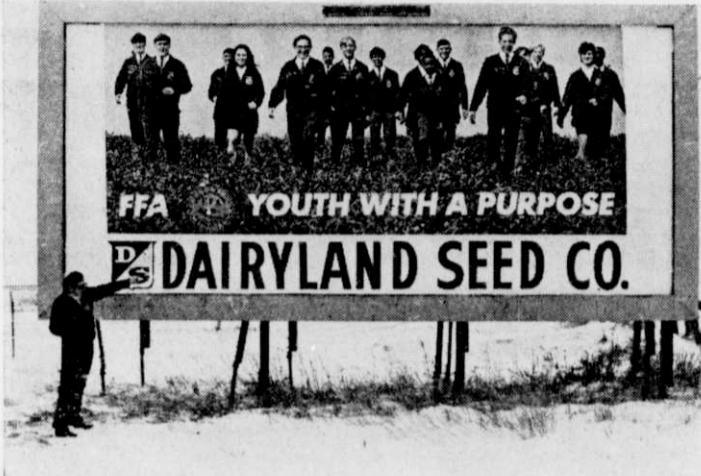

## Kim Rodenkirch Qualifies for State Mat Meet

Kewaskum's fine wrestler in the heavyweight class, Kim Rodenkirch, qualified for the state meet in Madison this Friday and Saturday by wrestling his way through the DeForest Sectional last weekend.

Rodenkirch, who won his second straight Scenic Moraine title this year, pinned all opponents in the Scenic meet as well as the Regional meet but ran into some tough going before taking a second place in the Sectional.

In his first two rounds in the Sectional, Rodenkirch had no difficulty, pinning Shannon Riley of Portage and Steve Beacom of Ripon. But then he was pinned by Terry Stieve of Baraboo in the finals. In being pinned by Stieve, Rodenkirch was beaten by one of the best. Stieve was the only unbeaten wrestler to leave the tournament and was no doubt the meet's outstanding wrestler. He has a 28-0 record and also made it to the state last year in the 185 lb. class. Stieve, who was named to the All-American High School Football team this year, works out with the University of Wisconsin wrestlers.

After losing to Stieve, Rodenkirch had to wrestleback against Bob Hartman of Oshkosh and beat him 4-2 to qualify for the state. Kim, who is coached by Fran Charland, has an excellent 21-2-2 record.

Slinger's Bob Gundum (132) and Bob Villmow (145) and Camp-

bellsport's Mike Bowe (126) will also be going to Madison. Campbellsport's champion team had 5 boys going into the Sectional but only Bowe survived.

Team standings in the Sectional were won by Baraboo with 41 1/2 points. Kewaskum placed 12th with 11 points, tying with Campbellsport, out of 33 schools.

## Indians Beat Hartland to Finish Third

The Kewaskum Indians waited until their final game for one of their best performances of the season Friday and easily defeated Hartland Arrowhead, 76-60. The win gave them a third place finish in the Scenic Conference with a 7-7 mark.

It was Parents Night and the Indians put on a good show for their folks. Kewaskum had been tied with Hartland and Grafton for third and as Grafton also lost Friday the Indians took over third place honors for the season.

It was the last conference game for five of the Indians' first six starters and they will have to rebuild almost entirely for next year. Glen Eichstedt, Tom Theusch, Mitch Misko, Craig Carr and Jim Kern are all seniors, while Jim Gaffke is a junior. Squad members Mike Reindl and Rick Halfmann also are seniors.

Eichstedt and Theusch were hot and did their thing against Arrowhead. Thy couldn't miss and if the team as a whole had played all season like they did Friday they might have ended up in sec-

ond place. Eichstedt scored 26 points and Theusch 22, all on field goals. Jorgenson was the No. 1 man for Hartland with 22 points.

Kewaskum hit on 55% of their shots and out-rebounded Arrowhead, 35-21. It was a contest in the first half with the Indians ahead at the quarter, 18-13, and 38-35 at halftime. The contest was decided in the third period when Kewaskum outscored the visitors, 23-13, to go ahead by 13 points. After that there was no way for Hartland and the Indians again outpointed them in the final stanza, 15-12, to win by 16.

There were only 21 fouls called in the clean game. Hartland made good on 14 free throws while Kewaskum sank only 4. But the winners outgunned them on field goals by a whopping 36 to 23 margin.

Champion Mayville finished with 13-1 and has an outstanding 45-3 record over the past four years in loop play.

Their fine showing Friday was expected to give the Indians momentum for the sub-regional tournament here this week. Kewaskum faced Random Lake in the opener Thursday and the winner will take on Campbellsport (which drew a bye in the first round) Saturday evening.
