Johnson School Bus Service Bid Accepted by Board of Education

Ballot Positions Challenged; Name Citizens Committee

ST. KILIAN SCHOOL WILL CLOSE, ASK BUS SERVICE

The bid of Johnson School Bus Service, Inc., West Bend, to provide student transportation for the Kewaskum School District in a three-year contract was accepted by the Board of Education Monday night.

Based on a projection of the number of bus routes needed, the Johnson bid figured out to \$203,516 per year, about \$46,000 less than projection of the Degnitz Bus Service bid and about \$50,000 less than one from Wm. C. Bauman Bus Service. Both Degnitz and Bauman transport the students now.

Under the approved contract, Johnson Bus will be paid \$28 per bus per route, which is one trip to and one trip from school. Dove-tail trips (a second or additional consecutive trip or trips made by the same bus) will be \$8.50 per trip.

Other rates are per noon kindergarten trip \$10; per late run \$11; per shuttle trip \$5. Extra curricular and field trips call for 30 cents per mile for any size conventional bus. Minimum charge for mileage per trip is \$8.50 plus \$3 per hour plus toll and parking fees, if required.

Despite the fact that there will be additional bussing when Grades 7-12 go on split shift next fall, the annual bussing costs based on Johnson's rates are expected to go up only about \$20,000, which is about half of what it was thought the increase would be. Johnson indicated it is possible he may slice bussing costs further.

The board accepted the bid after reviewing a report prepared by Supt. Floyd Brenholt and Transportation Supervisor Kenneth Erickson on comparative costs for the district to own and operate its own fleet of busses.

Mrs. Charles Trapp, a Town of Scott elector, asked how the board arrived at setting the time of the lottery to determine in what order the names of the 11 school board candidates would appear on the April 4 election ballot.

Clerk John Jadro drew the names at 5:30 p. m. on the day following the filing deadline. Mrs. Trapp said Chapter 120.05 of the state law states the lottery shall take place at 8 p. m. and she wanted to know why it wasn't held at 8 p. m. Jadro said the 5:30 hour was more convenient and that all candidates were notified in advance of the drawing time. Although several said 5:30 would be inconvenient for them to be present, no one disagreed, and several were present, he said.

In view of the fact that the drawing did not take place at the proper time, Mrs. Trapp demanded that names of the candidates be placed on the ballot in alphabetical order or "I will petition the state for an open investigation

of the school board. I'll give you your choice," she said.

One board member replied "We would welcome an investigation." "You're going to get it," retorted Mrs. Trapp.

Jadro said he takes no stock in the notion that a candidate has a better chance of being elected if his name appears at the top of the list of the candidates, adding that if the voter hasn't made up his mind now, he will have by election time and that most voters will vote for whomever they want, regardless of in what order the candidate's name appears on the ballot.

A Citizens Committee on long-range planning for the district was appointed from names submitted by board members. On the committee will be Mrs. John Hubbell and Stanley Woolman of the Village of Kewaskum; Ralph Eisenmann and Alois Bremser of the Town of Farmington; Al Ciha of the Town of Wayne, Wayne Remmel, Town of Kewaskum, and Leander Kempf, Town of Scott.

A teacher to be chosen by the Kewaskum Teachers' Association, a student to be named by student government and Brenholt will complete the group. Named as alternates are Byron Gessner, Town of Scott; Kenneth Ramthun, Town of Farmington; Mark Rodenkireh and Mrs. John McElhatton, Town of Kewaskum.

Brenholt proposed setting up a long-range committee in January on the premise that "it is important we begin to develop coordinate plans for the district for the years ahead... or we will be moving in a variety of directions."

The committee will meet regularly to develop plans on school district objectives to include educational philosophies, plant needs, staffing, budget implications, school organization, etc. It will survey the community, teachers and students to identify district goals and determine areas of agreement between community, teachers and students. Reports are to be submitted to the board at completion of each step for recommendations and approval.

Supt. Brenholt said he received a letter from Rev. E. F. Braun of St. Kilian's parish asking for transportation of its 30 to 40 pupils to St. Matthew's parish school in Campbellsport after St. Kilian's closes at the end of this school year.

Brenholt said he wrote a letter to St. Matthew's parish outlining the steps it must take before the Kewaskum board can approve the transportation request. St. Matthew's must designate its school attendance lines, it must verify which students from St. Kilian's will be attending St. Matthew's and it must furnish a map showing where those students live.

The board approved a schedule covering administrative salaries, based on experience, amount of responsibility and the number of working days. It will go into effect July 1 and will apply to all administrators except teaching principals. The matter was discussed in executive session held prior to the open meeting.

Kewaskum to Send 200 to Scenic Solo, Ensemble Contest

The annual Scenic Moraine solo and ensemble contest will be held at Pewaukee on Saturday, March 4. Kewaskum schools are sending 200 students, the largest group to the contest.

Contest judging begins at 8 a. m. and continues until 4 p. m. with a break at noon. Vocalists and instrumentalists are judged on their performances, receiving a first to fifth place award in classes "A" to "C."

Solos and mixed ensembles, stage bands, brass and woodwind choirs provide variety in demonstrating various musical talents. Junior and senior high school students compete for first ratings in their specific classes. A first rating in class "A" will allow performers to go on to Oshkosh and capture a state medal.

The contest is open to the public.

Thirty Students Active in Jr. High Forensics Program

Forensics has become an important extracurricular activity for many Kewaskum Junior High School students.

The forensics program was initiated at the Jr. High last year when several students participated in a meet at Slinger.

This year 30 students are active in the program. They will again compete in only one contest, but against all jr. highs in the Scenic Moraine Conference.

Although the categories are not exactly the same as those in high school forensics, it is hoped that this work will help prepare students for high school competition. Five different categories are offered: Humorous Declamation, Serious Declamation, Original Oration, Interpretive Reading, and Play Acting.

Three contestants in each category and two play groups will be allowed to participate in the conference meet. To determine who these people will be, a local elimination contest will be held.

Forensics coach, Ervin Uhlman, feels this practice will provide students with good speaking experience and confidence, even if they aren't bound for higher forensics competition.

Indians Run Over Rams, Cougars for Sub-Regional Title; Sheboygan Next

FACE SHEBOYGAN FALLS IN REGIONAL FINALS FRIDAY

After a third place finish (7-7) in the Scenic Conference and a so-so season the Kewaskum Indians really turned it on and played some of their hottest basketball to win the Class A WIAA Sub-Regional title here Saturday night.

The Indians hosted Random Thursday night and easily romped over the Rams, 79-56. Kewaskum then advanced to the Sub-Regional finals against the Campbellsport of the Flyway Conference (which drew a bye in the opening round) and routed the Cougars convincingly by a one-sided 85-61 score for the title Saturday.

Kewaskum now advances to the Class A Regional finals at Sheboygan South where they will face Sheboygan Falls tonight (Friday) at 7:30. Falls reached the regional finals by shading Sheboygan South in overtime Saturday, 67-66, in the finals of their tournament. The winner of the Falls-Kewaskum contest will advance to the Oshkosh Sectional. Regional winners in Class B (4-team tournaments) in this area will advance to the West Bend Sectional next week.

In a conversation with the sports editor of the Sheboygan Press, who called this office Tuesday morning for information and statistics on the Kewaskum team, he reported Sheboygan Falls had a taller team, strong on the boards, and picked them to win over the Indians. Fond du Lac sports scribe Tom Kohl picked Falls over Kewaskum by 60-55. He also gave Mayville the nod over West Bend in the Beaver Dam tourney, 56-49.

In Kewaskum's Sub-Regional opener with Random Lake Thursday, the Rams were out of the ball game after the opening tip-off. The Indians ran the score to 12-4 and kept right on going to make it 17-8 at the quarter. It was the same story in the second period as Kewaskum upped their lead to 41-21 at halftime. At one point the Indians scored 12 straight points. The game was as well as over after three quarters with Kewaskum ahead, 60-38. Subs then took over and even they outscored the Rams to bring the final count to 79-56. Kewaskum dominated the boards by a lopsided 60-20 margin.

Glenn Eichstedt and Tom Theusch, who combined for 48 points in the season's finale against Hartland, combined for 45 against Random Lake although playing only 3 quarters of the game. Eich scored 24 and Tom 21. Chine's 17 was tops for the Rams. Although Kewaskum expected a close battle from Campbellsport for the Sub-Regional title Saturday, the outcome was almost a repeat of the Random Lake rout. In an earlier pre-season contest the Indians edged the Cougars in overtime by one point but this time out Kewaskum played the ball they are capable of and the team was red hot to bury Campbellsport by an 85-61 margin.

The only time the score was close was at the beginning when it was 4-4. After that it was all Kewaskum and no contest. The Indians led at the quarter 23-15 and 40-26 at halftime, after which they kept right on adding to their lead in every period to bring the final count to a 24-point margin, 85-61. Here again the reserves took over in the last quarter as the starters were rested with the game on ice.

Eichstedt and Theusch started out like they were going to beat Campbellsport all by themselves by combining for 20 of their team's 23 points in the first quarter. Eichstedt, in foul trouble, had to sit out much of the second half but there was no stopping Theusch. The 6-3 senior was red hot and wound up with a season's high of 36 points all by himself. He really had a night with 14 baskets in 23 attempts for a 61 per cent average and added 8 free throws. Many of his buckets were from medium range. Eichstedt ended up with 14 and Jim Gaffke 15. These three scored more points than the entire Cougar team. Theusch's 36 points could be a Kewaskum single game scoring record and gave him 57 points in the two tourney games.

The Cougars shot only 37 per cent to Kewaskum's 54. They were led by their senior ace, Dennis Pieper, who scored 22. Soph Jeff Stiefel had 13. Mitch Misko was credited with playing an outstanding defensive game against the Cougars.

And now on to the Regional finals at Sheboygan. Some 300 adult and 400 student tickets were on sale at the high school from Tuesday afternoon through Thursday. Unsold tickets must be returned Friday morning. Seating capacity at Sheboygan South is about 1,400.
