Village Board Discusses Sewage Plant Contracts

At the regular monthly session of the village board Monday night James Elder, village engineer, discussed with board members two change orders with Westra Construction of Waupun and Joseph Wittig of West Bend on work these two companies did for the village.

The board requested that Elders get three more prices to compare with the one submitted by Westra, the general contractor, before settling with Westra. The change order with Wittig was for \$395. There was a problem with the final figures submitted by him which the board wanted to have straightened out before paying the bill.

Westra was given an extension by the board until June 1 to complete work included in the contract between the village and Westra on the new sewage treatment plant, including some painting, grading and laying lawn. Due to weather conditions the work cannot be completed sooner.

Peter Albers, sewage treatment director, said the new sewage plant is ready for operation although \$4,000 in laboratory equipment is still needed to complete tests in the plant required by the state. The village already has some of the needed equipment. Village President Cyril Wietor, former Albers and Elder to check the list against what the village already has and then come up with a final list. When it is approved by the board it will go out on bids.

The board also approved a fire service contract with the Town of Kewaskum for the year. After 15 runs the contract runs on an hourly basis. Fire Chief Armin Oppertmann reported.

The Village of Kewaskum will receive \$7,500 in direct property tax relief under the Lucey budget bill submitted to the legislature this week, Senator Dale McKenna's office reported to this office Tuesday.

The money being returned to Village of Kewaskum taxpayers is part of \$21.4 million of direct property tax relief in the Lucey budget bill. Additionally \$4.2 million is being returned to taxpayers in the form of Homestead Tax relief. Business tax relief amounting to \$2.9 million is also a feature of the Lucey budget.

An additional \$6.1 million will go back to local communities in the form of indirect property tax relief. This includes funding for vocational and technical schools, county mental hospital aid and funding for community clinics and day care centers.

"These items would have to be paid for by the local property payer if it weren't for the relief provided by the Lucey budget," Senator McKenna said.

"The \$7,500 in direct property tax relief for the Village of Kewaskum is part of \$21.4 million being returned to property taxpayers, statewide and will appear as a credit on the property tax bill for the property tax accruing in 1972," according to Senator McKenna.

"This is the first of a series of steps the governor and I are undertaking to provide for comprehensive property tax relief and reform in Wisconsin," Senator McKenna said.

Fifteen Apply for Principal Position

According to Superintendent of Schools Floyd A. Brenholt, fifteen persons have applied to date for the position of principal of Kewaskum Community High School, to succeed Edward Connors, who resigned.

Brenholt said it is expected to fill the position by summer, hopefully as early as mid-June.

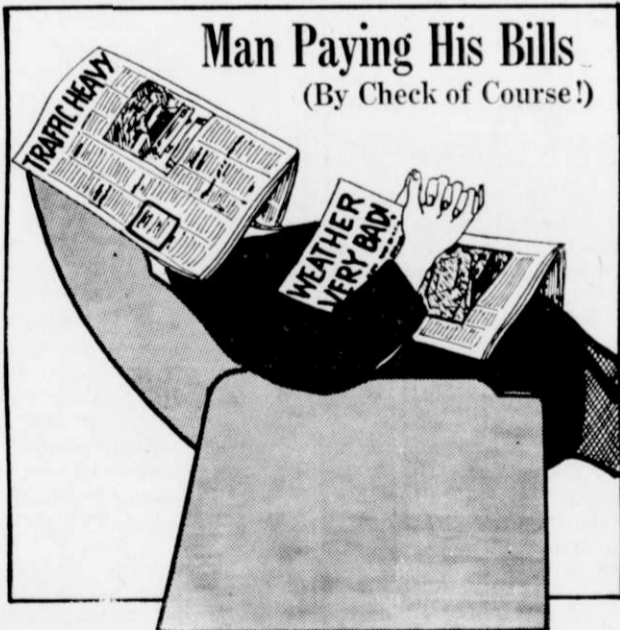

Minutes of School Board Meeting

Kewaskum Community Schools, Jt. School District No. 2, Kewaskum, Wisconsin 53040

At 8:00 p. m. on Monday, February 14, 1972, Richard L. Edwards called to order the semi-monthly meeting of the school board of Kewaskum Community Schools, Jt. School District No. 2, with all members present in the board room at the high school. Also in attendance were: Mrs. Garman, Mrs. Werhanowicz, Mrs. Ruth Held, Richard E. Zarling, Kenneth Erickson and Mrs. Elwood Berg.

Gerald Secor moved to approve the minutes of the January 31st meeting with a correction of changing the word "July" to January. Tom Gundrum seconded. Motion carried.

Tom Gundrum reported for the committee appointed to check on prices and cars, new and used, for a possible purchase of a car for district staff travel. After discussion, it was agreed to have Mr. Brenholt work up specifications for bidding and submit them to Tom Gundrum and Gerald Zimmel for approval before publishing.

Tom Gundrum moved to approve the signing of the Schutte-Mochon contract for architectural fees on the proposed building addition at the high school. Gerald Secor seconded. Motion carried.

Board members submitted the following 9 names of people expressing their interest in serving on a citizen's long range planning committee: Mrs. John Hubbel, Mr. Ralph Eisenmann, Mr. Byron Gessner, Mr. Ken Ramthun, Mr. Leander Kempf, Mr. Wayne Rempel, Mr. Mark Rodenkirch, Mr. Alois Bremser, and Mrs. John McElhatton. Discussion was held and the board decided to table this item until the next meeting with possibly having names for representation from the Town of Wayne available at that time.

Mr. Brenholt mentioned the possibility of converting the present district administrative office space at the high school into a science classroom for next year, and presented a cost quoted for renting office space in the Savings and Loan Building on Main Street. The board asked Mr. Brenholt to explore this matter further.

Gerald Secor moved and John

Jadro seconded to approve the request to have the C.E.S.A. computer build the scheduling of students for the split shift at an approximate cost of 50c per student, or approximately \$350.00. Motion carried.

John Jadro reported the following ten persons had declared themselves as candidates for school board at the spring election to be held 4/4/72 as of February 14, 1972: Gerald Secor, Ernest Howell, Byron Gessner, Joseph Sekeres, James Oelhafen, Orville Kern, Joseph Staehler, Dr. Charles Ogi, Robert Zarling and Mrs. Shelia Parvin. Mr. Brenholt informed the board that the law does not require a primary election and that the local school board has the authority to decide whether or not to hold one. If the primary were held voting must take place in each of the nine polling places just as for the spring election and an estimated cost of \$1,500 would be involved. After discussion, Tom Gundrum moved and Gerald Secor seconded not to hold a primary election prior to the spring election of school board members. Motion carried. Mrs. Berg mentioned that the League of Women Voters would hold a forum.

Mr. Zarling presented information relative to the purchase of a Mini-I-Matic floor scrubbing machine demonstrator and requested board approval to buy the machine from the Sprenger & Co. of Milwaukee with a trade-in of their six year old Clarke machine at a cost of \$560.00. Gerald Zimmel moved to approve such purchase. John Jadro seconded. Motion carried.

Mrs. Werhanowicz questioned the method used for appraisal of school buses. Mr. Brenholt explained that a Mr. Jack Doherty had been contracted for this service and that he would follow-up on this matter.

Mrs. Garman and Mrs. Werhanowicz mentioned mechanical defects in their buses and that they have difficulty in having the necessary repairs made. The board and administration agreed that written complaints they receive from bus drivers would be investigated.

Allen Tessar moved and John Jadro seconded to approve \$83,677.40 for payment of payroll, invoices and debt service. Motion carried.

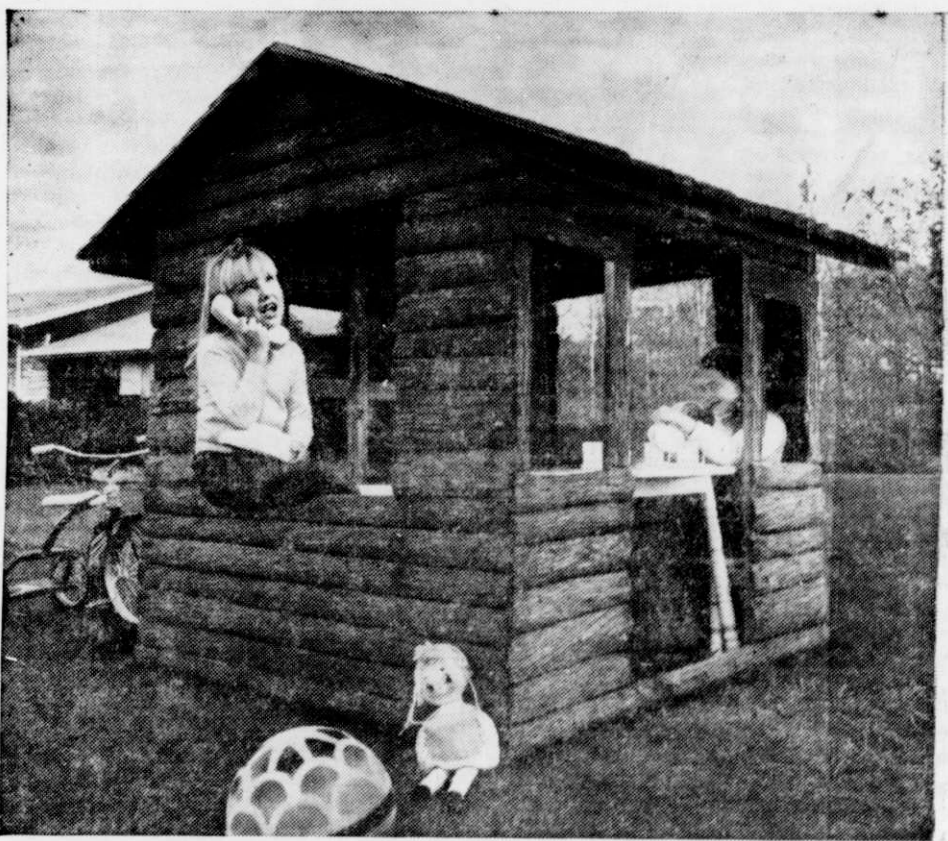

Indians Upset Sheb. Falls for Regional Title, Move on to Oshkosh Sectional

Face Tough Ripon (20-1) in Tourney Opener Tonight

Kewaskum's amazing, tournament-happy Indians pulled one of the major upsets in WIAA Class A Regional Tournament play Friday night in the spacious Sheboygan South gym when they jolted favored Sheboygan Falls, 83-76, for the Regional championship.

Kewaskum, which has been a Cinderella team in winning the Sub-Regional and Regional titles, now moves on to the Oshkosh Sectional this weekend. The Class A Sectional is the last step before going to the State Tournament. Here all the still undefeated, surviving teams are really tough with outstanding records and where "the men are separated from the boys." And most of them are bigger schools.

If you think we're kidding look at the records of the other schools which will be competing against Kewaskum in the Sectional. They are Ripon (20-1), Neenah (19-2) and Mayville (20-1). Kewaskum will be a dark horse entry, going into the meet with the poorest record, a modest 13-8 mark for the season. But the surprising Indians have been red hot in tournament action to date.

Kewaskum is one of only 32 Class A teams in the entire state left in the Sectional meets. The winners in the eight Sectionals this weekend at Beloit, Eau Claire, Green Bay, Madison, Marshfield, Oshkosh, Racine and Whitefish Bay go on to the State Tournament at Madison the next weekend. All of the State Meet games will be televised and broadcast. There are 16 schools left in Class B Sectionals which for the first time this year are not competing with the larger schools.

Coach Mike Williams and his boys were awarded a large trophy for winning the Regional championship at Sheboygan. A huge crowd of Kewaskum fans followed their Indians to Sheboygan and cheered loudly for their favorites. Incidentally it was Coach Williams' birthday and he couldn't have received a better birthday present.

While the Indians were knocking off Sheboygan Falls to win the Regional title, other schools in the Oshkosh Sectional advanced there as follows: Ripon defeated Fond du Lac at Ripon, 63-52; Mayville beat West Bend West at Beaver Dam, 60-48, and Neenah defeated Appleton West at Appleton, 75-69. Neenah was a runner-up in the State Tournament last year.

The rejuvenated Indians look like a different team since entering tournament competition, in which they blasted Random Lake, 79-56, and Campbellsport, 85-61, in the Sub-Regional here and then jolted Sheboygan Falls at Sheboygan South. After finishing in third place with a mediocre 7-7 mark in the Scenic Moraine Conference, they have really come alive. They have exhibited their best basketball of the season in the tournaments and easily played their top game against Falls. They have played like a team possessed with their lives depending on it. Their shooting has been sensational, they have been stealing the ball and causing turnovers, have been passing right on the mark

and streaking down the floor, have been hitting the boards hard and have been very quick. Now if they can only continue this pace and the bubble doesn't burst. However, they have gone much further already than expected.

All of the sports writers of the larger newspapers in the area picked Falls to beat Kewaskum because of their glossy 18-2 record, their Packerland Conference championship, and by virtue of their victories over Plymouth and Sheboygan South in taking the Regional title. Two Falls cagers had been named to the Packerland All-Conference team and a third was named to the third team. Forward Paul Phippen was a unanimous choice. He was the number two scorer in the league. Center Wayne Wolske was also chosen on the team and junior forward Kirk Heinig was picked on the third team.

Against Falls the Indians just couldn't miss. They shot a spectacular 62 per cent from the field and many of their shots were from well out. Before that Kewaskum tuned up for the Falls Falcons by shooting a hot 55, 52 and 55 per cent in its three previous starts. Like Coach Williams said, "You don't have to be tall and get the rebounds when you shoot like that." The torrid Indians finished with 33 rebounds in 54 tries.

The much taller Falcons had two 6-foot-3 players and another 6-foot-5 performer in their front line. The Indians gave away even more inches after the first few minutes of the game. Tom Theusch, their 6-foot-3 center and second high scorer, who scored a career high 36 points against Campbellsport the week before, injured his foot on a rebounding play and left the game and was through for the night. Still Kewaskum won without the ace center. Reserve Jim Kern replaced him and really filled the breach as a "super-sub." Only 5-foot-11 he guarded Falls' Wolske, a 6-foot-5 frontliner, and did a good job besides scoring 14 points himself.

mula in beating the Falcons. They sank their shots. Kewaskum trailed by one point after a close first half, 38-37. However, they opened up a 13-point lead in the third quarter and were never again headed. The Falcons shaved the advantage to four points at one point in the 4th period but Kewaskum had another hot spurt to nail down a 7-point victory—and certainly their biggest of the season.

Mitch Misko, who hit 7 out of 10 shots from the floor, and Craig Carr had 18 and 19 points, respectively, to lead the winners. Glenn Eichstedt contributed 16 and Jim Gaffke 10. Wolske had 23 and Phippen 20 for the losers.

The Indians iced the win with a 29-19 third quarter onslaught. At one point they outscored Falls 12-2 to pull away. They converted a 49-49 tie into a 61-51 advantage. A 3-point play by Gaffke just as the quarter ended hiked the lead to 66-57.

From our viewpoint the officials didn't do Kewaskum any favors either and the jeering from the Falls cheering section on free throws was unsportsmanlike.

For most high school teams in the state the season has ended but for Kewaskum its on to the Sectional in the new Oshkosh University fieldhouse.
