Oelhafen, Tessar, Ogi Elected As School Board Members; Incumbents Retain Village Trustee Positions

NEAR RECORD VOTE CAST HERE: McGOVERN WINNER

In the Spring Election Tuesday for school board members, one incumbent was re-elected, another was defeated, and two newcomers were elected to the board. All three village trustee incumbents were re-elected.

Voting was surprisingly heavy throughout the school district and in the village. In fact in Kewaskum Community Schools Joint District No. 2 a record-breaking number of voters turned out for a school-related issue. The previous high voter turnout in the school district was in the 1971 spring election, when 2,041 voters cast ballots to defeat a referendum calling for school building additions. There were 2,471 voters Tuesday. There was also a near record turnout in the village, where 729 votes, about 70%, were recorded. The record is 770.

Newcomers James D. Oelhafen and Dr. Charles Ogi were elected and Allen Tessar was re-elected to three-year terms on the board of education. These three winners were far ahead of the rest of the field. One other incumbent, Gerald Secor, was beaten, coming in sixth. A third incumbent, Jack Jadro, did not seek re-election to the 7-member board.

Among the 11 candidates for the 3 positions, Ogi polled the largest number of votes—1,191, followed by Tessar, 1,130; Oelhafen, 804; Joseph Staehler, 684; Byron Gessner, 627; Robert Zarling, 600; Secor, 598; Orville Kern, 524; Joseph Sekeres, 274; Mrs. Sheila Parvin, 206; E. Earl Howell, 182.

In the village only balloting, Tessar and Ogi polled the most votes, 425 and 405 respectively but the trend changed among the rest of the candidates. Zarling was third with 278, followed by Secor, 207; Oelhafen 178; Staehler, 167; Kern, 127; Gessner, 115; Parvin, 69; Howell, 51; Sekeres, 23.

In the Town of Kewaskum, where 342 votes were cast, Ogi, Tessar and Oelhafen also led in the school board member voting. Ogi was high with 189, Tessar 153, Oelhafen 123, Staehler 117, Zarling 90, Gessner 85, Secor 84, Kern 76, Parvin 30, Sekeres 20, Howell 11.

In the race for village trustees, all three incumbents were re-elected from a field of 7 candidates. They are Raynor Herriges, Elmer Yoost and Gregor Nigh. The vote was Herriges 482, Yoost 391, Nigh 385, Daniel Schmidt 235, Richard Zarling 233, Robert Staehler 227, Ayvin Wiesner 86.

Washington County supervisor Charles Miller of District 10 which includes the Village of Kewaskum was re-elected without opposition. He polled 654 votes in the village. Supervisor John Oelhafen of District 9 which includes the Town of Wayne and Kewaskum was also re-elected for a two-year term. He defeated Carl Meilahn, supervisor of the Town of Kewaskum by a vote of 424 to 301.

In the Presidential Preference balloting, village voters followed the trend in the county and state

by favoring George S. McGovern on the Democratic ticket. McGovern led with 181 votes, trailed by George Wallace with 112, Hubert H. Humphrey 70, Henry M. Jackson 47, John V. Lindsay 38, Edmund S. Muskie 36, Eugene J. McCarthy 13, Patsy T. Mink 2, Shirley Chisholm 1. On the Republican ticket President Richard Nixon easily won. He received 206 votes and Paul McCloskey 3.

Judge J. Tom Merriam was elected to his second full term in Branch 1, Washington Co. Court, without opposition. He polled 18,231 votes in the county and 646 in this village.

All four proposed amendments to the Constitution were approved on the basis of unofficial returns on the referendum ballot. The "Yes" votes also won out on all four questions in the village. Locally the closest vote was on No 1—a proposition to allow more than one form of county government. The vote was 273 "Yes" and 265 "No." On the proposal to allow counties to abolish the office of coroner and replace it with a medical examiner, the vote was 401 "Yes" and 179 "No." On the one to allow public schools to rent buildings to civic, religious or charitable organizations, the vote was 424 "Yes" and 137 "No." On the question of whether to allow public schools to release students for religious instruction during school hours, the vote was 311 "Yes" and 298 "No."

UW Farm-Industry Course Graduates

One of the early spring graduations took place at the University of Wisconsin-Madison with 116 farm and industry short course students taking part in the ceremonies on Saturday, March 11. Graduation exercises were held in the Stock Pavilion on the Madison campus.

Graduates from this area included David Dorn of R. 2, Kewaskum, Gordon Darmody of R. 1, Allenton, and Byron Gessner of R. 1, Kewaskum.

Kewaskum firemen answered a call at 1:25 a. m. Friday when a blaze broke out at the Harold Lehnerz residence on Salisbury Road south of CTH H.

According to Capt. Rick Boden of the fire department, the fire apparently started from a faulty space heater in the dining room area. Lehnerz, who was asleep upstairs, was able to get out of the house, even though it was filled with smoke.

Firemen had to wear smoke masks to enter the smoke-filled dwelling and worked about two hours to extinguish the blaze.

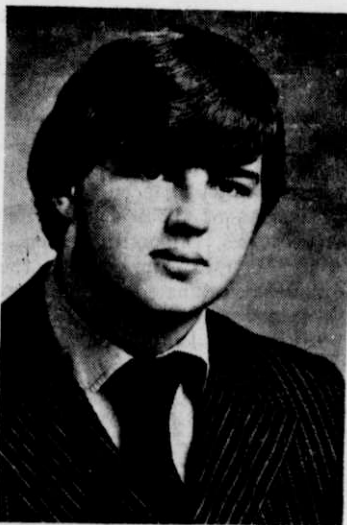

Kim Rodenkirch Signs Football Tender with UW

FIRST ATHLETE IN KHS HISTORY TO GET TENDER



Kewaskum High School's outstanding tackle, 6 ft. 2 in. and 235 pound Kim Rodenkirch, has signed a football tender with the University of Wisconsin Badgers at Madison. Kim, a senior, is the first athlete in the school's history to receive a tender at UW.

Rodenkirch became the 29th high school player to sign a football tender for the University of Wisconsin thus far, many of them being out-of-staters. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Tom Rodenkirch of R. 2, Kewaskum, and his father also played football for Kewaskum. His mother is the former Allyn Ramthun. Tom will enroll at UW in August.

Big Kim has been a three-year starter at offensive tackle for the Kewaskum Indians and was also the captain of the varsity team this fall. Twice he was named to the Scenic Moraine All-Conference first team and this year he was a unanimous choice on the team in a field of strong tackles.

Kim's athletic ability is not only confined to football. He was a two-year Scenic Moraine wrestling champion in the heavyweight division and this year made it all the way to the state meet at Madison. He is also a shot-putter on the track squad.

During his three years on the football varsity, Kewaskum had an overall record of 19 wins, 5 losses and 1 tie, including a 6-1-1, a 7-2 and a 6-2 season. In those three years Rodenkirch never missed a game because of an injury. In his junior year he was a two way performer for the Indians but this last year he concentrated on offense. That he was an outstanding blocker was proven by the fact that the Indians have led the Scenic Moraine in rushing the past three years straight.

Kewaskum coach Joe Harlow describes Rodenkirch as "a leader and a winner. We could always count on him. He's the kind of player who gives it everything he's got and that type of enthusiasm is catching." Harlow said, "Most people watch the backs when they watch a football game. I got a kick out of watching Rodenkirch—sometimes he had his man 15 yards out of the play."

Board Approves Scouts Cleaning Up Village Park

PLAN FOR SUMMER SWIM INSTRUCTION PROGRAM

Members of the Village Board, meeting here in regular session Monday night, gave their approval to an offer from the Kewaskum Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts to clean up the village park on April 29.

Scouts will come armed with rakes at 9 a. m. and the village will furnish a working foreman and two trucks. Board member O. E. Behnke said he was told by a Scout leader that the project will involve between 50 and 60 Girl Scouts and 30 to 35 Boy Scouts, all between the ages of 11 and 15. "This should save us some money," said Behnke.

John Breaker appeared and said he would like to get started on plans for the summer swimming instruction program that he will again be in charge of. He said he would like to shift swimming lessons from morning to afternoon hours to avoid conflicts with summer school classes and for the reason that the water is too cool in the morning. These have been the most common complaints, he noted. Breaker also requested a boat.

It was pointed out among board members that afternoon swimming lessons would conflict with the junior baseball program. He was told to work out the swimming program with Tom Larsen who will be in full charge of the summer recreation program and Larsen will report back to the board.

The board moved to advertise for bids for curb and gutter for Brooklane Drive, south of Clinton St., and for Braatz Drive and North Avenue. These are the only remaining sections of Roseland Heights without curb and gutter.

A petition from Roman Fellenz for curb and gutter alongside his home along Werner Drive was temporarily tabled until board members take a look at the street. It was the feeling that curb and gutter will be needed on both sides of the street to assure proper drainage.

Behnke reported he received a complaint from a resident on the west side of Kewaskum that bullets from rifles used in target practice in adjacent areas in the Town of Kewaskum came into the area where he lives over the weekend. The matter was referred to Police Chief Donald Hlavaty. Hlavaty was also requested to ask owners of junked cars parked within the village limits to remove them in compliance with a village ordinance.

(Continued from page 1) agreement with Tom Schumacher of Milwaukee for an investigation of any possible erroneously allocated income taxes under Wisconsin's shared tax plan. Taxes might have been erroneously allocated to another municipality if a taxpayer lived in Kewaskum for part of a year. The village is entitled to its proportionate share of those shared taxes.

The village commissioner was instructed to write the Chicago and North Western Railway Co. asking that it keep its crossings in the village in repair. Village employes Armin Oppermann and Edward Brandt were given permission to attend the Fire and Building Inspectors' Conference in Milwaukee.

7 FFA Members Receive Corn Growing Awards

Seven Kewaskum F. F. A. members attended a DeKalb corn awards banquet in Beaver Dam. This banquet was to honor vo-ag students with DeKalb corn projects who made the best record on a corn growing analysis sheet supplied by DeKalb. The F.F.A. members in attendance were: Richard McKee, Harold Ramthun, James Hawig, Larry Gossner, Fred Berres, Mark Ruplinger and Terry Schaub.

In contrast to most corn contests which are based on yield checked on a spot basis, the DeKalb project emphasizes costs, fertilizing, population and recognition of corn enemies. The yield is computed, but project recognition is not based on top yield, but yield calculation is a factor in the top score.

Top students from Kewaskum on total score were Richard McKee, Mark Ruplinger, and James Hawig with a score of 100. They each received a special wall plaque. Other boys received pins and certificates for adequate records.

According to Roy Esser, local vo-ag instructor, each vocational agricultural student plants a variety of DeKalb corn. He then

compares it to another hybrid by keeping records of all field operations and costs. After harvest the young farmers determine what it costs them from \$0.95 to \$0.50 per bushel.

The DeKalb corn project includes over 1,000 schools in the top corn growing states. It has been in operation for quite a few years.

The educational advantage of this program is that it stresses records rather than yield.

Club to Hear Ecology Discussed

Members of the Kewaskum Woman's Club will hear a discussion on ecology when they meet at 2 p. m. Saturday in the lounge of Peace Church. The speaker will be Richard Cleek, instructor of cultural geography at the University of Wisconsin, Washington County Campus. Construction of Hospital to Get Underway April 10

The Board of Directors of St. Joseph's Community Hospital, West Bend, at its meeting on March 27 set the date of Monday April 10, 11 a. m. for the official ground breaking event.

At this same meeting, the Board of Directors, meeting jointly with the Building Committee and the architects, awarded contracts as follows:

General: Oliver Construction Company, Oconomowoc, at \$1,924,770.

Mechanical: (Heating, Ventilating, Air Conditioning & Plumbing): Superior-Kuetemeyer, Milwaukee, at \$1,386,239.

Electrical: Burekhardt Electric Company, West Bend, at \$533,546.

Food Service Equipment: Kitchen-Wear, Inc., Wauwatosa, at \$58,912.

Hospital Casework: St. Charles Mfg. Co., St. Charles, Ill., at \$59,500.

Further action by the board was a rejection of all bids for medical equipment with instructions to be rebid by all of the prequalified contractors.

The Board of Directors deferred action on awarding contracts for laundry equipment, pneumatic tube system, and elevator-dumbwaiter. All bids concerning these facilities are still undergoing investigation by the Building Committee and architects. There is a 45 day bid period and the Board of Directors is expected to award these contracts at their April 24 meeting.

The actual contract award figures do not directly compare with the low figures which were read at the open bid hearing on Tuesday, March 14. It should be noted that the bids read publicly included a number of alternates in addition to the basic prime

bids. Since March 14, the architects, with representatives of the Building Committee, spent a great deal of time evaluating alternates with the result that both deletions and additions were made to the base bid.

It was pointed out to the Board of Directors by the Building Committee and architects, that none of the recommended changes affect the quality of the building, the efficiency of design, nor the health care program of the hospital.

When evaluating and reviewing the recommendations of the Building Committee and the architects, the Board of Directors was aware of the fact that since the time when the estimated figures used in all of the publicity for the St. Joseph's Community Hospital Expansion and Development Campaign were developed, that a number of vital improvements and alterations had to be considered. The major improvements and alterations are:

1. Drive-through ambulance entrance.
2. Additional sprinkler systems required by city code.
3. Additional electrical equipment due to a new 1971 national electrical code.
4. The decentralized nursing concept with additional communications equipment.
5. Expansion space at lobby level.

Norman A. Schowalter, president and chairman of the Board of Directors, and Robert T. Rofs, chairman of the Building Committee, made this statement to the board, "It is apparent that the total actual construction costs will be above the original projected estimate. None of the changes made which increase or decrease

the cost were the result of changing the health care program or size of the project."

The Board of Directors at the March 27 meeting also approved the signing of a letter of intent with B. C. Ziegler & Company for the financing of St. Joseph's Community Hospital Expansion and Development Program at an amount not to exceed \$2,500,000. It is hoped that the actual borrowing which, it is estimated, will take place during the latter part of 1973 will not need to reach this amount.

Immediately following the ground breaking, representatives of all of the contractors who have been given a letter of intent or a signed contract will join the board and the various committees of the board for a noon luncheon. The board, Building Committee and contractors will then meet in the hospital to lay plans for a unified program of construction hoping to complete the project in less than the two year allotted time schedule.

3. Change order number 1 for the purchase of additional laboratory equipment was tabled pending further information.

and Mrs. Jan Rosenthal discussed with the Board tentative plans for the subdivision of Lot 5, Block 44.

The contract for Fire Department services to the Town of Kewaskum for the year 1972 was approved upon motion by Trustee Miller, seconded by Trustee Yoost and duly carried.

The request of William Edwards for the installation of curb, gutter and sidewalk at his Roseland Drive property was referred to committee.

Mr. Thomas Schumacher of Milwaukee explained to the Board the services he can render to communities in recovering State Shared Taxes erroneously allocated to another community.

Thomas Larsen discussed with the Board his proposal for the conduct of the summer recreation program. Upon motion by Trustee Miller, seconded by Trustee Heriges and duly carried, Mr. Larsen was retained as summer recreation director and supervisor of swim instructors and life guards at a salary of \$150.00 per week.
