Village Board Opens Bids for New Truck Chassis for Fire Department

INTERVIEWS LEGAL FIRMS FOR UPDATING ORDINANCES

Bids were opened here Monday night for a 1972 model tilt cab truck chassis, a replacement item for a water tanker used by the Kewaskum Volunteer Fire Department. The board also conducted interviews with two legal firms for revising and updating village ordinances and with a firm which specializes in cleaning and renovating water towers.

All of the business was part of the organizational meeting following the Spring election. It was conducted by Village President C. N. Wieter. Eight bids were received, ranging from \$6,453.64 to \$7,490. They will be turned over for study and recommendation to a fire department committee of Fire Chief Armin Oppermann, Lee Honeck, Richard Boden, Robert Ours, Carl Firme and Clayton Stautz.

Wieter announced that inasmuch as there were no changes of personnel on the board as a result of the Spring election, his appointments of 1971 will stand, as follows: Administrative: Elmer Yoost, Raynor Herriges, Alfred Kral, Gregor Nigh. Public Works: Charles Miller, Yoost, Orval Behnke, Nigh. Protection and Public Service: Herriges, Kral, Miller. Public Service: Behnke, Kral and Nigh.

First of the legal firms to be interviewed was Robert Sundby, president of the Municipal Ordinance Service, Madison. For a cost of between \$2,200 and \$2,500 he will revise the ordinances and re-print them. For an additional fee of between \$100 and \$200 per year, exclusive of printing, he will provide an "up-keep" service, incorporating changes that will occur from time to time.

Also incorporated into the new printing will be the new village building code adopted in 1971 and the zoning ordinance, now under consideration. Sundby said he will send a formal contract for the board's consideration.

Representing the law firm of O'Meara and O'Meara of West Bend was Philip Eckert. For a fee of between \$2,000 and \$3,000 he said his firm will update the ordinances but the village would have to print its own ordinance books. The board took no action on either proposal.

A representative of Water Tower Service, Columbus, Ohio said his firm will clean and re-line the interior and paint the exterior of the village water tower for \$1,350. But before the board makes its decision on whether it wants the work done, his firm will come in with a van and via closed circuit television, board members will be able to see exactly what condition the interior of the tower is in, after the water level is brought down. That service is free, he said. Any major repairs, such as deep pitting, would be extra. The board agreed to the free television inspection.

A building permit for a one-family dwelling at Brooklane and Hillside Drive was approved for Leroy Zipperer, West Bend.

Firemen Attend Badger Banquet

Eighteen members of the Kewaskum Fire Department attended the annual banquet of the Badger Firemen's Association held Sunday evening in the Walnut Room of Holy Angels Parish in West Bend.

Chief Armin Oppermann and two delegates represented the local department at the annual spring meeting in the afternoon and were joined by the other firemen for the 6 p. m. banquet, which was preceded by a cocktail hour. A very delicious chicken and beef dinner was served by the ladies of Holy Angels.

Several hundred firemen from the various departments of the Badger Association attended the banquet. Cong. Glenn Davis was guest speaker and Mayor Ralph "Shorts" Schoenhaar welcomed the visiting firemen. Trophies and prize money won in the Association's Bowling Tournament held earlier this year were distributed. Kewaskum firemen didn't do so "hot" winning only \$15.

The institute was organized in 1947 to serve city clerks, secretaries and recorders. In 1970 IIMC launched its formal certification program to help clerks to improve their job performance and to gain added recognition as valued administrators in local government.

Certification signifies the clerk who meets high standards for knowledge, skills, experience and ethics. A CMC is a qualified municipal clerk who is qualified to meet the challenges of a job that is becoming more and more complex.

Martin is among the first clerks in the United States and Canada to be so designated.

Crash Fatal To Walter C. Frauenheim

A 79 year old West Bend man, Walter C. Frauenheim, of 632 Wolcott St., a former resident of the Town of Kewaskum, was fatally injured in a two car crash on U.S. Hwy. 41 just north of State Hwy. 28 in the Town of Wayne west of Kewaskum at 3:40 p. m. Saturday.

The traffic death was the fourth of the year recorded in Washington County.

Frauenheim was pronounced dead at the scene. He suffered head, chest and other internal injuries, County Coroner Robert Boltz reported.

The collision occurred as Frauenheim left a service station on the east side of the highway and traveled west across Hwy. 41. His auto was struck by a northbound auto operated by Frederick Schuetze, 24, of Mequon. Schuetze was removed to St. Joseph's Community Hospital, West Bend. He reportedly suffered broken ribs and a lacerated chin.

Frauenheim was born June 27, 1893 in the Town of Farmington. On June 27, 1915 he married Leona Backhaus in Kewaskum. After their marriage, the couple settled on a farm in the Town of Kewaskum. Since 1945 he had been a resident of West Bend and was employed by the Cooley Manufacturing Co. until his retirement in 1955. Mrs. Frauenheim died in June 1959. On Oct. 26, 1961 he married Rose Selk Forrest, who survives him.

Further surviving are a daughter, Elaine (Mrs. Joseph Schnepf) of Shawano, three grandchildren, two great-grandchildren and a sister, Mrs. Ella Klein of Waubesa. A brother preceded him in death.

Funeral services were held Wednesday at 2 p. m. at St. Paul's United Church of Christ, Silver Creek. The Rev. Elmer Becker officiated and interment was in the parish cemetery. Visitation was at the Schindler Funeral Home, West Bend, after 2 p. m. Tuesday until 11 a. m. Wednesday and from noon until the hour of services on the church.

Bids Opened For Addition To High School

Bids for an 8,000 square foot addition to the high school were opened here Monday night. Jack Fieweger of the architectural firm of Schutte-Moehon, Inc., presided at the opening which took place preceding a meeting of the Board of Education.

In January, after receiving a cost estimate of \$154,407 from the architects, the school board authorized borrowing \$150,000 to finance the project.

Fieweger said it would be difficult to analyze the bids on the spot. "Give us a week to study them and we will meet with you next Monday to award the contracts," he said.

There were numerous bids in each category except for general construction. It had only one bid.

During the business session, the April 4 school board election was discussed. Board member Richard Theusch wanted to know if the mistakes were "nailed down" so they won't happen again? Supt. Floyd Brenholt answered, "I hope so."

One of the mistakes occurred in the printing of the ballots. After they were distributed to the various town clerks they were found to be improperly printed because the title "Dr" was used before Charles Ogi's name and because "Earl" was used as a nickname in Ernest "Earl" Howell's name. By law, titles of respect or nicknames may not be used.

These ballots were recalled from the various town clerks but by that time, some had been given out to absentee voters. Theusch wanted to know if votes cast on these illegal ballots were counted along with the other votes. He was told they were not counted in the Town of Farmington but it is not known if they were counted in the other polling places.

Board Chairman Richard L. Edwards commented that "we all feel it was an unfortunate mistake" but added that these votes did not affect the outcome of the election.

Board member-elect Dr. Ogi asked Brenholt who called the matter of the illegal ballot to his attention. Brenholt said Village Commissioner William Hillman called him on March 27 and Brenholt immediately called Roger McKenna, attorney for the district.

Mrs. Charles Trapp, a Town of Scott elector charged that the election "was illegal all the way around." She said the lottery for placement of names on the ballot was drawn at 5:30 p. m. instead of at 8 p. m. as stated in state law; the official facsimile of the ballot was not published twice legally in any paper; and that between the time the first printing of ballots were recalled and new ones were distributed to clerks, there were two days when no absentee ballots were available at all.

Mrs. Trapp asked who will be paying for the second printing. Brenholt said he did not know. Board member Gerald Secor said no doubt the district will.

Brenholt reminded Mrs. Trapp (Continued on page 2)

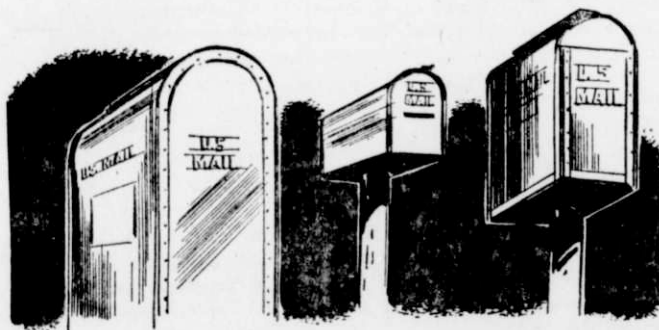

'Farmer Vic' Is Jr. Woman's Club Guest Speaker

"We Interrupt Life to Introduce Living" was presented by guest speaker, Victor Hellman, president of the foundation and executive director of "The Ranch" in Menomonee Falls at the March 9 meeting of the Kewaskum Jr. Woman's Club.

"The Ranch" is a private rehabilitation center for physically and mentally retarded young adults in Menomonee Falls (intersection of Hwy. 74 and Maple Rd.).

Hellman is better known to youngsters as "Farmer Vic" of WTMJ-TV's "Kids Klub." Hellman, a man of true dedication, went on to explain how and why "The Ranch" became a reality.

Mr. and Mrs. Hellman's first child, David, was born mentally retarded. "The Good Lord took him at age 6." So in 1950 he began working to build a place in which retarded young adults could learn, working with animals and tools. He realized these people needed to be understood and had the right to life.

"The Ranch" presently has 72 boys, ranging in age from 14-42. They are bused in Monday through Friday from 8:30 - 3:30 and come from many areas. "The Ranch" is open to the public seven days a week.

The staff is mostly craftsmen, as opposed to educators; education is on a "show and tell" basis. The boys are taught neatness, how to

speak, to follow directions, etc. so they can go out and find a place in society.

"Who said a retarder can't make it?" was one of his voiced remarks and he then related instances of success stories in which "his boys" went out to seek employment or served in the armed forces. . . these boys are still on the job or have served their time in Vietnam.

"Yes, the girls are coming," said Hellman. "The Ranch" will start sponsoring a girls' program. Their duty will be the hot lunch program and will offer sewing, a beauty parlor, etc.

He also mentioned plans for a chapel to be built at "The Ranch" this spring.

At places like "The Ranch," Threshold and others, these boys find out for the first time in their lives "they ARE important."

At the conclusion of his program, Hellman was presented a \$50 donation from the club for "The Ranch."

Club members are planning a spring outing to "The Ranch" sometime in May to see just how this fantastic program relates to these young people.

The School Board of Kewaskum Community Schools, Jt. School District No. 2, met in executive session in the board room of the high school from 8 - 8:30 p. m. on Monday, February 28, 1972, with all members in attendance.

At 8:35 p. m. Richard L. Edwards called the regular semi-monthly meeting of the School Board to order. Attendance included: C. H. Johnson, J. R. C. Baumann, Robert Zarling, Kenneth Erickson and a representative of the League of Women Voters.

Allen Tessar moved and Tom Gundrum seconded to approve the minutes of the February 14, 1972 meeting as printed. Motion carried.

Allen Tessar moved that the board deny payment on the pay deduction grievance filed by a teacher for the 1/2 day spent at court as a result of his summer employment, as discussed in executive session. Tom Gundrum seconded. Motion carried.

Mr. Brenholt reported the board had received a letter from Father Braun of the St. Killian parish requesting transportation of their children to St. Matthew's school at Campbellsport as of the 1972-73 school year, and that Mr. Erickson had a list of the students to be transported and a map showing the residency of those students. The board will act officially on this request as soon as the necessary information is received.

The names of Stanley Woolman and Al Ciha were submitted for the Long Range Planning Committee. The board established that in addition to a teacher and a student yet to be chosen, the following persons (picking one name from each board member's list submitted) serve on the committee: Mrs. John Hubbell, Mr. Ralph Eisenmann, Mr. Alois Bremser, Mr. Wayne Remmel, Mr. Lee Kempf, Mr. Stanley Woolman, and Mr. Al Ciha.
