School Board Accepts Bids Totaling \$132,630 for Addition to High School

The board of education accepted bids totaling \$132,630.80 for constructing an 8,000 square foot addition to the high school Monday night. Architects fees of \$15,915.70 bring the sum total of the project to \$148,546.50. The board authorized borrowing \$150,000 in January to finance the project.

Monday night's meeting was called to hear an analysis of the bids which were opened April 10. Appearing at the meeting were Jack Fieweger and Ray Juerrison of the architectural firm of Schutte-Mochon, Inc.

The bids approved were the low bids in each category under the construction manager bidding approach. In this type of bidding, Schutte-Mochon will act as general contractor with 11 different firms doing the work under separate bids. Bids were also taken using the conventional general contractor approach, but these totals were about \$11,000 higher.

The board chose to accept an alternate bid on the type of insulated wall panels and was able to cut \$4,130 from that part of the construction costs. The panels are removable and come pre-finished with an exterior finish of "weathering steel." Through a chemical action in the metal, the exterior becomes oxidized; but it was pointed out that the oxidation is controlled after a certain point in the process.

The bids accepted include Rosenthal Construction Co., site work, excavating and concrete work, \$26,285; Wm. F. Eichfeld & Sons, steel joists, miscellaneous and structural steel, \$16,998; Wisconsin Bridge and Iron, insulated metal wall panels, \$21,150; Rosenthal Construction Co., carpentry, \$9,995; Carroll W. Haug and Sons, sheet metal and roofing, \$5,980; Sullivan Bros., Inc., acoustical work, \$2,379; H. J. Martin, resilient flooring, \$268; H. C. Prange Co., carpeting, \$6,166.80; Helmuth Spies, painting, \$692; Joseph Wittig Co., plumbing work, \$3,989; Regali Co., Inc., heating and ventilating work, \$23,049; and Drickson Electric, electrical work, \$15,679.

Board member Gerald Zimmer questioned whether "we will have enough on the job supervision" under the construction manager approach. Fieweger said, "I expect to be here three times a week. I will set up progress charts and see that they are adhered to. It is the type of job that should move quickly."

Fortunately, the carpentry and masonry are "under one hand," Fieweger added. Asked if he thought there might be extra costs, Fieweger said, "I can't see where there would be any extra costs." Juerrison said four fire extinguishers required by the industrial commission will be needed. These will cost about \$150 total.

This addition is to be completed by the time school opens in August. It will be needed to house students when all are present in a split-shift attendance plan that goes into effect next school year.

Minutes of School Board Meeting

The school board members of the Kewaskum Community Schools, Jt. School District No. 2, met at 7:30 P. M. to tour the Industrial Arts facilities at the high school on Monday, March 13, 1972.

DOG ORDINANCE

It shall be unlawful for any person who is the owner, or in possession of, or charged with having the care of any dog, to permit the same to run at large beyond the confines of the owners premises of another in the Town of Auburn; unless the dog is accompanied by and under the control of such person, and unless express permission therefor, shall have been given by such property owner or occupant.

It shall be unlawful for any person to keep or harbor within the limits of the township any dog which frequently or habitually barks, yells, or howls.

Any person violating any provisions of this ordinance shall be subject to a forfeiture of not less than one dollar (\$1.00) nor more than twenty-five (\$25.00). Each day that the provisions of this ordinance or any part thereof or violated shall be and constitute a separate offense hereunder.

This ordinance was passed and adopted on the 17th day of August, 1963 by the Town Board, Town of Auburn, Fond du Lac County, State of Wisconsin.
