## KHS Wins Six 'A' Scouts to Plant Ratings in State Trees, Clean Up Forensic Contest Park Saturday

Kewaskum High School is very proud to claim six "A" ratings and one "B" rating out of seven entries at the state forensic contest last Saturday in Madison.

## New Bridge to Be Built on Hwy. 'S' Near New Fane

A new bridge will be constructed on County Trunk Highway "S" over the east branch of the Milwaukee River immediately south of New Fane in Fond du Lac County. The work started April 24, and should be completed prior to July 4. The new structure will provide for the full roadway and 6-foot shoulders which are typical of the new road.

The work will be done by H. B. Janke & Sons, Inc., of Fredonia, at an estimated cost of \$42,459.25. Financing will be shared equally by the county and the federal government from funds provided primarily by gas taxes. David Runge will be the project engineer for the Wisconsin Division of Highways.

County Trunk Highway "S" will be closed during the lifetime of the contract. A suitable detour will be provided by the Fond du Lac County Highway Department.

#### Tornado Tips

With the tornado season again approaching, Marvin A. Martin, Civil Defense director, issues the following tornado tips:

When a tornado approaches, your immediate action can save your life!

- In homes, open some windows (but stay away from them); take shelter in the basement or under heavy furniture in the center area of the house.

- In schools, move quickly (following advance plans) to shelter areas or to an interior hallway on the lowest floor.

- In office buildings, go to an interior hallway on the lowest floor or to a designated shelter area.

- In factories, move quickly (following advance plans) to shelter areas. Post a look-out, if this can be done safely.

- In shopping centers, go to a designated shelter area (not to your parked car).

- Mobile homes are particularly vulnerable to over-turning during strong winds and should be evacuated when strong winds are forecast. Damage can be minimized by securing trailers with cables anchored in concrete footing. If there is no shelter nearby, leave the trailer park for low, protected ground.

- In open country, move away from the tornado's path at a right angle. If there is no time, lie flat in the nearest depression with your hands shielding your head. Be alert for flash floods.

During a severe thunderstorm or tornado emergency listen for radio and television broadcasts of latest national weather service bulletins.

In the event of a tornado the fire siren will blow a steady blast for 3 to 5 minutes.

Dear Mr. and Mrs. Koelsch:

This letter is from the Humane Society man who visited you with Mrs. Gehr. I enjoyed seeing Puppyland very much and I think you are doing a great and unselfish thing for the animals. I only wish what you are doing could be done here in St. Petersburg. But unfortunately we have such large numbers of unwanted in a city of this size that it would be impossible to support them. I am director of Humane Education for Humane Information Services, Inc. which is a national non-profit humane society with members in all fifty states. We furnish information and help on humane problems to individuals and societies. We also do research to develop more methods of killing the millions of creatures that have to be killed in this country every year, such as food animals, dogs, cats, in humane shelters, fur bearing animals, poultry, etc. My recent visit to Wisconsin was to carry out tests of the drug that we recommend for the killing of mink. It is the same drug that veterinarians use for putting a sick or injured pet to sleep. The mink people were very favorably impressed with it and we have high hopes of getting the whole industry to convert to it eventually. Unfortunately like most humane societies, we don't have funds to hire people to do all the work of this kind that needs to be done and have to depend on volunteers like ourselves, of which there are very few. I am going to ask our secretary to put you on our mailing list to receive our quarterly reports which are sent free to all who are interested. Continued success with Puppyland.

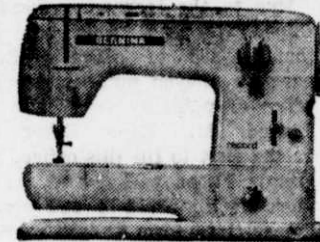
