## Clark Pearson of Greendale New Principal of High School

Mr. Clark A. Pearson will be principal of Kewaskum High School beginning July 1st. He is presently vice-principal of Greendale High School (Milwaukee), a school of some 1,300 students.

Prior to accepting the position of vice principal last year, Mr. Pearson had taught mathematics at Greendale for four years. He began teaching at New Holstein in 1960, then went to Kiel before moving to Greendale. During his years of teaching he has also been active as a coach. His undergraduate and graduate majors have been in mathematics, with minors in physical education and physics. He is a graduate of Whitewater University, and has attended Reed College in Portland, Oregon, and received his MA degree from the University of Northern Iowa. His work in educational administration has been at Marquette University.

Mr. Pearson comes originally from northern Wisconsin, and is a graduate of Florence High School. He is married and he and his wife have one child and are expecting a second in the near future.

Contacted by Supt. Floyd Brenholt at the direction of the board, Mr. Pearson indicated he would accept the position and that he was very pleased to be coming to Kewaskum. The contract for Mr. Pearson will be formalized by the board at its meeting on Monday, May 15.

Mr. Pearson was chosen by the Kewaskum School Board out of a final three candidates for the position. There were a total of 30 applications for the position. Mr. Pearson succeeds Edward Connors, who resigned in January.

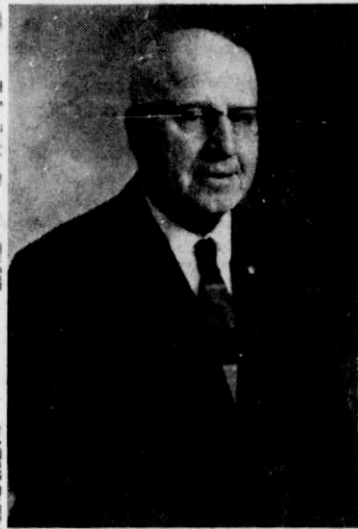
## BALLOONS RELEASED AT UNION GROVE FOUND HERE

## Martin Honored By AAL for 35 Years of Service

A short meeting was called to order by president Roger Heberer.

Vice-president, Norman Kempf, gave the history of Branch 26. The first member was Carl Fechtner. The first officers were Charles Fechtner, president, August Kuhnrow, vice-president, J. P. Klein, secretary, Louis Klumb, treasurer, and trustees Jake Reimel, Fred Raether and William Eudlich. On April 21, 1938, Branch 26 joined The Wisconsin Federation of AAL.

July, 1937, Marvin Martin became secretary, and is serving as secretary at the present time. As a surprise to Martin, he was given special honor for his 35 years of service. He was presented with a white Bible from the home office, and an anniversary cake.

## School Board Is Given Preview of Tentative Budget

Members of the Board of Education were given a preview of a tentative budget for 1972-73 when they met here May 1. According to figures compiled by Supt. Floyd Brenholt, the budget calls for a tax levy of \$1,400,192 and a mill rate of 18.857 compared with a 1971-72 mill rate of 19.727. Brenholt emphasized "these figures are not final but we feel we can stay within them."

He said the reason for preparing a tentative budget is that he wanted to discuss some new programs with the board and he wanted them to see the overall effect on the budget.

Addition of a guidance counselor and career education person for Grades 7 and 8 is recommended. This person would also oversee the career education program for kindergarten through ninth grade. The career education program is being recommended by a vocational education advisory committee as part of a five-year study plan.

Also included in new programs is a pilot program for children with special learning disabilities.

Board members again discussed moving the district offices from the high school to available space in the Kewaskum Savings building. Again, no action was taken. Board members have been reluctant to approve the move.

If vacated, the two rooms that housed district offices would become science classrooms, for which they were originally intended. Brenholt stated that "in view of the fact that we don't have all our scheduling information, it is difficult to say if there will be room in the school for district (Continued on page 2).

offices next year."

Also discussed was moving the two portable classrooms from Kewaskum to Wayne. This would eliminate using the Wayne gym for classes. The only other option to

solve overcrowding at Wayne is to transport to Kewaskum. The individually Guided Education program will begin at Wayne next year and Brenholt feels "it is important we keep both staff and students intact as a unit."

The board turned down a proposal to install two large wall-mounted fans in the high school gym and band room at a cost of \$1,497. These areas have some ventilation needs but it was decided to use, perhaps borrow tempor-

arily, some large moveable fans to see what results they bring.

Approved was a request from Richard Johann that his two children in elementary school be allowed to finish the school year. The family has moved to West Bend.

The board approved installation of four outdoor vapor lights on the high school to replace standard lights, at a cost of \$120. The next board meeting will be held at the Wayne School at 8 p. m. on May 15.



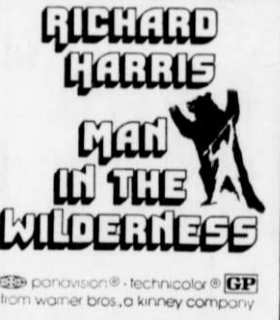

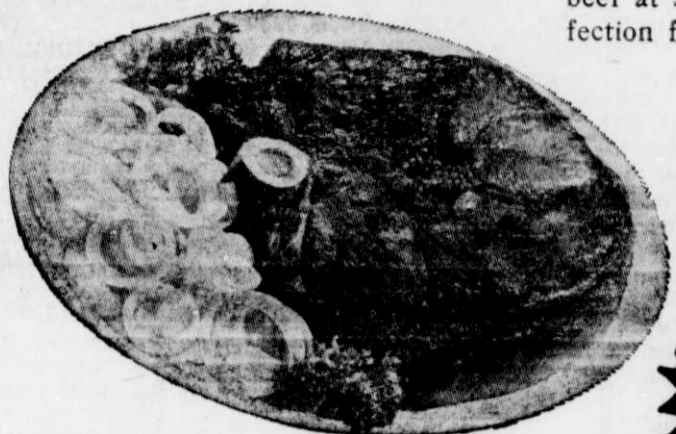

### Indian Trackmen Win 2 Meets, 3rd In Cougar Relays

In track meets the past week, Kewaskum won over Grafton and Hartland and placed third out of 9 schools in the Cougar Invitational Relays at Campbellsport.

Last Wednesday the Indians topped Grafton, 72-54. Kewaskum's sprinters slammed the 100 and 220. Scott Rammer was under 11 seconds in the 100 yard dash at 10.7. Randy Backhaus won the 2 mile event and broke the school record. He chopped 5 more seconds off his previous best mark and is near a 10 minute flat time. Tom Theusch added his second school record as he heaved the discus 132 feet. Kim Rodenkirch bettered his own put mark by 6 inches (46'6") but placed 2nd. Theusch also copped the high jump. Craig Carr took a first in the 440 and 2nds in the long jump and 100.

In the Cougar Invitational Friday Dodgeland was the winner with 70 points. Campbellsport and Kewaskum were 2nd and 3rd with 68 and 63 points respectively, followed by North Fondy 45, Horicon 40, Oakfield 34, Random Lake 22, Lomira 16, Rosendale-Brandon 2. The Indians piled up points on their high hurdle shuttle win, distance medley win and high jump crown. Theusch cleared 5'9" to take the high jump win. A distance medley was held and turned out to be a dual between the Indians and Cougars. Ken Wilson started fast for Kewaskum, got a good lead which was held by Carr and Jeff Ketter, and by the time star 2-miler Backhaus got the baton, KHS had a 100-yd. lead. Randy lapped the field with the exception of the Cougars' Stommel.

On Tuesday the Indians defeated Hartland, 77-50, to bring their scenic record to 3-3. The high hurdle and high jump were Kewaskum's biggest point getters as they slammed both events. In the hurdles it was Chuck Buss, Mitch Ogi and Jim Kern in that order and the high jump, Gary Fickler, Theusch and Jack Tessar. Theusch added a win in the discus. Soph Rammer had a big day with wins in the 100, 220 and 880 relay. Wilson cut his time in the 880 under 2:10 to capture that event. Backhaus ran the 2-mile in 10:14.1 for another win.

### Indian Golfers Win, Lose, Draw; Place 2nd In Own Invitational

The high school golf squad had a busy week indeed. They won one match, lost one, tied another, and placed 2nd in their own Indian Invitational.
