Chairman Howard Luebke, business manager for the Germantown schools said "Our story in savings in purchasing hasn't been told in Washington County but it has been told nationwide." He said stories about the group have appeared in business publications around the Midwest. "And in July, representatives of 11 states are meeting in Milwaukee to hear the story about our county." The com mittee is described as being "unique in format."

Gathered at the Moraine Supper Club were about 100 persons representing school districts, municipal governments, business and industry.

Involved in the county program are school systems at Germantown, Kewaskum, Richfield, West Bend and Hartford; the village of Germantown, the cities of Hartford and West Bend and Washington County.

Secretary Ken Rhode of the West Bend schools said it is expected that \$100,000 worth of supplies will be purchased cooperatively this year. Included are light bulbs, being bought at 55 per cent off of list price; school office supplies; audio-visual equipment, paper towels and tissue and physical education supplies and equipment.

Rhode said one school district reported saving \$1,300 on paper in one year. One reported 26 per cent over-all savings. "We expect savings up to 50 per cent on au-
