Graduation activities for 155 members of the class of 1972 at Kewaskum Community High School began with a Linden Inn banquet Wednesday, May 17.

Mrs. Audray Schaefer Wiesen, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Raymond Schaefer, Kewaskum, has been named to the Advisory Committee of the Wisconsin-Mayfair Marathon for the U. S. Olympics and chairman of the event's Auxiliary Committee. The Marathon is a \$50,000 fund raising project sanctioned by the United States Olympic Committee to be conducted June 11 through 17 on a one-eighth mile track at Mayfair Shopping Center, Wauwatosa.

The Kewaskum High School Band, under the direction of Clyde Brehm, will be featured on Monday, June 12, 7:00 p. m., as part of the Marathon's musical entertainment.

Audray Wiesen has announced that runners and joggers are needed who will volunteer to run any distance at any time during the 144 hour Marathon and also solicit sponsors to contribute money. She said that her brother, Daniel Schaefer, a junior at U.W.-Madison, is planning to run in the Marathon. Another brother, David, is attempting to get a group of runners and joggers together.

Audray will participate in the Marathon with Ray Nitschke of the Green Bay Packers, as well as Ann Henning and Dianne Holun, both Olympic gold medal winners at Sapporo, Japan.

Now living at 211 N. Glenview, Wauwatosa, Audray and her husband, Ernest, have two daughters, Rachel, 5, and Erica, 1. She is active in the Wauwatosa Junior Women's Club, being the Philanthropic Chairman and head of the club's Olympic involvement.

County Governmental Cooperative Purchasing Committee Annual Meet

The Washington County Governmental Cooperative Purchasing Committee told its story of how it is making headway and gains in saving tax dollars at its annual dinner meeting at the Moraine Supper Club last week.

Floyd Brenholt of Kewaskum Schools is a member of the committee and Michael Kardos of Regal Ware is an industrial advisor.

Chairman Howard Luebke, business manager for the Germantown schools said "Our story in savings in purchasing hasn't been told in Washington County but it has been told nationwide." He said stories about the group have appeared in business publications around the Midwest. "And in July, representatives of 11 states are meeting in Milwaukee to hear the story about our county." The committee is described as being "unique in format."

Gathered at the Moraine Supper Club were about 100 persons representing school districts, municipal governments, business and industry.

Involved in the county program are school systems at Germantown, Kewaskum, Richfield, West Bend and Hartford; the village of Germantown, the cities of Hartford and West Bend and Washington County.

Secretary Ken Rhode of the West Bend schools said it is expected that \$100,000 worth of supplies will be purchased cooperatively this year. Included are light bulbs, being bought at 55 per cent off of list price; school office supplies; audio-visual equipment, paper towels and tissue and physical education supplies and equipment.

Rhode said one school district reported saving \$1,300 on paper in one year. One reported 26 per cent over-all savings. "We expect savings up to 50 per cent on au-

dio visual equipment," he added. Luebke emphasized that "we never forget the local supplier" and "we aim for quality at the lowest prices."

Organized in February of 1968 as a voluntary group, it has been meeting once or twice a month. It has no administrative costs. Its only expenses are postage stamps for bids.

John Hennick of the Public Ex-

penditure Survey Committee of Wisconsin provided guidance in its formative stages. Purchasing agents in Washington County's four major industries were asked to help "to gain professionalism."

These men were Mike Kardos of Regal Ware, Inc., Stuart Hackbarth of the Gehl Co., Harold Skuldt of the West Bend Co., and Richard Tharman of Chrysler Outboard. Tharman served as master of ceremonies and noted "while we haven't solved all the problems, we know we're off the ground."

Skuldt said industry is interest-

ed because of the high taxes industry pays. He said the county is fortunate to have as much as it does. Some have left Wisconsin for tax reasons. "Each year we need more and more skilled persons from schools—we need a good return on our tax dollar."

Tharman observed that "we had to learn to walk before we could learn to run," to which Rhode responded, "the Washington County Co-op is starting to trot."

Lee Honeck representing the Fire Dept. Equipment Committee recommended to the Board the purchase of a Fire Dept. Truck Chassis from Honeck Chevrolet at the apparent low bid of \$6,453.64. Motion by Trustee Miller, seconded by Trustee Herriges and duly carried that the recommendation be and hereby is approved and that the Commissioner be authorized to issue purchase order for such chassis as specified.

Richard L. Edwards discussed with the Board the revised plans for the possible construction of a 20 unit apartment house.

The Board discussed with Village Attorney Roger McKenna the drafting of a Land Division Ordinance.

RESOLUTION NO. 72-2
PRELIMINARY RESOLUTION DECLARING INTENT TO EXERCISE SPECIAL ASSESSMENT POWERS UNDER SECTION 66.60, WISCONSIN STATUTES OF 1969

RESOLVED, by the Village Board of the Village of Kewaskum, Wisconsin:

1. The Village Board hereby declares its intention to exercise its power under S. 66.60, Wisconsin Statutes, to levy special assessments upon property within the following described area for benefits conferred upon such property by improvement of the following streets:

CURB & GUTTER on all property fronting on streets as follows:

- A. All property fronting on the West side of Brooklane Drive and which is South of Clinton approximately 205 ft.
- B. All property fronting on both sides of Braatz Drive from Western Avenue to the East Edge of Edgewood Road ap-

proximately 805 ft. on the North side and approximately 804 ft. on the South Side.

C. All property fronting on both sides of North Ave. East from Edgewood Road and approximately 216 ft. on the North side and approximately 212 ft. on the South side.

D. All property fronting on the West side of Western Avenue which lies North of Braatz Drive and is approximately 149.35 ft.

E. On all property fronting on both sides of Werner Drive beginning at the West edge of Riverview Drive, being approximately 547.87 ft. on the North side and 152.10 ft. on the South side.

2. Said public improvements shall include the installation of curb and gutter on the streets as set forth above to the grade established therefore in Ordinance 58-1 of the Village of Kewaskum, Wisconsin and recorded in the office of the Village Commissioner.

3. The total amount assessed against such district shall not exceed 100% of the cost of improvements.

4. The assessments against any parcel may be paid in cash or in installments as shall hereafter be determined.

5. The Village Engineer is directed to prepare a report consisting of:

- a. Final plans and specifications for said improvements.
- b. An estimate of the entire cost of the proposed curb and gutter improvement.
- c. An estimate of benefits to be levied for each improvement as to each parcel of property within the assessment district of:

1. The assessment of benefits to be levied for each improvement.

2. The damages to be awarded for property taken or damaged by said improvement.

3. The net amount of benefits over damages or of the damages over benefits for such improvements.

4. The total assessment against each parcel.

5. Upon completion of such report the Village Engineer is directed to file a copy thereof in the office of Village Commissioner for public inspection.

6. Upon receiving the report of the Village Engineer, the Commissioner is directed to give notice of a public hearing on such report as specified in Section 66.60(7), Wisconsin Statutes. The hearing shall be held in the Council Room in the Municipal Building of the Village of Kewaskum at a time set by the Commissioner in accordance with S. 66.60 (7), Wisconsin Statutes.
