Edwards' plans call for cutting down the present Remmel Mfg. Co. building to eight feet and erecting an apartment complex to include four two-bedroom, 13 onebedroom and three efficiency

Edwards wanted to know on what facts the objections are based. Wietor said the area is too congested with the fire and police departments and municipal building across the street and for reasons of parking. "Where will the apartment visitors park?" asked Wietor.

"I have been here several times," Edwards told the board. "Why didn't you tell me this six months ago?" Wietor responded (Continued on page 3)

#### Beach, Swim Program to Open June 17

The Kewaskum beach will officlaily open for the year on Saturday, June 17. The beach hours will remain basically the same: Monday-Friday, 10 a. m.-5 p. m.; Saturday, 9 a. m. 5 p. m.; Sunday, 1 p. m.-5 p. m.

As was the case in past years, if anyone uses the beach at times other than the above listed times, they will be swimming at THEIR OWN RISK-the lifeguards will be on duty only during the hours listed.

One big change will be in the time of day when lessons will be held. Because of a past conflict with summer school, and hoping to take advantage of warmer waer conditions, the lessons for this summer will be held in the afternoon according to the following schedule:

12:30-1 p. m.-Advanced Begin-

1-1:30 p. m.-Beginners, Green 1:30-2 p. m.-Beginners, White 2-2:30 p. m.-Intermediates

Lifesaving-Time to be determined if enough interest is shown. Since the lessons will be in the afternoon, the beach will be available for open swimming during the morning hours and those hours in the afternoon following the lessons. There will also be open swimming during the time of the lessons, but on a somewhat restricted basis-open swimming will be permitted during lessons ONLY IN those AREAS of the beach NOT BEING USED for






