School Board Approves Proposed Higher Budget of \$2.1 Million

Also OK Hiring Of Six Student Teacher Aides

FIRE CHIEF OPPOSES MOVING OF CLASSROOMS

On a vote of 6 to 1, the Board of Education, in special session Monday night, approved a proposed budget for 1972-73 in the amount of \$2,180,594.89, which is \$347,688.89 higher than the one for 1971-72. The "no" vote was cast by Richard Theusch.

Supt. Floyd Brenholt said the budget total is subject to change in some capital outlay items to be purchased. The board approved purchase of some 60 major capital outlay items Monday night. Among them were cameras, equipment for English lab, home economics, physical education, industrial arts and science; carpeting, band instruments, a storage shed at Beechwood School, a road to the high school garage and junior high office equipment.

Capital outlay items rejected were a harpsichord at \$1,800 and chorus risers at \$1,278. It was felt students could raise the money if they want a harpsichord and the industrial arts department could possibly build the chorus risers.

Brenholt said three items figure significantly in the increased budget, namely, the \$153,000 addition currently being built at the Kewaskum High School, a \$20,000 increase in student bussing costs due to split shifting of classes in the fall and the fact that this year, for the first time, the district must levy for state trust fund loans which was formerly done by the county. In addition, Brenholt said, pupil bussing was under-budgeted in the 1971-72 school year by between \$13,000 and \$15,000.

Brenholt said under the new proposed budget, the net operating cost per student comes to \$850.47, based on a projection of 1,971 students next school year, which is a two per cent increase over last year. The per pupil cost compares with \$832.06 last year and with the statewide anticipated average of \$888 per student.

The board also approved hiring six student teacher aides, one adult aide for the media center at Kewaskum Elementary, one adult aide for special education and kindergarten at Kewaskum Elementary and voted to increase the number of hours the adult aides will work.

The matter of hiring student aides was tabled from the May 30 meeting when it was discussed at length, after hearing a proposal from Elementary Director Richard Zarling to hire 13 students for teacher aides. At the suggestion of board member Thomas Gundrum, the board voted to compromise with six student aides and one adult aide. He suggested that the student aide program be budgeted for the entire school year, but that it be evaluated at mid-semester.

With split shifting in effect in

the fall, the student aides will work during the afternoon during times in the school year when they are not involved with extra-curricular activities of their own. Brenholt endorsed the student aide program. He said he worked with it in the past and found it successful.

The decision to go along with the student aide program came after another lengthy discussion on its merits. Board chairman Richard L. Edwards said he heard comments that some teachers "are not too happy with having student aides" and board member Gerald Zimmel said he heard "teachers weren't consulted."

Brenholt said he entered the discussion one week ago and that at a staff meeting teachers voted 13 to 3 in favor of having student aides. He said there had been "some misunderstanding" about the idea.

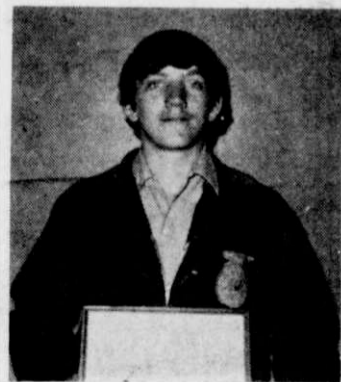
Miss Cathy Miller, a recent graduate from Lakeshore Technical School in Sheboygan as a child care assistant and a 1971 graduate of Kewaskum High, told the board in a letter that she felt that "it is a must that certified teacher aides be hired." A teacher aide does not cut paper and take in lunch money. "A teacher aide must be fully trained," she observed.

Zarling commented that most aides in the state are not certified but that "certified aides would be frosting on the cake but I want the cake first." He said "we can't have everything—we are trying to improve conditions and at the same time trying to keep the budget down."

Under the new weekly schedule Beechwood School will go from 30 to 56 hours from teacher aides; Farmington School from 30 to 40 hours; Wayne School from 30 to 56 hours; and Kewaskum Elementary from 90 to 108 hours.

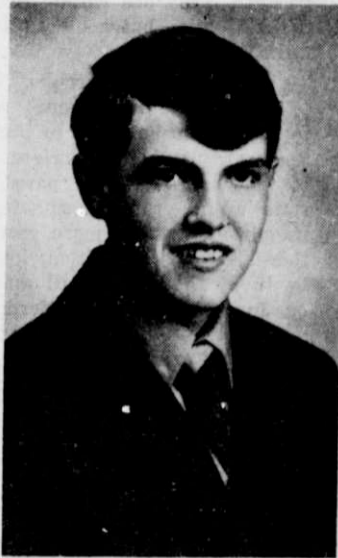
Awarded Short Course Scholarship

Old Barn, Grass Burn in Blaze

Members of the Kewaskum fire department were called out at 7:30 p. m. Sunday to join members of the Department of Natural Resources staff, under the direction of Walt Adams of the State Forest Park Area, to fight a stubborn grass and old barn fire east of Kewaskum.

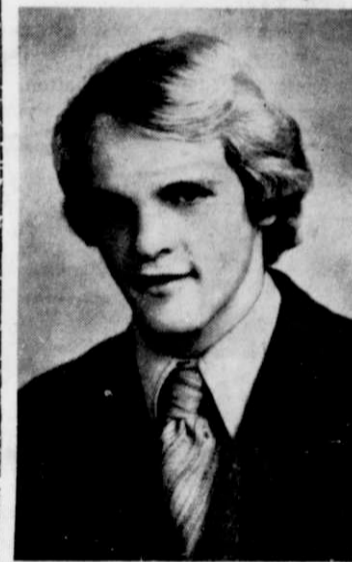
The fire burned over an estimated 8 to 10 acres adjacent to state park lands on Adler Acres on E. Moraine Drive a mile north of Hwy. 28 about 2½ miles east of Kewaskum. The blaze was discovered about 5 p. m. by one of the DNR patrolmen.

Kewaskum firemen did not obtain the fire alert until almost 7:30 p. m. due to a communication slipup, although the DNR had requested assistance shortly after arrival, they stated. DNR personnel used a Caterpillar tractor to dig a fire trench to halt the spreading flames.

In addition to the old barn and large grassland area damaged, many trees were also damaged or destroyed in the blaze.

About 18 members of the local fire department responded to the call and remained at the scene about 1½ hours before the fire was under control.

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School Meeting

Kohlsville Fire Department and Leander Herriges, janitor of Wayne School were present to speak against moving the two portable classrooms from the Kewaskum Elementary grounds to the Wayne School. Herman said the fire department has a resolution on the books opposing the move and he wants to go on record as being opposed "just in case something happens."

Herman said he considers the buildings "flimsy" and "a hollow shell of plywood." He said he did not come "to contradict your actions" but to give his point of view to protect the safety of children. The portables have been used in Kewaskum for several years for kindergarten classes.

He was told that unless some classroom space is provided at Wayne School, the pupils will have to attend classes another year in the gym. The gym was carpeted and turned into an open concept area last year. Electors have turned down three referenda for a building program which in-

cluded a four-room addition at Wayne.

Herman said he believes a permanent addition at Wayne School is the answer. Board member Gerald Secor asked, "judging from the comments you hear, do you think a referendum for an addition at Wayne would pass?" Both felt it would. Herriges replied "people will go for one building but they won't go for the whole package. They are willing to take a small bite but not the whole piece."

Herman and Herriges were told "if there is someone ready to carry the banner, to petition the board to hold a referendum for an addition." If passed, the state would grant permission to use the gym one more year. If there is to be a petition, it must be in by the next board meeting on June 26 and a referendum would probably be held on the day of the annual meeting in July. If electors turn down the building proposal there would still be time to move the portables before school starts in August.

After having been tabled previously, the board approved

health insurance coverage during July and August for teachers leaving the school system as of now. The teachers involved would pay the insurance premium in order that they be covered until they take new jobs. This would not apply to teachers being released from their jobs, however.

Also approved was purchase of two John Deere, 46 inch cut, 12 horse power lawn mowers from Laubenstein Lawn and Garden Mart, Kewaskum on his low bid among three of \$1,800 plus two trade-ins.

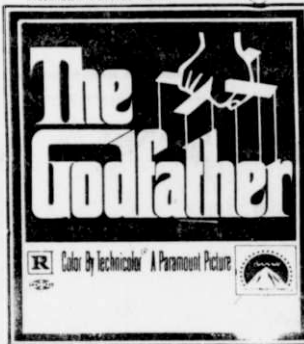

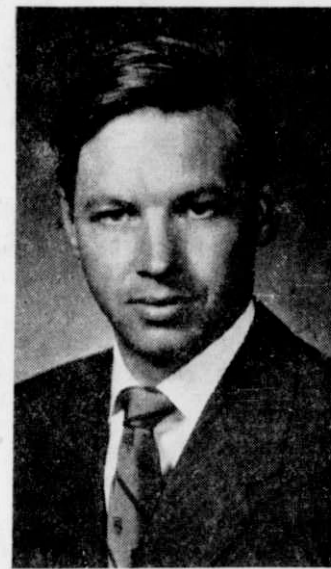

Petri Announces For State Senate



Attorney Thomas Petri, Fond du Lac, today announced his candidacy for State Senator in the new Wisconsin second senatorial district. The new district includes only the village and town of Kewaskum in Washington County and runs north as far as DePere.

Petri, 32, is a graduate of the Harvard Law School and served as a White House aide to President Nixon during 1969 and 1970. He resides at rural route 3 in the Town of Empire, Fond du Lac County, and practices law in Fond du Lac.

In announcing his candidacy, Petri pledged to work for economy in government, protection of the environment, land use taxation, and for quality and accountability in education.

"If state government is to be effective," Petri said, "it must be responsive to the needs of the citizen. I seek the help and support of concerned voters as we go about the business of seeing to it that our government does a better job for us."

Petri indicated that, if elected, he planned to work closely with county, city and town elected officials on solving area problems.

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Editor, Kewaskum Statesman:

The word for last week was STIFLE.

May 9, 1972 the Village Board with a motion from board member Charles Miller, passed a policy to the effect that the public wishing to attend and speak or be recognized by the board should present at least a three day notice to the village clerk. The notice should state what you are wishing to speak on or ask for. The only reason given in the paper for adopting such a policy was the length of the meetings.

May 12, 1972 in accordance with the new policy Richard Schmidt submitted a written notice to the village clerk with three topics we possibly had something to comment on at the June 5th board meeting. When checking the calendar, that gave us a 24 day advance notice which means we had at least that three day notice requirement met.

June 5, 1972 minutes before the scheduled village board monthly meeting was called to order, the Village President asked me privately if I desired to comment on any of the three topics we had on our notice. I stated that I didn't have any comments on two of the three topics at this time, but did desire to ask a few questions on the new policy adopted on May 9th. The meeting was called to order, and sixteen topics or so were on the agenda, minus the one topic I desired to ask a few questions on. When it came right down to it, none of the topics of my brother and mine were on the typed agenda sheet. Needless to say, the meeting was adjourned and I was never recognized by the board.

Seeing I didn't have the opportunity to comment, I would like my questions to appear in the article for the public to know and ask.

1. Why was a policy directly involving the public, brought up at a special meeting, when the public wasn't there to object to or voice their approval of such a policy?

2. Was there any other reason for adopting such a policy, other than the length of the meetings?

3. Does this policy pertain to only the scheduled monthly meetings?

4. If the answer to number three is that it pertains to all the meetings, scheduled monthly or special meetings, how is a person or the public supposed to know when a special meeting is when they aren't even posted?

5. If there is already a subject on the agenda, may any concerned party participate in the discussion without requesting it in advance?

To close with a comment on other communities, adopting such a policy, we don't believe there are that many. West Bend, which is approximately eight times larger than Kewaskum, doesn't even have such a policy and neither does the county board. The public, of course, should be courteous and announce their presence at any board meeting, if they are asking for something which involves research work by the board members. To go back to the policy, what good is it to the public if they don't even recognize someone that does submit a notice to appear on the agenda. To be stifled or not to be stifled is the real question.

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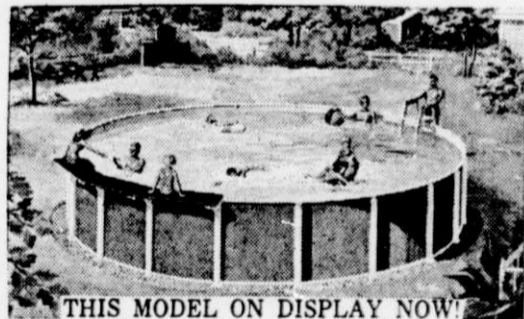

Ironically Saukville is the only team Kewaskum defeated in the season opener and they haven't lost since. Kewaskum hasn't won since. Saukville also trounced West Bend last Wednesday night, 9-5. In this one Lahti only got 3 hits, including a 3-run homer, and batted in 5 runs. In one other weekend game Pat McFarlin pitched a 1-hitter as Grafton clipped Barton, 7-0.

Kewaskum has no game scheduled this Sunday but will play a practice game at Port Washington Saturday night. Then next Wednesday night they play at West Bend.
