Fr. Weinert C.SS.R. attended Holy Trinity Grade School here and began his studies for the priesthood at St. Joseph's Preparatory College in Edgerton, Wis. He received his Bachelor of Arts Degree in Philosophy from Holy Redeemer College, Waterford, Wis. and is presently attending Mt. St. Alphonsus College, Esopus; New York, where the Master of Divinity Degree was conferred upon him before Ordination and where he will return next year to complete work for the Degree of Master of Religious Education. In preparation for the priest-

hood, Fr. Weinert has done pastoral work in Redemptorist parishes in Davenport, Ia., Grand Rapids, Mich., and Denver, Colo. During his study at Mt. St. Alphonsus, he has been involved in teaching religion, worked in inner-city St. Vincent de Paul work, ran adult discussion groups and teen retreat days around the Kingston, N.Y. area.

Fr. Weinert is the first son of Holy Trinity to be ordained to the Holy Priesthood in many years.

# Archbishop William E. Cousins Trench Cave-In

Jake K. Bruessel, 38, of R. 2, Kewaskum, a construction worker, of accidental head and chest injuries he suffered when one side of a trench he was working in at him under heavy clay.

The medical examiner's office said he was dead on arrival at 1:30 p. m. at St. Michael Hospital.

According to police, Bruessel was cleaning out loose dirt in the freshly dug trench for a gas foot deep trench caved in. The construction site is about 300 River Hills.

Authorities said four other emtion Co., 9555 S. Howell Ave., Oak Gnacinskis Buy Lions Hold Creek, witnessed the cave-in about 12:45 p. m. and dug Bruessel out. Bruessel, who had been working alone in the trench, was knocked unconscious and buried up to his head by the dirt.

## Church Will Be Dedicated Sunday

On Sunday, June 25, a concelebrated Mass of Dedication will be held at 12 noon at the newly completed St. Michael's Church at St. Michaels.

Principal celebrant and homilist for the Dedication Mass will be His Excellency Archbishop William E. Cousins, D.D., Archbishop of Milwaukee. Concelebrants will include Rev. William B. Bonesho, pastor of St. Michael's; the Revs. Matthew Urban and Francis Eschweiler, former pastors, and three priest-sons of the parish, the Revs. Richard Fellenz, Ralph Fellenz and Adrian Staehler.

Rev. Ralph Fliss will be master of ceremonies to the archbishop; James Thull will be master of ceremonies for the Mass and Reinhard Follmann will be the commentator.

A fourth degree honor guard will be provided by the Knights of Columbus general assembly. The church choir, under the direction of Cecelia Thull, will sing for the occasion.


