## Board Sets Date for Hearing On Variances in Building Code

### Petitions Urging Purchase of Land For Swim Pool Read

#### SWIMMING BEACH CLOSED BECAUSE OF VANDALISM

The date of Aug. 28 was set by the village board Monday night for a public hearing on a request for variances in the village building code by Richard L. Edwards who is seeking a building permit for a 16-unit apartment complex on Railroad and First Streets.

The hearing will be held in the council rooms at 8 p. m. The variances he seeks concern setback and side yard requirements and lot area per housekeeping unit requirements.

Earlier this year Edwards applied for a permit to construct a 20-unit building on the site but it was denied in June on recommendation of the village plan commission. It found Edwards' plans as presented in violation of present zoning ordinances but went on record that it might consider a 16-unit building, provided the variances are granted.

Petitions were read urging that the village purchase land for a swimming pool and bath house, and asking that construction begin so that the pool can open June 1, 1973.

Village President Cyril Wiator stated that since the Kewaskum Kiwanis Foundation formally offered funds for a pool in May, the village has been looking at several sites "but we are looking for more than a mud hole in the ground." He said the site is to provide a park, a baseball diamond, tennis and basketball courts and adequate parking facilities.

"We do hope that people will realize this will cost money and that it may raise the tax rate," Wiator continued. The Kiwanis Club has said it will donate but it hasn't said how much. Its commitment would be dependent on the presentation of a suitable site and construction plans to the Kiwanis Foundation's board of directors, the offer stipulated. "We may purchase a site this fall," Wiator observed but a completion date cannot be set at this time.

Mrs. John Hubbell asked whether the Kiwanians have set any stipulations on pool plans. Their treasurer, Gerald Stollenwerk replied, "we haven't any specific plans but we would like to review them with the village before the money is donated."

Village Commissioner William Martin said following the meeting that the petitions were brought to his office by John Hubbell and Mrs. Jos. Harlow.

As of Monday, the swimming beach on the Milwaukee River was closed because of vandalism. Since swimming instructor John Breaker moved from Kewaskum the end of June, only assistants have been in charge. At noon Monday, children's swings in the beach area were found dismantled and strewn about; carpeting was torn off a bench on the life guard

station and a sign was broken. As trustee Orval Behnke put it, the swimming beach has been used pretty much as "a good baby sitting service, anyway."

Mr. and Mrs. Lloyd Mueller asked what date a village ordinance went into effect that requires a building permit to install a driveway. They were told the date was July 12, 1971. Then they asked whether building permits were purchased by residents of 1200 Kewaskum St., and 203 and 351 Clinton St.

Building inspector Edward Brandt said that a driveway was included in an original permit for the 203 Clinton address. Wiator said offhand he wouldn't know about the others without checking the records.

Although Brandt contended that he merely asked the contractor working for Muellers if they had a building permit, the Muellers contended they were told by Brandt to buy one and that "people up the street and across the street didn't have one. What is good for one is good for all," Mrs. Mueller stated.

Wiator told them that the village is trying to enforce its building code and that in so doing, "the building inspector may step on some toes. It is going to get tougher," Wiator warned. He admitted however, that "probably some are slipping by putting recreation rooms in their basements without permits . . . but that we will try to get them all." Trustee Behnke observed that "our building inspector is doing a heck of a good job."

Village Attorney Roger McKenna said he feels it is every citizen's duty to check the village records when he sees construction of any kind going on.

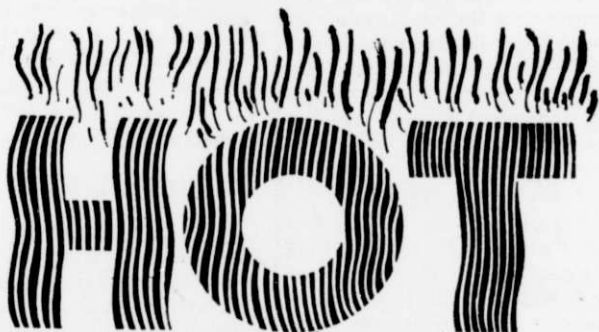

There is practically every indication of a God fearing people — except — they didn't even know the one TRUE God. ("... What therefore you worship as unknown ...").

How many people today, like the Athenians, know of God, worship God in the form of religion, but do not actually know God? Paul gave the answer for all people to heed — knowing God through Jesus Christ (1 Tim. 2:5); receiving salvation (saved from eternal spiritual death due to sin) (Romans 19:9); abundant, peaceful, joyful life by trusting in Jesus. (Gal. 5:22).

**The Chief Sez:**

Due to an enormous increase in bicycle traffic and complaints about improper bicycle operation I would like to take this opportunity to review some of the rules of the Bicycle Safety Code with everyone.

1. Do not carry passengers.
2. Always observe traffic regulations, stop signs, etc.
3. Use hand signals to indicate turns & stopping.
4. Ride single file.
5. Keep to the right side of the road.
6. Keep brakes in good working condition.
7. Keep both hands on the handle bars.
8. If you ride after dark you must have a light on the front and reflectors on the back of the bike.
9. If you ride after dark wear light colored clothing.
10. Use a package carrier.
11. Dismount and walk across heavy traffic.
12. Sidewalks are for pedestrians. Anyone over 12 years old should not ride on them.
13. BE COURTEOUS.

Unless every cyclist obeys the above mentioned rules he or she is subject to having their bike taken away for a period of one to two weeks. In adult cases fines may be levied. Parents may also be charged for permitting their children to operate bikes in an unsafe manner.

You see each one of us has responsibility to help make cycling safe. Let's all do our part.

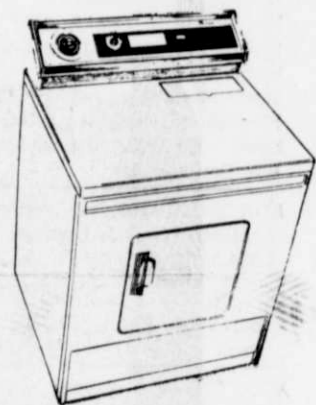

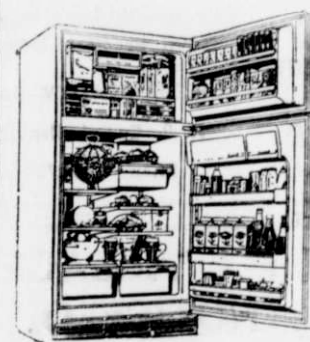

4. That benefits shown on the report are true and correct, have been determined on a reasonable basis and are hereby confirmed.

5. That the assessments for all projects included in said report are hereby combined as a single assessment but any interested property owner shall be entitled to object to each assessment separately or both assessments jointly for any purpose or purposes.

6. That the assessments may be paid in cash or in four (4) annual installments to the Village Commissioner, deferred payments to bear interest at the rate of 8% per annum on the unpaid balance. Installments or assessments not paid when due shall bear additional interest on the amount due at the rate of 1.6% per an-

num.  
7. The Village Commissioner is directed to publish this resolution as a class 1 notice in the assessment district.

8. The Commissioner is further directed to mail a copy of this resolution and a statement of the final assessment against his property to every property owner whose name appears on the assessment roll whose post-office address is known or can with reasonable diligence be ascertained.
