Bussing Problems and Complaints Heard at School Board Meeting

APPROVE ADDING OF TWO MORE TEACHERS

The subject of student bussing took up a good part of a 3½ hour meeting of the Board of Education Monday night.

Among varied complaints from parents were comments from the principals of St. John's and Good Shepherd Schools in West Bend that they are primarily satisfied with the direct bus route that was put back on last week. Board chairman Thomas Gundrum stated that the direct route will continue through the school year the way it was run last year.

At the start of this school year, parochial students bussed outside the district were brought to Kewaskum on a bus carrying students for the first session of two split shifts and were then shuttled to West Bend. Parents objected.

The main complaints Monday night were from parents whose children have to walk to pick-up points to meet the bus, some in dangerous traffic areas, which they will be walking in darkness. A mother contended that "if one walks to a central pick-up, all should walk."

There was the complaint from families who live off the main road that their children must stand and wait for the bus in all kinds of weather while some bus drivers drive to the homes to pick up and deliver in bad weather. One woman said three busses pick up at her home and because it was raining Monday, two of them drove to the home; the third one did not and her daughter did not get to school. Some children who are first on in the morning are last off at night, contrary to district policy, and bus pick-ups are irregular, some contended.

One parent demanded to know "what has changed in bussing to create such havoc? If the bus company has problems maintaining schedules, it's their problem," he said. He wanted to know why the patterns have changed and asked more busses be put on "to give us some service."

There was the complaint that busses are passing over several bridges in the Town of Wayne, much too heavy for the posted capacity of the bridge and that the township is "uneasy" about it. Another complaint was of a railroad crossing that does not afford the bus driver a good view until he is on top of the tracks.

In defense, Supt. Floyd Brenholt said that due to split shifting, there is a completely different set of bus routes this year. "But we are trying to do our best to get it straightened out," he added. There are three separate runs, one for elementary, one for junior high and one for senior high and to make these separate runs worthwhile, they have been lengthened, Brenholt explained.

"If people want shorter runs and door pick-ups, these routes cannot stay and the district will have to pay more," he observed. "When you consider the length"

ONLY 364 VOTES CAST IN VILLAGE

Only about one-third of the eligible voters turned out at the polls for Tuesday's Primary Election in the village. The vote was comparatively light with a total of 364 ballots being cast.

Village voters followed the trend for county and district offices by heavily favoring all the candidates who were nominated.

In the 9th District incumbent Republican Congressman Glenn Davis defeated Verne Read by a 3 to 2 margin. Davis polled 32,086 votes in the portions of 6 counties in the new district, while Read had 20,466. Robert Baggs a third GOP contender, polled 2,195.

In the new Second Senatorial District Republican Thomas Petri defeated Wayne Hill, Urban Urban and Gary Dilweg. In the 5 counties Petri polled 4,166 votes, Hill 2,504, Urban 740, and Dilweg 3,423.

In the hotly contested GOP race for nomination as county sheriff, in which both candidates conducted vigorous campaigns, Clarence A. Schwartz, R. 3, West Bend, easily won the nomination by almost a 2 to 1 margin over Matt L. Goeden Jr. of West Bend. The final vote was 5,295 for Schwartz and 2,826 for Goeden. Schwartz carried all areas but one.

In one other contested county race incumbent Republican coroner Robert H. Boltz, West Bend, handily won nomination over Richard A. Burg, Stinger. The final tally was Boltz 4,520 and Burg 3,258.

All other GOP candidates were unopposed in the Primary. They include 6th District Assemblyman Wilbert Halbach, County Clerk Anton P. Staral, County Treasurer Robert J. Klein, Clerk of Court Helen Berend, Dist. Atty. Robert J. Kauffmann and Register of Deeds Olga Perrin.

On the Democratic ticket the only opposition was for State Senator of the 2nd District and 6th District Assemblyman. For Senator James N. DeLorme handily defeated John F. O'Malley, 5,822 to 2,658. In the 6th District Assembly race Gervase Hephner easily won renomination over Bernard J. Brown (who is from R. 3, Campbellsport), 1,428 to 170.

Other Democratic candidates who were unopposed include: Ralph A. Fine, 9th District Congressman; Jon W. Sanfilippo, County Clerk; Mary Ann Frank, County Treasurer; David L. Griffin, Sheriff (Ronald Richter withdrew name); Jane C. Williams, Coroner; Hope H. Cross, Clerk of Court; Donald Oberbreckling, Dist. Atty. and Barbara L. Ackley, Register of Deeds.

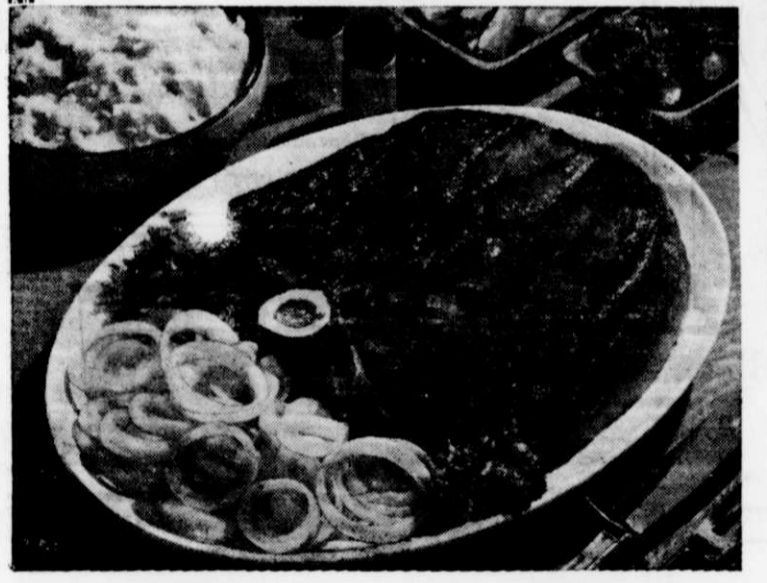

of some routes, it is difficult to juggle them and make it all come out and at the same time maintain some economic feasibility," Brenholt stated.

The board concurred that no child should have to walk in so-called hazardous areas and it was said the Washington County sheriff's department had been asked to determine what areas are termed "hazardous." The matter has been referred to a sheriff's department committee. Gundrum assured the electors that "we will keep working at the problems to see if they can be worked out." Brenholt said in order to treat people alike, "we will have to set some hard and fast walking policies but we will have to take a good look at it."

The board denied a request from Harold Schlosser who recently moved to the Town of Wayne, just beyond Holy Trinity boundaries, to have his two children transported to Holy Trinity School, Kewaskum. It based its decision on the fact that when parochial school bussing was started several years ago, each parish was asked to define its boundary lines for school attendance. Schlosser now resides in the boundaries of St. Matthew's parish, Campbellsport, but he said Rev. John Budde accepted his children at Holy Trinity because they are members of his parish.

On recommendation of Supt. Brenholt, the board approved adding two teachers to the Kewaskum Elementary staff, one for first grade and one for second, in view of the fact there are 30 and 32 in first grade sections and 35 and 34 in second grade sections. Before voting yes, board member Dr. Charles Ogi said he was under the impression that when additional teacher aides were approved in June, Principal Richard Zarling said "it is either more aides or more teachers." It was said no new aides were assigned to 1st and 2nd grades. To Ogi's

question, "were we misinformed?" Brenholt replied, "if you were, it was not intentional." Brenholt said the teachers will actually cost the district nothing in view of the fact that because of increased enrollments, state aids will go up between \$30,000 and \$40,000 while the two new teachers salaries will amount to about \$16,000 per year.

Also approved was a new salary schedule for substitute teachers that sets a rate of \$21 per day for the first 5 days, \$26 per day for 6 to 10 consecutive days; \$30 per day after 10 consecutive days; and \$12 per half day. The \$26 and \$30 rates will apply only if the teacher has the same substituting assignments. If a teacher subs 10 consecutive days but has 10 different assignments, the rate will be \$21 per day. The increase was based on the view that the longer a sub remains in a given assignment, the more planning he must do.

The board approved a policy under which principals and guidance counselors will be allowed to use their discretion to allow waiving of the physical education requirement for junior and senior high students who have conflicts in schedules with physical education, based on the best interests of the student. Purchase of 65 new elementary student desks at a total cost of about \$1,500 was approved to fill a need for 40 and allow the rest for spares.

A representative of Butler Buildings presented cost figures and information about a prefabricated metal building that could be put up at the Wayne School. The board has not officially decided to build but has gone on record as "favoring" an addition. He was asked to appear as a way of finding out if the addition can be built cheaper than a cost estimate provided by architects Schutte-Mochon. The Butler man said his company builds under 7 different systems that range from \$8.50 to \$35 per square foot, depending on the grades of materials and type of construction.

In interpreting the board's instructions to his company, he quoted a cost of between \$9.50 and \$16.80 per square foot "depending on what you want." The figure is for total construction and includes architectural fees, carpentry, acoustical ceiling, heating, plumbing, electrical, but does not include a septic system. The 70 by 120 foot addition would not have a basement for the quoted price. He said their type of construction "saves time, confusion and money." The building could be completed in 3 to 3½ months, he said.

Random Lake fumbled on the kickoff and the Indians' Cal Tackes fell on it on the Rams' 18. Gary Marx scored another TD 3 plays later with Koepke again converting. This gave the Indians a 20-0 lead at the end of the first quarter.

Luedtke hit Koepke early in the 2nd period on a play—27-0. Then Luedtke turned pass great 26-0. Then Al Schmidt recovered another Ram fumble and Gaffke scored the 5th TD after a 38-yard drive to bring the score way out of reach to 33-0 at halftime. The visitors made just one first down and gained only 26 yards in the first
