7,000 Attend Turkey Shoot; 450 Birds Taken

The 20th annual Turkey Shoot sponsored by Kewaskum Kiwanis at the Bar-N Ranch Sunday was favored with wonderful weather until late afternoon when rain threatened. But the attendance was down from two years ago (last year's event was postponed because of rain), no doubt because of the switch from using live turkeys as targets to small balloons.

Chairmen of the event estimated that there were from 7,000 to 8,000 persons in attendance. This was based on the fact that there were 3,500 shooters at the line, mostly men, and not including many of the women and children present and those participating in other events only. About 450 turkeys were taken home by the shooters compared to the 600-650 which were won several years ago with the live targets.

There were 36 lines open for the shooters. The first 10 were limited to women and children. They had balloons which were approximately twice the size of those on the rest of the lines for men.

The club abandoned live targets last year because of pressure from animal protection groups and a threat from Kiwanis International that the club's charter might be revoked if the practice continued. Besides it is now a state law that live animals cannot be used in shooting events.

Besides the turkey shoot, there was trap shooting, trout fishing, bow and arrow competition, air rifle target shooting, sausage shoot, games, rides, food and BEVERAGES.

Earthquake Tremors Felt In This Area

Kewaskum and surrounding area felt tremors from the earthquake which shook a large portion of the midwest early Friday morning. The tremor occurred about 12:25 a. m. and lasted less than a minute.

Residents who were still up were startled by the tremor and left wondering what was happening. Many of those sleeping were awakened. Most people reported that the tremor sounded like a large semi-truck pulling uphill. Others walking said the ground and sidewalk seemed to move around. The "quake" shook buildings and rattled windows.

One report in the press stated that the tremor damaged Dave's Music Center building at 1269 Fond du Lac Ave., cracking the front of the building in several places and lower portion of the concrete stairs causing the stairs to settle, and cracking and knocking loose some mortar.

Dave Skrentny, owner, said this report was unfounded and that the information and pictures were published without his knowledge or consent. He said, "first of all I feel the whole issue was greatly over-publicized. The only thing involved in question would be the outside stairway which was noticeably cracked and brought to my attention the morning after the tremor. To which I stated it could have possibly been cracked by the quake, since it was not noticed before. In regards to the mortar on the side of the building, it had been cracked prior to the quake and in no way was cracked by the earth tremor."

Dave also reported that the incident was reported to the local police department by a neighboring resident.

The National Weather Service at Chicago reported the earthquake occurred at 12:23 a. m. and was felt from Central Illinois to the south to Oshkosh on the north and from Chicago on the east to eastern Iowa on the west.

Football Players' Bus, Auto Collide

A Kewaskum school bus carrying members of the JV football team enroute home from a game at Grafton and an auto were involved in a collision at S. Main St. and Paradise Dr., West Bend, at 6:49 p. m. Thursday. The mishap occurred when the driver of the car allegedly made an illegal left turn in front of the bus.

The accident resulted when a car driven by David J. Rose, 19, of 1701 Evergreen St. West Bend, which was southbound on Main turned left in front of a northbound bus operated by Keith Stoffel, 22, of R. 2, Kewaskum, at Paradise Dr.

Rose suffered a dislocated finger and damage to both vehicles was reported at over \$200. None of the 22 passengers on the bus or the bus driver were injured. Rose was issued a citation for failure to yield the right of way.

County Alcohol Council Reaches 1/4 of Fund Goal

REIGLE MAKES FIRST SIZEABLE DONATION

The first sizeable donation to the Washington County Council on Alcoholism, Inc. was made by Ronald O. Reigle, Vice President of Regal Ware. Their donation was in excess of \$1 per employee in Wisconsin.

The Knights of Columbus, West Bend Council 1964, of Holy Angels Church, West Bend, also donated to the WCCA a check that equaled \$1 per member.

The Council is trying to raise \$10,000 so it can maintain the Alcohol Information and Referral Center at 338-0880. The additional money raised locally may be matched by a federal grant under the Hughes Bill whereby \$566,909 has been released to the State of Wisconsin for use in localities where duly authorized and regulated Councils have been organized to comprehensively combat the illness, alcoholism. Distribution of this money is based on allocating \$3 federal funds for every \$1 of local funds.

These latest donations brought the fund raising effort to a quarter of the goal.

The object of the Washington County Council on Alcoholism, Inc. is to increase public information and understanding of the chemical dependency on alcohol, its nature and treatment.

It is estimated there are over 2,000 alcoholics in Washington County, and for every alcoholic, five persons are directly affected by the illness. Therefore, it can be said, over 10,000 persons are affected directly by alcoholism in this area.

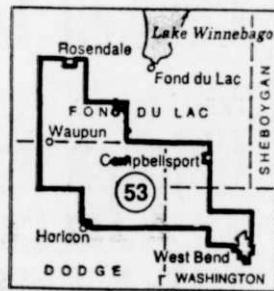

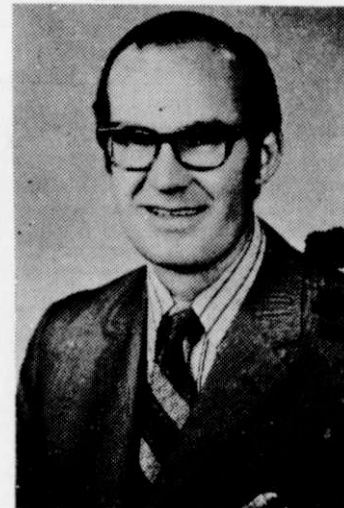

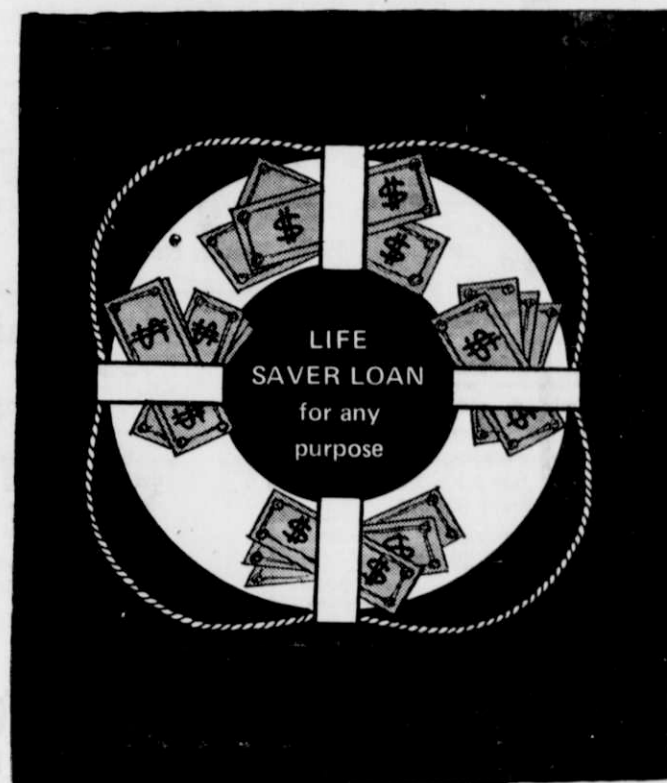

Indians Come From Behind to Beat Grafton in Thriller, 22-16

In a well played, rock 'em—sock 'em football game here Friday night the Kewaskum Indians rallied in the second half to defeat a tough Grafton team, 22-16, and had to stave off a last minute threat by the Blackhawks to do it.

The win got the Indians off to a flying start in their Scenic Moraine opener. They are now 3-0 and have rolled up 109 points (41, 46 and 22) to their opponents' 23 in 3 outings.

We predicted a tough game for Kewaskum after Grafton upset Lake Geneva and gave a good West Bend West team a close battle in its first 2 contests—and that it was. It was parents' night and their boys gave them a real show. Indicating how rough the going was out there, Grafton had to call a number of time-outs for injured players.

Grafton ran up a 16-7 lead in the first half before the Indians could get untraced but Kewaskum dominated the game in the second half, scoring 15 points while holding the visitors scoreless.

But the Indians had to hang on for dear life at the end. Leading 22-16, they owned the ball with 44 seconds left but could not run out the clock. They lined up to punt deep in their own territory, however, the snap from center was low and when punter Jeff Koth's knee was claimed to have touched the ground by the referee in fielding the ball, Grafton was given possession on Kewaskum's 17 yard line with a first down. The Indians held on downs and with Grafton having no time outs left (due to previous injuries) the game ended on a wild pass attempt by the Blackhawks.

Kewaskum drew first blood with several minutes left in the first quarter. After a 65 yard drive, highlighted by a 25 yard scamper by quarterback Dale Luedtke, fullback Gary Marx scored from the 1. Mike Koepke kicked the extra point.

Paced by a 63 yard run by halfback Kim Visselman, Grafton roared right back to score with Don Walsch taking it in from the 1. Brian Muenier ran for a 2 point conversion to make it 8-7. Walsh scored another TD in the 2nd period on a 4 yard sprint with Muenier, who capped the drive with a 33 yard run, again running a 2 point conversion. This gave Grafton a 16-7 halftime lead.

Kewaskum came in strong to start the second half. They drove 59 yards on their first series and

scored on a 5 yard dash by Jim Gaffke, with Koepke adding the point. This made it 16-14. After Kewaskum's defense checked the Blackhawks' offense, the Indians went on the move again. After driving 54 yards, Gaffke squirted for 8 yards and another score. A pass from Luedtke to Koepke gave them a 2 point conversion and Kewaskum led 22-16 and that's all there was until the last 44 seconds of excitement.

After Grafton 182 yards and 9 first downs in the first half, Kewaskum's defense did a complete reverse and really got tough in the 2nd half, in which they held the Blackhawks to 30 yards and only 2 first downs. Grafton's passing attack was almost non-existent. They failed to make a yard passing, going 0 for 2.

Gaffke led the Indians' rushing attack with 81 yards in 19 attempts. He scored 2 touchdowns, his 7th and 8th of the season. Luedtke gained 65 yards in 7 carries. Muenier led Grafton with 107 in 23 carries.

Tonight (Friday) the Indians make the long trip to Kettle Moraine for a 7:30 game. Mayville rushed for 240 yards against K-M last Friday for an easy 23-6 win and Kewaskum hopes to duplicate the feat tonight.

Kewaskum's Backhaus came in first in the Class C division at the annual Highlander Cross Country Invitational at Homestead High School, Thiensville, Saturday.

Backhaus finished the 2.5 mile course in 13 minutes, 27 seconds, 100 yards ahead of his nearest competitor. His time was better than the winning time in B class and tied that of the A class.

Glen Asch of the Indians placed 4th. Brookwood won the C title with 61 points, followed by Grafton with 66, New Berlin Eisenhower 101, Evansville 110, Kewaskum 119, Franklin 131, Germantown 146, Brown Deer 148, Milwaukee Juneau 251.

After their 1st and 4th place finishes the best Kewaskum could do was a 31st by Curt Schmidt, 34th by Doug Wilson, 49th by Dale Secor and 55th by Mike Faber.

Kewaskum won 4th in the JV competition, paced by Grafton.

Last Tuesday the Indians easily beat Pewaukee, 17-41, there in Scenic ground. Kewaskum took 1st, 2nd, 3rd and 4th places. Backhaus was 1st with a time of 13:58. Asch was 2nd, followed by Schmidt, 3rd, and Faber, 4th.

The Indians got back to dual meet action Tuesday against Slinger here. Results next week.
