School Board Hears Third Building Proposal for Addition at Wayne

GIVE READING TO REVISED TRANSPORTATION POLICY

Continuing its effort to put up a proposed addition to the Wayne School in the most economical way, the Board of Education heard a third building proposal Monday night. No action was taken.

Appearing at the board's request with information and cost figures was Ray Prossen of the R. G. Prossen Co. He said his firm is primarily a mason and concrete oriented one, using pre-cast materials in a modular type system of building. His headquarters are in the Town of Pewaukee.

Also present was Jack Fieweger of the architectural firm of Schutte Mochon which prepared working drawings of the proposed addition several years ago but was turned down as part of a referendum. Present building costs have been estimated by the firm at \$200,000. Two weeks ago, the board interviewed a representative of Butler Buildings, builders of pre-fabricated metal type structures. He quoted costs of between \$9.50 and \$16.80 per square foot, depending on the level of construction wanted.

Prossen told the board his firm can put up an addition of 8,200 square feet using faced brick for \$125,000, or \$15.50 per square foot. The same building using no brick would be \$117,000 or \$14.50 per square foot. Both prices are for a complete turn-key building, meaning the building is owned by the builder until he turns the key over.

Prossen said, however, that he was able to include only an estimate of the cost estimate of a septic system because he was contacted by the board too late to have his men go to Wayne for the necessary tests.

He observed that by adding 9.4 square feet to the proposed addition, it would conform exactly in shape to the existing school building and would yield an extra classroom. The additional 9.4 square feet would add \$100,000 to the cost. His costs and plans, however, call for roomed-off classrooms, while the board favors open concept.

Eliminating interior walls would trim the costs some, Prossen stated and he then told Supt. Floyd Brenholt, "I will have the exact figures in your hands tomorrow, including exact figures on the septic system." He said the addition could be put up in less than 90 days.

Fieweger was then confronted by board members with, "Why are your cost figures higher—where does the difference come in?" Fieweger noted that the working drawings were made several years ago, based on "your criteria, what you wanted at that time." He added there would be some savings going to the management construction type of bidding.

Fieweger had with him notes prepared by the architect who made the drawings but who was unable to attend the meeting because of illness. These notes indicated areas where building costs could be cut. He was instructed to

present re-worked drawings and adjusted figures for the board's consideration.

Board consensus was that it is necessary to find out if these three types of buildings are of equal quality. None of the board members felt he is capable of making the comparison and a suggestion from Dr. Charles Ogi was to hire a building consultant. No action was taken.

First reading was given to a revised transportation policy. New to the policy is a clause which designates the maximum that a student may be expected to walk to a bus pick-up point. The distance for kindergarteners is one-eighth mile; for Grades 1-6, one-quarter mile and for Grades 7-12, one-half mile.

Another clause states, "students whose home driveways lie on the route will normally be picked up at the intersection of the driveway and the road which the bus is traveling. Where two or more homes are close together, however, students may be expected to walk no more than the distances listed above."

The previous transportation policy did not include how far a child might be expected to walk. The figures were inserted into the policy to serve as guidelines, Brenholt said and are the guidelines from the State Department of Public Instruction. The policy is up for a second reading and adoption at the next board meeting Oct. 9.

Children's Service Society Drive On; Committee Named

In announcing the start of the 1972 support solicitation in Washington County, the Children's Service Society of Wisconsin has indicated that 1971 services to children and families in need exceeded the services of the previous year. Although there was a slight decline in the number of children placed in adoptive homes and in the children who received foster family care, there was a radical increase in unwed parent services, children and families served through counseling and in the total number of children helped.

In announcing that 1,753 Wisconsin children received help from the Children's Service Society in 1971 it was stressed that services are available to everyone regardless of race, creed or social status.

Postal Service Promises 'Speedy' Special Delivery

Postmaster Harry E. Koch advised our office today that a system to speed up special delivery of airmail and first class letters, flats and small parcels will be added to the U. S. mail on Oct. 1.

Milwaukee officer in charge Emerson L. Paulsen said postal authorities recognize the need to improve special delivery service. He noted that Postmaster General E. T. Klassen recently told a press conference in Washington, D. C., that "special delivery service for many years has been a disgrace."

At that time Klassen announced plans to install a nation-wide improvement program based on the use of a self-identifying plastic "speedy bag." The speedy bags will be used within the mail system to keep special delivery mail from losing its way among millions of other pieces of mail.

Paulsen noted that a six-month test program executed at 4,500 post offices in the West "has shown a reliability rate in the high 90s."

Speedy special delivery bags are made of polyethylene and are 20" by 30". The Postal Service eagle and the words "speedy" and "special delivery" are imprinted in green.

"All special delivery letters, flats and small parcels normally dispatched in mail pouches will be placed in speedy bags," Paul-

sen said. "The speedy bags then will be placed in a mail pouch or loose pack in such a manner that approximately four inches of the green imprint on the speedy bag is exposed when the pouch or loose pack is closed."

"Upon arrival at the destination or next processing office, pouches containing speedy bags are opened first and the speedy bag is removed and immediately taken to the distribution area for priority processing," Paulsen explained.

He said that studies have shown special delivery mail to be delayed within post offices when it gets intermixed with standard first class mail. This caused it to miss special delivery "runs," he added.

Paulsen pointed out that public also frequently contributes to slow movement of special delivery mail when special delivery mail is dropped into street collection boxes or other mail deposit points without checking whether there will be an expeditious pickup afterwards.

"Special delivery mail is best deposited at a post office where it can move promptly to the station that will finally deliver it," he

said. Mailers also should consider whether a particular item should go via air mail special delivery to insure fastest possible movement in transit as well as at the destination," he added.

Gaffke Paces Indians to 12-0 Win Over Kettle Moraine; Record Now 4-0

The Kewaskum Indians won their second straight Scenic Moraine game at Kettle Moraine Friday night, 12-0, to bring their overall record for the season to 4-0. The Indians are tied for first place with Mayville and Hartland Arrowhead.

In their four wins (2 of them shutouts), Kewaskum has rolled up 121 points compared to a skimpy 23 for their opponents. This is an average of over 30 points per contest.

Halfback Jim Gaffke, an all-conference selection on both offense and defense last year, again was the hero for the Indians. He scored both of his team's touchdowns, rushed for 168 yards on 26 carries, and made some jarring tackles. Gaffke's touchdowns were his 10th and 11th of the season. He has scored over half of his team's total 121 points and has over 400 yards.

The final score doesn't tell Kewaskum's superiority over the bigger Lasers. The statistics do. The Indians made 16 first downs to only 7 for the losers. Kewaskum made 257 yards rushing to the Lasers' 51, 54 yards passing to their 2, and had 311 total yards to a paltry 53 for their opponents. Kewaskum completed 4 of 8 passes to KM's 3 of 16 and the Lasers had 2 intercepted.

Kettle Moraine penetrated Indian territory only once, as the result of a tremendous job by Kewaskum's defense. The Indians' defense, where most of the re-

building had to be done, seemed to have jelled in this game. Head Coach Harlow cited the defensive work of Cal Tackes and Dale Prost especially in bottling up the quarterback options.

Kewaskum's first score came in the initial quarter. After being held on the 2 yard line they got the ball back on a punt and went in after a 20 yard carry by quarterback Dale Luedtke and a 15 yard pass to Mike Koepke. Gaffke put it in from 1 yard out.

There was no scoring in the 2nd quarter but the Lasers made their deepest penetration to the 33 late in the period. A pass knocked down by Gary Marx ended the threat. The Indians took command again in the second half. There was no scoring in the third quarter but the Indians got the ball on their own 20 late in the period and put on an 80 yard drive. Gaffke again carried it in from the 1 as the 4th quarter began. Like the first time, a pass for the extra points again failed. Kewaskum's offensive line did a good job in clearing the way.

The Kewaskum JV's and freshmen weren't as successful as the varsity against Kettle Moraine. The frosh lost 22-6 Thursday evening there and the JV's were downed 30-0 Friday.

longer than the period hereinafter specified at any time between the hours of 8:00 a. m. and 6:00 p. m. except Sundays and national holidays upon the following streets or portions of streets: Parking time on any street or portion thereof where such signs are adequately posted giving notice shall be restricted to the limits posted.

2. ALL-NIGHT PARKING REGULATED. When signs have been erected at or reasonably near the corporate limits of the village as provided in s. 349.13, Wis. Stats., no person excepting physicians on emergency calls, shall park a private vehicle on a public street or highway in the Village of Kewaskum for a period longer than 20 minutes, from November 1st to April 1st between the hours of 12:00 o'clock midnight, and 7:00 o'clock a. m., unless such person parks the vehicle in accordance with the following subsection:

- (a) On the even numbered side of the street or highway on those dates which bear an even calendar date at 12:01 a. m.
- (b) On the odd numbered side of the street or highway on those dates which bear an odd calendar date at 12:01 a. m.

Section 3.05 WEIGHT LIMITS AND HEAVY TRAFFIC ROUTES.

1. CLASS "B" HIGHWAYS DESIGNATED. All streets and alleys within the village of Kewaskum, Wisconsin, except the following enumerated streets and alleys, are hereby designated class "B" highways and shall be subject to the weight limitations imposed by s. 348.16, Wis. Stats.:

Fond du Lac Avenue, Main Street, and County Trunk Highway "H"

2. SPECIAL AND SEASON WEIGHT LIMITATIONS. The Street Commissioner shall have the authority to impose special or seasonal weight limits to prevent injury to the roadway of any highway, bridge or culvert within the jurisdiction of the village or for the safety of users of such highway, bridge or culvert and shall be responsible for erecting signs giving notice thereof in accordance with s. 349.16, Wis. Stats.

3. HEAVY TRAFFIC ROUTES. (a) HEAVY TRAFFIC ROUTES DESIGNATED. The following streets and parts of streets within the village of Kewaskum, Wisconsin, are hereby designated heavy traffic routes:

Fond du Lac Avenue, Main Street, County Trunk Highway "H"

(b) RESTRICTIONS ON USE OF OTHER STREETS BY HEAVY TRAFFIC. No vehicle, except a motor bus, which is not equipped with pneumatic tires or has a combined vehicle load weight exceeding 6,000 pounds shall be operated or moved on any street or alley not part of the heavy traffic route designated in par. (a) of this section in the village of Kewaskum, except for the purpose of obtaining orders for, moving or delivering supplies or commodities to or from a place of business or residence facing thereon, provided that in no event shall the weight of vehicle and load on such other street exceed the limitation of ss. 348.15 or 348.16 (3) of the Wisconsin statutes pertaining to class "A" highways or deliveries on class "B" highways.

Section 3.06 ACCIDENT REPORTS.

The operator of any vehicle involved in an accident shall within three (3) days after such accident file with the village police department a copy of the report required by s. 346.70, Wis. Stats., if any. If the operator is unable to make such report, any occupant of the vehicle at the time of the accident capable of making such report shall have the duty to comply with this section. Such reports shall be subject to the provisions and limitation in ss. 346.70 (4) (f) and 346.73, Wis. Stats.

Section 3.07 ABANDONED VEHICLES.

1. ABANDONED VEHICLE DEFINED. Any vehicle, whether licensed or unlicensed, which has remained on any street, highway or road in the Village of Kewaskum for more than seven (7) days without the written permission of the Chief of Police or his authorized agent shall be an abandoned vehicle within the meaning of this section.

2. NOTICE. The Police Department of the Village of Kewaskum shall make reasonable efforts to locate the owner of any abandoned vehicle. If such an owner can be found, he shall be required to immediately remove such vehicle or be subjected to a possible penalty in addition to having the Police Department remove the vehicle.

3. REMOVAL AND STORAGE. It shall be the duty of the Police Department to direct removal of any abandoned vehicle. Such vehicle shall be removed to an area for storage. The vehicle shall remain in storage for a period not to exceed thirty days. At the end of thirty days, the Village Police may direct the removal and sale of the vehicle. Any costs received in the sale of the vehicle shall be used to offset the costs incurred in storage of the vehicle. The storage rate shall be one (\$1.00) Dollar per day. Upon the removal and sale of the vehicle the Police Department shall keep a record which will set forth the name of the party removing the vehicle, the price paid for the vehicle, the costs for the storage of the vehicle, and reasonable identification of the vehicle.

Section 3.08 OFFICIAL TRAFFIC SIGNS AND SIGNALS.

1. VILLAGE COMMISSIONER AUTHORIZED TO PROCURE AND ERECT SIGNS AND SIGNALS. The Village Commissioner is hereby authorized and directed to procure, erect and maintain appropriate standard traffic signs, signals and markings conforming to the rules of the state highway division giving such notice of the provisions of this ordinance as required by state law. Signs shall be erected in such locations and manner as the Chief of Police, with the approval of the Village Board, shall determine will best effect the purposes of this ordinance and give adequate warning to users of the street or highway.

2. REMOVAL OF UNOFFICIAL SIGNS AND SIGNALS. The Chief of Police shall have the authority granted by s. 349.09, Wis. Stats., and is hereby directed to order the removal of a sign, signal, marking or device placed, maintained or displayed in violation of this ordinance or s. 346.41, Wis. Stats. Any charge imposed on a premises for removal of such an illegal sign, signal or device shall be reported to the village board at its next regular meeting for review and certification.

Section 3.09 PENALTY.

The penalty for violation of any provision of this ordinance shall be a forfeiture as hereinafter provided together with the cost of prosecution imposed as provided in ss. 345.20 to 345.53, Wis. Stats.

1. UNIFORM OFFENSES. Except as provided in subsection (4) for nonmoving traffic offenses, forfeitures for violation of any provision of chs. 341 to 348 adopted by reference in section 3.01 and 3.02 of this ordinance shall conform to forfeitures for violation of the comparable state offense, including any variations or increases for second offenses.

2. SPECIAL LOCAL REGULATIONS. The forfeiture for violation of sections 3.03, 3.05, 3.06, and 3.08 of this ordinance shall be not less than \$25.00 nor more than \$200.00 for the first offense and not less than \$50.00 nor more than \$500.00 for the second offense within 2 years.

3. MISCELLANEOUS. The forfeiture for violation of any provision of section 3.01 (2) of this ordinance shall be not less than \$50.00 nor more than \$200.00.

4. NONMOVING VIOLATIONS.

(a) PARKING. The forfeiture for violation of parking regulations in section 3.04 of this ordinance shall be not less than \$1.00 nor more than \$25.00. The forfeitures for offenses described in ss. 346.50 to 346.55, Wis. Stats., adopted by reference in section 3.01 of this ordinance shall be:

- 346.51 (1) - Improper parking on/off roadway \$1.00 to \$200.00
- 346.52 (1) - Stopping/standing in prohibited areas \$1.00 to \$40.00
2nd conviction within one year \$2.00 to \$100.00
- 346.52 (2) - Stopping/standing on hwy by grade school \$1.00 to \$40.00
2nd conviction within one year \$2.00 to \$100.00
- 346.53 - Parking/standing where prohibited \$1.00 to \$40.00
2nd conviction within one year \$2.00 to \$100.00
- 346.54 - Improper parking/standing of vehicle \$1.00 to \$40.00
2nd conviction within one year \$2.00 to \$100.00
- 346.55 (1) - Parking on left side of hwy \$1.00 to \$200.00
- 346.55 (2) - Parking vehicle for sale on hwy \$1.00 to \$200.00
- 346.55 (3) - Parking on posted private property \$1.00 to \$40.00
2nd conviction within one year \$2.00 to \$100.00

(b) ABANDONED VEHICLES. Any person found to have violated the provisions of Section 3.07 of this section shall be required to forfeit to the Village of Kewaskum an amount not to exceed fifty (\$50.00) Dollars nor less than ten (\$10.00) Dollars plus any costs of storage and any costs incurred in enforcing this section.

Section 3.10 ENFORCEMENT.

This ordinance shall be enforced in accordance with the provisions of ss. 345.20 to 345.53, ch. 299 and s. 66.12, of the Wisconsin statutes.

1. UNIFORM CITATION. The uniform traffic citation promulgated under s. 345.11, Wis. Stats., shall be used for all moving traffic violations under this ordinance.

2. PARKING CITATIONS. Citations for all nonmoving traffic violations under this ordinance shall conform to s. 345.28, Wis. Stats., and shall permit direct mail payment of the applicable minimum forfeiture to the village police department within 5 days of the issuance of the citation in lieu of court appearance. The issuing officer shall specify thereon the amount of the applicable forfeiture as provided in this ordinance.

3. NOTICE OF DEMERIT POINTS AND RECEIPT. Every officer accepting a forfeited penalty or money deposit under this ordinance shall receipt therefor in triplicate as provided in s. 345.26 (3) (b), Wis. Stats. Every officer accepting a stipulation under the provisions of this ordinance shall comply with the provisions of ss. 343.27, 343.28, 345.26 (1) (a) and 345.27 (2), Wis. Stats., and shall require the alleged violator to sign a statement of notice in substantially the form contained on the uniform traffic citation and complaint promulgated under s. 345.11, Wis. Stats.

4. FORFEITURES IN TREASURY; OFFICER TO POST BOND, QUALIFY. Any officer accepting deposits of forfeited penalties under this ordinance shall deliver them to the village treasurer within 20 days after receipt. Any officer authorized to accept deposits under s. 345.26, Wis. Stats., or this ordinance shall qualify by taking the oath prescribed by s. 19.01, Wis. Stats., and filing an official bond in the sum of \$10,000.00 as described by s. 19.01.

Section 3.11 REFERENCES TO STATUTES.

References to specific statutory sections wherever used in this ordinance shall mean the Wisconsin statutes of 1971.

Section 3.12 REPEAL OF CONFLICTING ORDINANCES.

All ordinances regulating traffic upon the streets, alleys and highways of the village of Kewaskum, Wisconsin, and all ordinances or parts of ordinances heretofore enacted by the village board of the village of Kewaskum, Wisconsin, which are in conflict with or inconsistent with this ordinance, are hereby repealed.

Section 3.13 SEVERABILITY.

The provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed severable and it is expressly declared that the village board would have passed the other provisions of this ordinance irrespective of whether or not one or more provisions may be declared invalid and if any provision of this ordinance or the application thereof to any person or circumstances is held invalid, the remainder of the ordinance and the application of such provisions to other persons or circumstances, shall not be affected thereby.

Section 3.14 EFFECTIVE DATE.

This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after October 1, 1972 upon passage and publication as provided by law. Introduced by Trustee Raynor Herriges.

ORDINANCE NUMBER 723

The Village Board of the Village of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, does ordain as follows:

Section 1. That Section 16.12 of Chapter XVI of the Village Code of the Village of Kewaskum be, and is hereby repealed and re-created as follows:

16.12 TRAFFIC BUREAU

1. BUREAU ESTABLISHED: There is hereby established a traffic bureau of the Village of Kewaskum, under the jurisdiction of the Chief of Police. The Bureau is hereby vested with authority to receive fees enumerated in Chapter III of the Village Code, which shall be collected by the Police Department and deposited in accordance with the provisions of Chapter III of the Village Code for depositing in the General Fund.

2. VIOLATIONS AND PENALTIES: The processing of violations and the forfeitures for said violations of village traffic ordinances shall be in the manner and amount as provided in Chapter III.

Section 2. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect after October 1, 1972 upon passage and publication in the official village newspaper.

ORDINANCE NUMBER 72-1

The Village Board of the Village of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, does ordain as follows:

Section 1. That Section 13.10 of the Village Code of the Village of Kewaskum be, and is hereby revoked and recreated as follows:

13.10 DUTCH ELM DISEASE CONTROL

1. PUBLIC NUISANCE. The Board declares the following to be public nuisances:

(a) Any living or standing elm tree or part thereof infected with an elm tree disease.

(b) Any dead elm tree or part thereof, including logs, stumps, branches, firewood or other elm material from which the bark has not been removed and burned or sprayed with an effective elm bark beetle destroying insecticide.

2. DEFINITIONS. Whenever used in this section, unless a different meaning is apparent from the context:

(a) "Disease" means the Dutch Elm Disease, a fatal disease of Elms caused by the fungus *Ceratomyxa ulmi* Buisman, as well as the causal fungus.

(b) "Vector" means the native elm bark beetle *Myurgopinus rufipee* (Eichh.) and the smaller elm bark beetle *Scolytus multistriatus* (Marsh.) which transmit the fungus to elm trees and elm material.

(c) "Tree material" means elm firewood, stump, log, branch or other barkbearing part of an elm tree.

(d) "Owner" means the owner of real estate or the person in possession of real estate and shall include any person, firm or corporation.

(e) "Administrator" means the Village Commissioner or his duly appointed representative.

(f) "Village employee" means any employee of the Village or any person or member of a firm with whom the Village contracts for the removal of trees and/or tree material.

3. Every owner in the Village of Kewaskum shall permit employees of the Village to enter upon said real estate for the purpose of examining trees. If it shall appear to any such employee that an elm tree may be diseased such employee shall be permitted to take the necessary sample of wood from said tree to have an examination made.

4. If an examination made as above provided, or made at the instance of the owner discloses that the tree has the disease, the Administrator shall give notice to the owner at his last known address, to have such diseased tree cut down within fifteen (15) days after such notice is given, then such tree shall be cut down and the same shall be destroyed by the Village employees on order of the Administrator. Accurate record of the expense of such cutting and disposal shall be made and a report thereof given to the Village Commissioner who shall enter the amount against the respective real estate in the next and subsequent tax roll as a special tax against such real estate, and the same shall be collected in all respects like other Village taxes upon real estate, expenses to be apportioned as hereinafter set forth.

5. No owner shall keep, store, sell, offer for sale, give away or transfer any elm material or transport the same into or within the Village of Kewaskum except for the purpose of immediately destroying the same.

Every owner in the Village of Kewaskum shall permit Village employees to enter upon their real estate and every garage, or other structure thereon for the

purpose of determining whether any such elm material afflicted with the disease or infected with the vector is located on said real estate, and each such owner shall permit such employee to take a sample of any such elm material for the purpose of determining whether it is afflicted with the disease or infected with the vector, and if the examination of such sample discloses that any such material is so afflicted or infested, the Administrator shall notify the owner to destroy all of such elm material located on such real estate or in any structure thereon.

If the owner does not comply with any notice given as provided in this section within fifteen days after the same is given, then on order of the Village Administrator, Village employees will remove all such afflicted and infested elm material and all such elm material not afflicted and infested and dispose of same. Accurate account of the expense of removal and disposal shall be kept and report made to the Village Commissioner who shall enter the amount thereof on the tax roll as provided in the preceding section.

6. When it has been determined that the disease is present in the Village or in adjacent communities, a spray program to protect all living elms of the said Village shall be initiated if deemed advisable which shall be in accord with the currently approved recommendations of the State of Wisconsin Dutch Elm Disease Committee; at the discretion of the Administrator, this spray program shall commence with the confirmation of the disease in areas adjacent to the Village. Trees on public property shall be sprayed at the expense of the Village. Notice of the necessity of spraying elm trees on private property shall be given by the Administrator to the owner and unless such owner shall have had such elm trees sprayed within 15 days of the time of giving such notice and have provided satisfactory evidence to the Administrator that the private spraying was done in accordance with prescribed procedure, Village employees or persons hired by the Village, shall spray such trees. Accurate record shall be kept of the cost of such spraying and report made to the Village Commissioner, who shall enter the amount thereof on the tax roll as provided for in the preceding sections.

7. Each owner of real estate in the Village shall cause all dead wood to be removed from every elm tree on his real estate and to be disposed of. In the event that it

appears to any Village employee that there is dead wood in any elm tree on private property in the Village, the Administrator shall cause notice to be given the owner to remove such dead wood. If such dead wood has not been removed within fifteen days after such notice is given, then Village employees shall remove the same and dispose of it. Accurate record of the cost of removal and disposal of dead wood shall be kept and a report made to the Village Commissioner, and the amount thereof shall be entered on the next and subsequent tax roll and collected as a special tax against such real estate as provided in the preceding sections.

8. In the event that any owner shall hinder, delay or prevent any Village employee from coming onto said owner's property to inspect or cut down any tree, said owner may be subject to a fine of \$5.00 per day, from the day the Village employee first was delayed, hindered or prevented from entering the owner's land, until such tree is inspected or in the event it is infested, until such tree is cut down.

9. The cost of cutting down any tree located on a tree lawn (more particularly described as the area between a sidewalk and curb) pursuant to notice, shall be born one-half by the Village and one-half by the owner thereof. Where such a tree is located on private property, the owner shall bear the entire cost of cutting down a tree pursuant to notice.

10. All trees cut down pursuant to notice must be cut into lengths no greater than three (3) feet and must be placed, in an orderly fashion, in the usual area where garbage is picked up, for removal and disposal by the Village at the Village's expense.

11. The Village shall have the election of using payroll employees or contracting with private concerns for the cutting down of any trees.

12. An owner's portion of the cost of cutting down infected or dead trees shall be added to the tax roll against the owner's real estate only if said owner does not pay his or her share of the expense within 30 days of being presented with a statement for said expenses.

Section 2. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect the day after publication in the official Village newspaper.

ORDINANCE NUMBER 72-2

An ordinance to regulate vehicular traffic upon the streets, highways and alleys of the Village of Kewaskum, Wisconsin.

The Village Board of the Village of Kewaskum, Wisconsin, do ordain as follows:

Section 1. That Ordinances 69-4, 69-7, 69-9 of the Village Code, Village of Kewaskum, Wisconsin are hereby repealed.

Section 2. That Chapter III of the Village Code of the Village of Kewaskum, Wisconsin, be, and is hereby repealed and recreated as follows:

Chapter III

AN ORDINANCE TO REGULATE VEHICULAR TRAFFIC UPON THE STREETS, HIGHWAYS AND ALLEYS OF THE VILLAGE OF KEWASKUM, WISCONSIN.

Section 3.01 PROVISIONS OF STATE LAW ADOPTED BY REFERENCE.

1. STATE TRAFFIC FORFEITURE LAWS ADOPTED. Except as otherwise specifically provided in this ordinance, all provisions of chapters 340 to 348 of the Wisconsin statutes describing and defining regulations with respect to vehicles and traffic for which the penalty is a forfeiture only, including penalties to be imposed and procedure for prosecution, are hereby adopted and by reference made a part of this ordinance as if fully set forth herein. Any act required to be performed or prohibited by any statute incorporated herein by reference is required or prohibited by this ordinance.

Section 3.02 SPEED LIMITS.

The village board of the village of Kewaskum hereby adopts all the posted speed limits in effect within the village at the time of passing of this ordinance. Where posted, such limits shall take precedence over statutory limits.

Section 3.03 THROUGH HIGHWAYS DESIGNATED.

In the interest of public safety and pursuant to s. 349.07, Wis. Stats., the following streets or portions thereof are declared to be through highways, and traffic signs or signals giving notice thereof shall be erected by the Village Commissioner in accordance with sec. 3.09 of this ordinance: Fond du Lac Avenue and Main Street.

Section 3.04 PARKING, STOPPING AND STANDING REGULATED.

1. PARKING LIMITS. When signs or parking meters are erected in any block giving notice thereof, no person shall park a vehicle for
