## Kiwanians to Take Part in New Share Your Life Program

A new program of personal involvement on the part of Kiwanis members called Share Your Life will get underway immediately in Kewaskum, according to Kenneth Erickson, president of the Kiwanis Club of Kewaskum.

The program will call, specifically, for personal action by Kiwanis members in the fields of service, the home, association with others, recreation and exploration . . . aspects of life suggested by the letters composing the word "share," which is a part of the program's name.

Erickson pointed out "that mutual effort on the part of all segments of society - sharing - is absolutely essential in a world like ours." He said that the Share Your Life concept is not confined to Kiwanian and Kiwanis clubs alone. "Rather," he said, "it is the hope of Kiwanis that the ideal of sharing will extend to everyone within the community."

The new program was adopted by Kiwanis International members at the organization's 57th annual convention in Atlantic City last June. It envisions Kiwanians working with young people and older people alike, to the mutual benefit of all, according to the Kiwanis president.

The first order of business on the Share Your Life program, the president said, will be: Community beautification—"We hope to involve all walks of life and all ages in the beautification of the village of Kewaskum. We are hoping to get support from all service organizations. Organizations will be contacted in the near future. Let's all share our lives to make Kewaskum a more beautiful and healthful place to live."

## Old Business Landmark to Disappear



Another old business landmark soon will be disappearing from the scene in Kewaskum as Rimmel Mfg. Co. will hold a public auction of its equipment, tools, merchandise, etc. this weekend, Oct. 14 and 15. Future plans for the site include a 16-unit apartment building.

The business was established in 1875 by Nicholas and Math Rimmel. Math later became involved in operating a sawmill in Kewaskum, and Nicholas continued with the Rimmel Hardware Co., later branching out into manufacturing of various products which included corn huskers and concrete mixers.

So much potential existed in the manufacturing business that business leaders and influential people in Kewaskum joined the company in a financial and working participation in the 20's when a corporation was formed under the name "Rimmel Corp." Concrete mixers were being shipped in large numbers throughout the country, even to an export market. Many people were employed by the company, and business prospered until the "Great Depression."

The present owner, Louis L. Bath, was employed in 1912 as a machinist, when there were only two other employees working for Nicholas Rimmel. He worked for the company continuously since that time, assisting in the design and improvement of the products. When business slowed to a standstill during the depression, Mr.

Bath rented the building and conducted a general machine and repair service for the village and surrounding farm area. In 1937 he purchased the business and property from the Rimmel Corporation and resumed the name of Rimmel Mfg. Co. Under his direction there was a revival of manufacturing, primarily of highly regarded corn huskers, sales of which again boomed, with the market including farmers in Wisconsin and several states in the East and Southeast. The company also was well known throughout the area for its retail activity in the Timken Silent Automatic heating and Norge home appliance businesses.

Mr. Bath's 60 years with the firm is in itself a remarkable achievement. His and the company's service to the community will be missed.

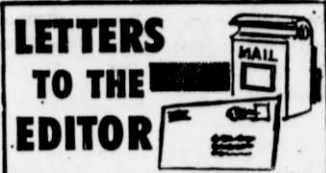
**Local News Items**

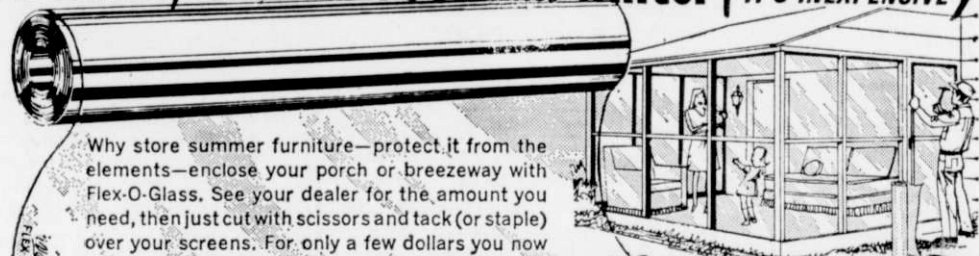

Jim had scored 10 touchdowns, gained 442 yards and led the Scenic Conference in scoring until he was injured early in the Slinger game the week before and sat out nearly 3 quarters of that contest. His injury will really hurt his chances of leading the conference.

With Gaffke out, Kewaskum's running game was slowed to a crawl. The team made only 114 yards rushing compared to 152 by Hartland. When their running game failed against a stout Hartland defense, the Indians turned to passing but completed only 6 out of 16 attempts. When quarterback Dale Luedtke's short passes were on the mark the ball was thrown too hard for the receivers to hang on to.

The Indians had some good scoring opportunities but couldn't take advantage of them except for one time. Trailing 14-8, Kewaskum had one golden opportunity to regain the lead in the second half when they reached Hartland's 4-yard line but fumbled and lost

the ball on a first down play.

Arrowhead's Tim Ordway scored his team's first touchdown in the first quarter to give them a 7-0 lead. Kewaskum bounced back to take an 8-7 lead in the second period as Luedtke hit end Mike Koepke with a 5-yard scoring pass. Jeff Koth ran over the 2-point conversion. Hartland scored the winning TD in the third quarter when Gutschenritter climaxed a drive with a touchdown. The extra point try was good to make it 14-8. With no scoring in the final quarter, that's the way it ended.

Koth, who normally plays a wingback, took over for Gaffke at halfback.

Kewaskum made 10 first downs to Hartland's 9 but the winners bested the Indians in total yards, 197 to 180. Arrowhead made 152 yards rushing to only 114 for the losers. With their running game going, Hartland tried only 5 passes, completing 3, for 45 yards, compared to 66 for Kewaskum. The Indians had 2 passes intercepted.

In other weekend games, Mayville shaded Pewaukee in the final seconds, 21-19, Germantown bested Kettle Moraine, 16-8, and Slinger ran over Grafton Saturday, 35-0.

This week Kewaskum plays a Saturday afternoon game at Pewaukee at 1:30. Winless Pewaukee shares the cellar spot but gave Mayville a real battle last week before losing in the closing seconds.

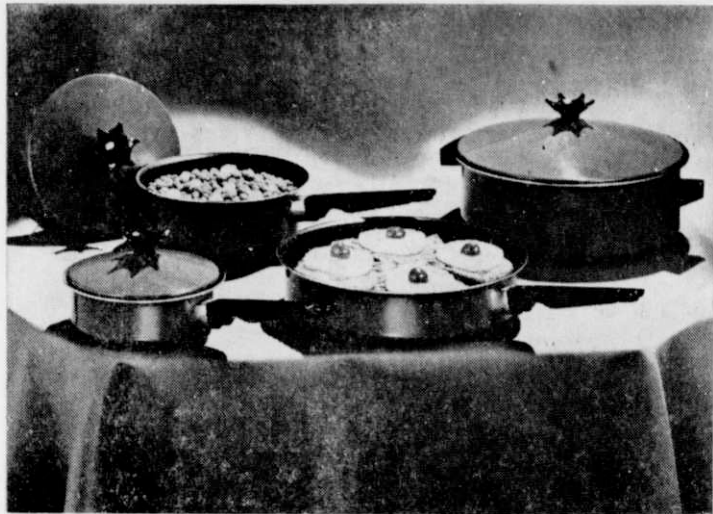
