Public Hearings Held by Board on Map, Assessments

PERMITS ISSUED FOR MORE HOMES, 10-UNIT APARTMENT

Two public hearings took place in succession in the council rooms of the municipal building Monday night.

The first was in regard to an amendment to the official map of Kewaskum. The second one dealt with a levy the village expects to make for special assessments for sewer and water on an extension of Forest Avenue where a home will be built for Dr. Cesar Sison. Only eight persons attended, most of whom were village employees.

The amendment to the map includes all changes in streets and properties in Kewaskum since the map was last updated. It is the fourth amendment since the original official map was approved by the village board in 1957. The board will act on the official acceptance of the amended map at its next board meeting.

The sewer and water project involves all property fronting on both sides of Forest Avenue from Hillside Drive to Edgewood Road. Besides Dr. Sison, the property owners are Robert Zarling, Carl Freehauf and James Schulz. None of them was present to voice an objection.

Members of the village board then went into an adjourned session to discuss the sewer and water project and to issue seven building permits. Consulting engineer James Elder said he estimates the cost of the sewer and water project at \$6,760 plus ten per cent engineering fees.

The next step is for Village Commissioner William Martin to calculate what the special assessment will amount to for each of the property owners involved. Each will be notified and asked to sign a waiver form. A resolution calling for installation of the water mains and laterals will then be drafted and go before the board for passage.

Supt. of Public Works Armin Oppermann estimated the job will take several days. The village employees will lay laterals and mains. An excavating firm will be hired to dig the trenches. The project is expected to be started next week.

Building permits were issued to Raymond Krueger for an attached garage, family room and patio at his home at 218 North Ave.; to Leroy Zipperer for a one-family residence in Bel-Ric Acres; to William Paschke for a 10-unit apartment building in Bel-Ric Acres; to Myron Belger for a breezeway at his residence in Bel-Ric Acres; to Murray Construction, Milwaukee, for a one-family residence in Bel-Ric Acres; to Ron Ellefson for remodeling the garage at his residence at 501 Main St., and to Local 849 for a parking lot adjacent to its building on Fond du Lac Ave.

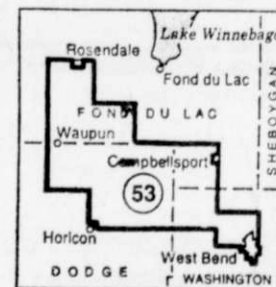

Indians Shut Out Pewaukee, 12-0, to Spoil Homecoming

After suffering their only loss to undefeated Hartland Arrowhead the week before (without the services of running back Jim Gaffke), Kewaskum's Indians regained their winning ways in an afternoon game at Pewaukee Saturday where they blanked the Pirates, 12-0, to spoil their homecoming.

The Indians are now 6-1 overall and are tied for second with Germantown Washington, both with a 4-1 conference marks. Of the Indians' 6 victories, 3 of them have been shutouts, and the team has run up a total of 147 points compared to their opponents' 40.

Kewaskum had to weather a rough first quarter and come back to win at Pewaukee. The homecoming inspired Pirates started out by marching from their own 27 yard line to the Indian 15 before Kewaskum held. Then the Indians took over and Jeff Koth dashed for 18 yards on the first play but fumbled trying for extra yards and Pewaukee recovered. Again the Pirates drove, this time to Kewaskum's 5 but the Indian defense rose to the occasion by stopping them again at the 5 where they fumbled with Kewaskum recovering.

About half way through the 2nd period, the Indians got their first first-down on a pass from Dale Luedtke to Mike Koepke which gained 32 yards. A couple of plays later, Koth redeemed himself with a fine 46 yard touchdown run and Koepke's conversion made it 7-0.

Kewaskum had another great opportunity to score later in the same quarter on an interception by Greg Ogi, who brought the ball back to the Pirate 26. The Indians drove to the 4 but again the drive was stopped.

Kewaskum ate up much of the clock in the third period until Luedtke broke loose for a 54 yard gallop late in the quarter to put the ball on Pewaukee's 20. Gary Marx fumbled immediately and again the Pirates recovered.

Facing a stiff wind in the final stanza, Pewaukee attempted an early pass which was picked off by Buddy Rumsey and fumbled, then picked up again by Scott Koth and advanced to the Pirate

27. After a number of plays, the Indians facing a 4th and 7 they elected to try for a field goal. Soph Koepke split the uprights for a 25 yarder to make it 10-0. Koepke may have made history with his field goal as it is the first one in the memory of KHS football. Coach Harlow must be happy that Koepke will be around for another 2 years.

Harlow praised his defense for really hanging in there, especially in the first quarter. He singled out tackle Al Schmidt and linebackers Koth and Ogi for fine work. Koth also was leading ground gainer with 90 yards.

Pewaukee topped the Indians with 12 first downs to 10, but Kewaskum outgained them rushing, 186-176, and passing, 65-28, for 251 total yards to their 204. Kewaskum completed 5 of 11 passes to the Pirates' weak 4 of 17. The Indians lost 3 fumbles and the Pirates 2.

In other Scenic games, played on Friday, Hartland won its 5th straight over Grafton, 21-9, Germantown bumped Mayville, 15-7, and Slinger blanked Kettle Moraine, 13-0.

Tonight (Friday) the Indians travel to Mayville to meet their arch rivals in a big game. Kewaskum hasn't forgotten it was the Cardinals who beat them out of the title last season. Mayville has slipped to 3-2 this year and Kewaskum is 4-1 but the game rates as a toss-up. The Indians should have Gaffke back for this battle but the Cardinals have the home field advantage.
