Indians Trim Germantown in Final Game, 28-10; Gain Tie for Second

Kewaskum's Indians gained a 3-way tie for second place, behind Hartland's unbeaten champions, by racking Germantown in the season's finale here Friday night, 28-10. The win could be termed an upset as Germantown had a 5-1 record going into the game and had not been defeated since the season's opener. The Indians now share the 2nd spot with Germantown and Mayville, all with 5-2 marks. Kewaskum wound up with a fine overall 7-2 record.

The game was close during the first half, which ended with Kewaskum leading 14-10, but the Indians pulled out of reach with touchdowns in both the 3rd and 4th quarters, while holding the Warhawks scoreless with a tight defense. The Indians scored 7 points in every period.

Kewaskum scored first midway through the first quarter on a Dale Luedtke to Jeff Koth pass and soph Mike Koepke added his first of 4 consecutive extra point kicks. Germantown came right back with a drive of their own, sparked by the running of Todd Pollpeter. Lew Potter made the TD from the 1-yard line and Lenny Manna converted the point after.

In the 2nd quarter the Warhawks, on 4 first downs, drove to the Kewaskum 7. But the Indians held, forcing Germantown to try for a field goal. Manna's kick was good to make it 10-7. But not for long. On the kickoff Gary Marx returned to his own 47 yard line. Jim Gaffke reeled off another 28 on the first play and the Indians were on their way. Four plays later Gaffke carried it in from the 12 and Koepke converted once more to make it 14-10.

After one more threat by Germantown early in the 2nd half, Kewaskum dominated the play the rest of the way. Fine defensive work stopped the Warhawks' drive on Kewaskum's 15. The Indians took over and marched 85 yards for a score, featured by a crucial 4th down pass from Luedtke to Dave Gruber. On this drive, Marx took it from the 1 yard line.

Kewaskum put the game out of reach with another TD in the final stanza on a 9-yard pass from Luedtke to Koepke in the end zone. This drive also was highlighted by a Luedtke to Gruber pass, who made a sensational one handed catch good for 22 yards. Koepke converted his 4th straight PAT.

Some highlights were the excellent passing of Luedtke, who probably had his best game, and the receiving of Gruber, who made 4 catches for 64 yards. Gaffke added 102 yards running in 15 carries and caught a pass. Pollpeter stood out for the losers with 114 yards on 15 carries.

The Indians made 14 first downs to Germantown's 10. They outgained them rusing, 174 to 165, and passing, 121 to 54, for a total of 295 yards to 219 for the Warhawks. Luedtke completed 9 of 17 passes to Germantown's 4 for 14. Kewaskum had 2 passes intercepted and the visitors 1.

In other games Friday Hartland nabbed the Scenic title with a 20-0 win over Slinger and Pewaukee shaded Kettle Moraine, 7-6.

On Saturday Mayville squeezed by Grafton, 15-14, to gain a share of 2nd place.

Adult Recreation Program Begins At School Nov. 8

The Kewaskum Community Schools will again sponsor an adult recreation program beginning Nov. 8 for all residents of the Kewaskum school district which includes Beechwood, Farmington and Wayne at the Kewaskum Elementary School gymnasium. Since it is a "fun" program, adults should not hesitate to take part.

The program will be free of charge and will be open to any and only adult residents of the Kewaskum school district, 18 years of age or older, who are no longer attending high school. High school students and/or other children will not be allowed. This is an "adult" program for the district. Adults will have an opportunity to get some recreational physical exercise through basketball, volleyball, etc. The program depends on those who participate.

Beginning on Nov. 8 and 9, Wednesdays from 8:00 - 10:00 p. m. will be for men and 8:00 - 10:00 p. m. on Thursdays for women. There will be no program operating during vacation periods or on days when the school is closed due to custodial work schedule conflicts. Locker room and shower-room facilities will be available. Participants will be responsible for "their own towel, soap, etc."

It is hoped that the adults of the district will avail themselves of the program during the winter months ahead when other recreational activities are curtailed.

General Election Day Nov. 7

Only a few more days and all the campaigning will be over when voters go to the polls on Tuesday, Nov. 7, to cast their ballots on General Election Day throughout the state and nation.

Wisconsin citizens will go to the polls to select a president and vice president, congressmen, state senators, representatives to the assembly and county officers. There will be no election for state officers who are now elected for four year terms and the incumbents have two more years to go.

On entering the polling place on Tuesday, voters will be handed two separate ballots, one large state and county ballot and one smaller presidential ballot.

The presidential ballot contains the names of George McGovern and R. Sargent Shriver, Democrats; Richard M. Nixon and Spiro T. Agnew, Republicans; and five minor presidential candidates on the American Party, Socialist Labor Party, Communist Party, Socialist Workers Party and Peoples Party.

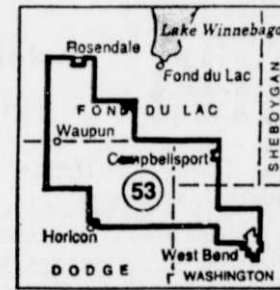

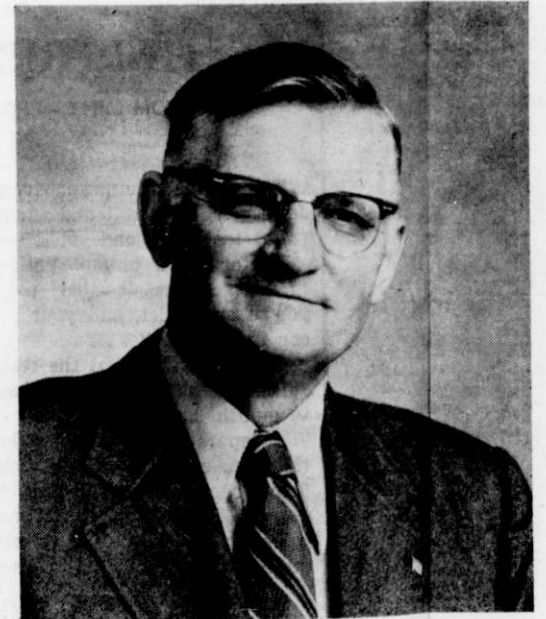

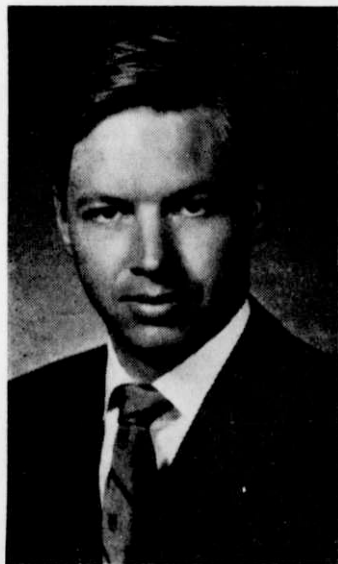
