has been received. McKenna commented that "you're putting the cart before the horse," explaining that the subdivision plans given to the board were turned over to the

plan commission and to date have not been acted on. He suggested that Schmitt and other concerned residents give their views to the members of the plan commission. "It is up to them how this fits into village plans," McKenna observed.
