

Congressman Glenn Davis was informed Thursday morning that the Bureau of Outdoor Recreation of the Department of the Interior was granted \$9.775 for work on Washington County Ridge Run Park, which is located off of Route 33 about one mile west of West Bend. Congressman Davis informed the Statesman of the grant the same morning.

The park and land development grant will be used for building road safety rails, water systems for landscaping, area lighting, parking lot paving, baseball backstops, poles, picnic table grills, a picnic shelter and a pit toilet building.




