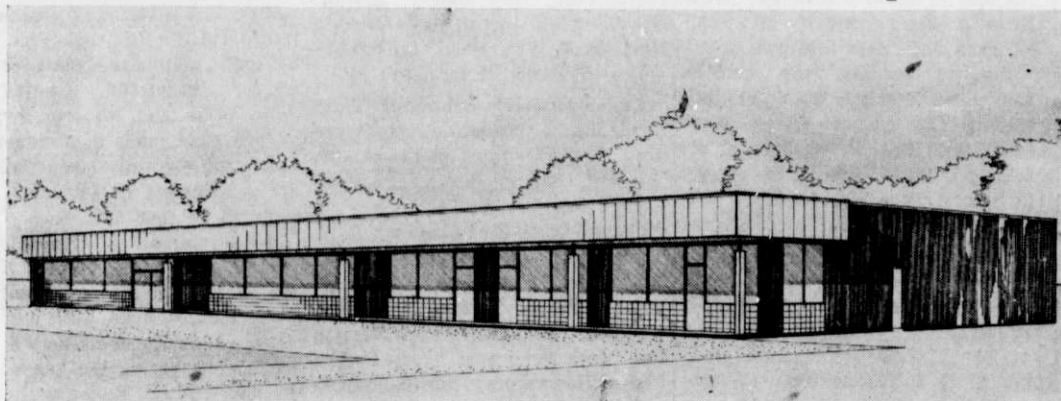

First Building at North Point Nears Completion



It was announced this week that the first building phase at North Point shopping center will be completed and occupied by its tenants before the end of November. The eight-acre North Point site is located four miles south of Kewaskum just off to the west side of Highway 45 at the intersection of Town Hall Road and Friendly Drive.

The first building with its sidewalk canopy, covers approximately 11,000 sq. ft. and was constructed by Inland Steel Building Systems Co. of Milwaukee and financed by Kewaskum Savings and Loan. Dave's Music Center and Changing Seasons sporting goods shop will occupy the south and north end stores respectively. The two end stores are still under negotiations. Phase II construction of the second building and expansion of the present parking area is anticipated to begin next year.

Dave Skrentny, one of five developers of North Point and the owner of Dave's Music Center, said that he will be operating at the new location starting today (Friday). He expects to continue operating at his present location at 1269 Fond du Lac Avenue in Kewaskum until spring.

The new location of Dave's Music Center will have four private lesson rooms, a large soundproof studio, an organ demonstration room, T.V. and stereo room, in addition to the spacious musical instruments and organ and piano sales area. Dave stated that these new and expanded facilities will permit his staff to offer the most complete musical instructions, sales and service in the Washington and Ozaukee county area. Dave's Music Center carries a complete line of musical instruments and features the entire Ham-

mond organ and Kimball piano and organ lines.

Owen Clark, owner and operator of Changing Seasons, said "We are pleased to be a part of North Point because of its ideal location on the way to Sunburst ski hill, the scenic Kettle Moraine camping and hiking area and Hon-E-Kor golf course." A native of Wisconsin, Clark is quick to expound on the beautiful seasons of Wisconsin and of the many wonderful opportunities to enjoy the out-of-doors that living in Wisconsin provides. Changing Seasons was initiated by Clark to serve the skier, hiker, golfer, summer backpacker, camper and tennis player.

A cordial invitation is extended to the public to visit North Point. Watch for announcement of Grand Opening after the holidays.

INCREASE IN VALUATION DROPS RATE \$2 PER \$1,000

Village Commission William Martin said this week he anticipates the gross property tax in Kewaskum to drop \$2 per \$1,000 of assessed valuation. The figures are from the proposed 1973 budget which will be presented at a public hearing at 8 p. m. on Dec. 4 and then goes to the village board for approval.

According to the proposed 1973 budget, the gross tax rate will be \$40.33 per \$1,000 assessed valuation. From that amount remains to be deducted a state tax credit figure which Martin said he has not yet received. However, he said last year's tax credit was \$2.59 and that he anticipates this year's figure to be as much or possibly more.

The drop in the tax rate is due to an increase of \$1,750,000 in the assessed valuation of Kewaskum and to a decrease of 96 cents per \$1,000 equalized valuation in Washington County's tax rate.

The proposed budget is record high for Kewaskum. It totals \$1,040,490.14 and calls for a tax levy of \$714,812.34. The increase of \$72,210.60 in the budget total over last year is mainly in outlay accounts, Martin said. Included are a proposed purchase of land for recreational purposes; proposed purchase of a dump truck and a backhoe and blacktopping of about two miles of streets in the Bel-Ric Acres subdivision. Capital outlays in the 1973 budget total \$84,000 compared with \$41,000 last year.

Local Chapter of Republican Party Elects Officers

The Kewaskum Chapter of the Washington County Republican Party held its annual electors meeting at the Kewaskum Savings & Loan meeting room on Wednesday, Nov. 15.

The report by the membership chairman showed a paid membership to date of 33.

The treasurer, Lester Francke, read the treasurer's report and clarified a question on dues and the fiscal year. The fiscal year runs November to November, so the \$3 per year dues paid now are for the 1973 year.

The newly elected officers are as follows: Orval Behnke, President, succeeding Dr. Charles Ogi; Clifford Stautz, Vice President, succeeding David Schaefer; Lester Francke, Treasurer, succeeding himself; Daniel Schmidt, Secretary, succeeding Orval Behnke. The President will appoint a publicity director and a membership committee.

New members on the Board of Directors for a two year term are David Schaefer, Janet Hubbell and Shirley Schwartz. Directors elected in 1971 who have one year left are Eugene Panzer and Paul Behring.

The next meeting will be held in February.

Building Questions Again Main Topic at School Board Meeting

Building questions were again the main topic for consideration at the last Kewaskum Board of Education meeting on Nov. 13. The problem at Wayne took up a good portion of the time, but other building problems in the district were also discussed.

Concern was expressed over the present split shift in grades 7-12, as well as space problems in the Kewaskum Elementary and in Beechwood-Farmington. Even with the split shift, it is apparent that significant building additions will have to be made to the present high school building, as well as to some elementary buildings. It is possible that additions with split shifts may be nearly as great as additions to eliminate split shifts.

Some Board members also felt that the question of the number of grades to be maintained in Wayne, Beechwood and Farmington should be reviewed. If the present K-6 arrangement is to be changed, this would change the building needs at these schools.

With these factors in mind, the Board directed Mr. Brenholt to prepare a comparison of building needs if the split shift is maintained with building needs to eliminate split shifts, and directed that every effort should be made to devise a program cutting approximately \$1,000,000 from the \$2,600,000 of the last referendum. This plan is to be referred with the planning committee, and a recommendation from that group has been requested by the first Board meeting in January. At that time the Board will propose a

Fell Home Damaged by Explosion

The John P. Fell home on Bonne Lane, R. 2, Kewaskum, located just outside of the south village limits, was damaged by a small explosion early Friday.

The explosion reportedly came from the sewer in the basement of the residence and caused a great deal of damage. It brought out a crew from the Wisconsin Gas Company for several hours, as well as the Kewaskum Fire Department.

The gas company was called to the scene around 7 p. m. and their service crew remained for some three hours. The fire department responded to a call at 1:30 a. m., when the explosion occurred. They remained at the scene until 2:15 a. m.

Capt. Rick Boden of the fire department reported that the explosion left cracks in many of the walls of the home. Light fixtures were also broken and a door enclosing the water heater was blown off. The explosion left quite a mess.

Fire Chief Armin Oppermann and gas company officials were on the scene Friday morning to try to determine the cause of the explosion. No gas leak had been found at the scene. After pumping out the septic tank, Oppermann gave the opinion that sewer gas might have been involved.

The sewer drain is in the furnace room and could have ignited when the furnace kicked in about 1:30 a. m., Oppermann said. Natural gas was ruled out.

After the explosion the gas was off and there was no heat or cooking facilities.

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

November 21, 1972

TO ALL TAXPAYERS OF KEWASKUM SCHOOL DISTRICT:

This is the first time that I am attempting to reach all the people of the Kewaskum School District in this manner.

I am not about to criticize anyone for publishing or saying what they feel are the facts. However I do feel that some of the information presented as a result of the November 13th and previous Board Meetings does need clarification.

First of all, I would like all taxpayers to realize that there is a serious shortage of space in our district. Yes, the split shift program has alleviated some of the problem. However, even if the split shift is to continue as a sound educational program, there are going to have to be some building additions made to the High School. During the overlap period there is a great learning difficulty due to crowded conditions. I don't think any of you would like to see a permanently longer day, possibly 2 hours longer, which will be necessary next year.

Next, as everyone knows, there are classes being held in the gym at Wayne, another bad situation that is in definite need of correcting. At the Farmington School first to third grades are being transported to Beechwood. This is also bad. These are some of the major problems caused by our lack of space. There are many others, not as serious but still in need of correcting if we want to maintain a school system with a good educational program. Therefore, it could well be that a building program with split shifts would be nearly as much as one to eliminate split shifts.

Three referendum for \$2,600,000 to over \$3,000,000 were turned down by the voters. Since then the board has been investigating and studying alternatives. We have checked with other builders in a turn-key approach opposed to the architect method. To date we have come up with many lowered costs because of the method of building and reduction in building, not because of an inferior building.

It is the Board's feeling that generally all of our present space requirements could be fulfilled with a \$1,600,000 project. However, we are not satisfied enough to throw this at you at this time. We are still going to study and the Long Range Planning Committee is studying the various ways in which the building program can be approached.

In January 1973, we hope to be able to present to you — the public — an educationally sound and cost-conscious building program to meet the needs of the district. As to financing of this project, the

board is also doing much research, and a decision on financing is also planned for January. No decision has yet been made to hold a referendum.

We, the Board, want you, the public, to completely understand the problems of the district. We are not in any way trying to hide or cover-up any of the facts. You are always welcome at the Board Meetings and may visit the schools anytime. I hope you will not disapprove of our efforts without giving full consideration to all the research the Board has done.

This vicinity is recovering from the damages done by the severe rain and sleet storm Tuesday and Wednesday. The storm was absolutely the worst ever recorded here. Kewaskum was completely cut off from the outside world for two days with no mail trains, no telephone or telegraphic communications. ORDINANCE NO. 72-5

This Ordinance shall be known as, referred to, or cited as the "SUBDIVISION AND PLATTING ORDINANCE" of the Village of Kewaskum, Wisconsin.

The Village Board of the Village of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin do ordain as follows:

SECTION I. All other ordinances or parts of Ordinances of the Village inconsistent or conflicting

with this Ordinance, to the extent of the inconsistency only, are hereby repealed.

SECTION II. Chapter 31 entitled "SUBDIVISION AND PLATTING ORDINANCE" is hereby enacted as Chapter 3 of the Municipal Code of the Village of Kewaskum, all in accordance with the Subdivision and Platting Ordinance as the same is on file in the office of the Village Commissioner of the Village of Kewaskum, said building code having been on file and open to public inspection in the office of the Village Commissioner for a period of two weeks prior to its adoption.

SECTION III. Severability. If any provisions of this ordinance are invalid or unconstitutional, or if the application of this ordinance to any person or circumstances is invalid or unconstitutional, such invalidity or unconstitutionality shall not affect the other provisions or applications of this ordinance which can be given effect without the invalid or unconstitutional provision or application.

SECTION IV. This Ordinance is adopted in accordance with Section 66.035 of the Wisconsin Statutes and is in full force and effect after its passage and does not require publication.
