Village Tax Rate Down \$3.82 Per Thousand; Lowered to \$35.92

The Village Board adopted a 1973 budget Monday night that will mean a savings to the taxpayer here of \$3.82 per \$1,000 of assessed valuation over last year. The net rate will be \$35.92.

Due to an increase of about \$1,750,000 in the assessed valuation, board members were able to chop \$2 from the gross tax rate bringing the gross rate to \$40.33, compared with \$42.33 last year. And a state tax credit of \$4.41 per \$1,000 of assessed valuation, compared with \$2.59 last year, dropped the rate another \$1.82.

The record high 1973 budget totals \$1,034,490.14 and calls for a tax levy of \$714,775.68. Last year's budget was \$986,279 with a tax levy of \$676,077.

The 1973 tax levy is alloted as follows: general property taxes for village purposes, \$148,771.57; state, \$5,416.08; county, \$101,200.95; school district, \$431,606.06; vocational school, \$27,022.83; and handicapped school tuition, \$758.19.

In other action, the board accepted the proposal of the Municipal Ordinance Service of Madison to revise the village ordinances, print them into one volume and then furnish the village with 25 copies. It is expected the total project might run \$3,000. The revised edition will include the new zoning and subdivision and platting ordinances which were recently adopted.

Also accepted was the bid proposal of Robert's Janitorial Service of West Bend, to strip, seal and wax all floors in the municipal building; clean all windows inside plus the outside of the library windows; and clean all entrance doors, inside and out at a total project cost of \$210.85. It was decided to give the janitorial service a try because the workload of the village public works employes is such that it no longer allows time for cleaning the municipal building.

Al Tennes, representing William Ruth, an area realtor, appeared before the board to ask if the village has made a decision on the direction of the proposed extension of Western Avenue. He was told that the village has asked the state highway commission to recommend the eventual direction of the street. It will run in a northeasterly direction and could intersect with Highway 45 or Highway 28. Board action awaits state recommendation.

Village Attorney Roger McKenna suggested that Tennes be given the pertinent sections of the new subdivision and platting ordinance that outline the procedures for obtaining a preliminary plat. McKenna suggested that Tennes meet with the village Plan Commission for a preliminary consultation to be sure the plat is satisfactory, since approval of any preliminary plat rests with the commission.

McKenna also suggested the Plan Commission publish notices of their meeting dates so any interested persons may attend.

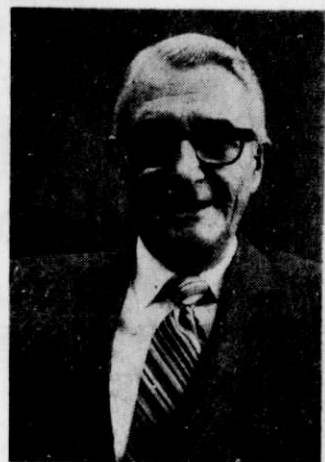
Maglio Appointed Sales Mgr. - Direct Sales for Regal

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LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

Editor:

It has become known to the Wisconsin Federation of Women's Clubs that there is still a newer way of disposing of solid wastes.

It is in response to the solid waste disposal problems in Washington County and many other counties that we wish to make Wisconsin residents aware of a new system in operation today, other than the three systems of open dumps, sanitary landfill and incineration. It is called the pulverization system.

"New Earth" is the popular term for pulverized and recycled garbage. It is a process which has been in successful existence in Madison, Wisconsin, for a period of five years. Through pulverization, garbage is broken up, converting it into a "free flowing stream" of particles about the size of your hand.

Once pulverized, garbage management is simplified. Ferrous metals are removed magnetically for resale and reuse by industry. Glass is reduced to its natural state—sand. And, in addition, the Forest Products Laboratory of the University of Wisconsin is now working with Madison on an air pressurized system which collects all paper products and light plastics for reuse. The City of Madison also employs a successful newspaper collection in conjunction with its regular garbage pickups. After pulverization and separation, nature does the rest. Because garbage has now been broken down into a homogeneous state, it will not feed and support rats and other vermin, it will not smell, and because the particles

are so small, it will not blow around the landfill site. Consequently, it does not need a daily ground covering. Nature's elements—rain, snow, etc., are put to work to break down unreclaimable waste. In a little over a year, this pulverized waste becomes reusable as "New Earth." It is said that vegetation thrives in the landfill site in Madison. People are living within one-half mile of this landfill—many unaware that Madison's garbage lies so nearby.

Imagine using your own neutralized household waste to build a ski slope or toboggan run in your community, or converting that bug infested swamp into a usable highly desirable park. Or, as they did in Madison, expand their county fairground with pulverized waste.

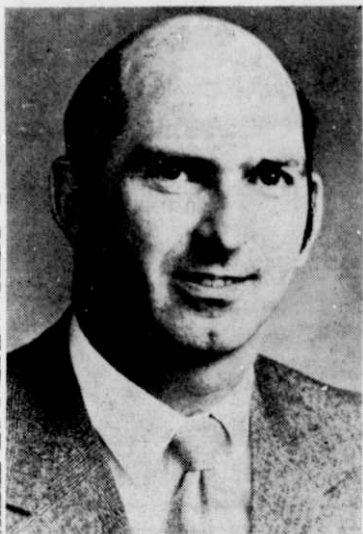
Pulverization "New Earth" may not be the answer for small villages or cities. But, in the year 2000, will it be the only answer?

Until that time comes, the Kewaskum Junior Woman's Club would like to "LET THE PEOPLE KNOW" that concerned citizens can help now, by continuing to save, sort and deliver to recycling centers the "saveables"—bottles, cans and paper that, together add up to 65% of the total solid waste stream.

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Indians Beaten In First Two Conference Tilts

The Kewaskum Indians were thumped in their first two conference games the past week to run their losing streak to 4. Playing both games at home, the frigid-shooting Indians were downed Friday by Kettle Moraine, which was not tabbed as a title contender, 50-33, and Tuesday they absorbed a 78-52 lacing at the hands of defending champion Mayville. The Cardinals, along with Germantown and Grafton, were picked to fight it out for the title this year.

Kewaskum wasted a 36-33 rebounding advantage over Kettle Moraine with its dismal shooting. The Indians made only 9 of 42 shots. That's right, only 9 baskets in the entire contest, the remaining 15 points coming on free throws. In the 2nd quarter they failed to make a single basket, their only points coming on 4 free throws by Tom Behnke and 2 by Mike Koepke. However, the Lasers must be credited with a tight defensive game, holding Kewaskum to 4 points in the 1st quarter, 6 in the 2nd and 8 in the 3rd for a total of 18 points in 3 periods. On the other hand Kettle sank 20 baskets in 50 attempts. The Lasers' game is defense, having held 3 opponents to an average of 39 points.

Sophomore Koepke led the Indians' scoring with 15 points and also paced them in rebounds. Kettle Moraine had 3 players in double figures. Curt Barningham got 11 and Mike Maryarski and Pat Houk each had 10. Kewaskum trailed at halftime, 23-10.

Kettle also dealt the Kewaskum JV's their first setback in 3 games, 62-45.

In romping over the Indians here Tuesday night, 78-52, Mayville also took advantage of Kewaskum's cold shooting again. This time out the Indians hit on only 15 of 58 shots for a poor 26 per cent. The Cardinals hit 35 of 73 shots for 48 per cent, almost twice as good as that of Kewaskum. Mayville used 13 players in the game and 10 of them cracked the scoring column against the outgunned Indians.

Led by veteran Dale Toellner with 16 points, 3 other Cardinals scored in double figures. Wurtz hit for 12 and Fisher and Rentsch each garnered 11. Soph Koepke again paced Kewaskum with 15 points, followed by the Koth brothers. Another sophomore, Scott, connected for 14 points and Jeff had 11.

The Indians were ahead at the quarter, 17-15, but the 2nd and 3rd periods killed them. They were outscored, 22-11, in the 2nd quarter and 24-7 in the 3rd. At this stage Mayville led, 61-35. Each team tallied 17 in the final stanza. It was Mayville's 4th win of the season and 2nd in the conference. Kewaskum made only 2 baskets in each of the 2nd and 3rd quarters, when the Cardinals took

their commanding lead.

Mayville coupled an aggressive defense with a fast break offense and made numerous steals in their usual style. As a result they had 26 fouls called on them compared to a meek 14 on the Indians. In the final quarter the Cardinals coasted as both teams gave reserves playing time. Although bothered by blisters, Koepke not only led the Indians' scoring but also in rebounds with 13. Mayville hit an even 50% on 35 of 70 shots.

The Kewaskum JV's regained their winning ways, beating Mayville 51-45, in a game in which 50 fouls were called. Randy Koepke with 16 points and Paul Petri with 15 led the scoring. The JV's are now 3-1.

In other Scenic games Tuesday Grafton trimmed Kettle Moraine, 69-54, Germantown shaded Slinger, 54-49, and Hartland beat Pewaukee, 59-47.

Tonight (Friday) the Indians travel to Germantown to take on the undefeated Warhawks and next Tuesday they play a non-conference game at Hartford of the Little Ten Conference.

Wrestlers Edged by Lasers, Take 3rd in Kiel Invitational

In their conference opener with Kettle Moraine here Thursday, the Kewaskum matmen were nudged, 24-21. Senior Mike Nigh was out with the flu and his experience could have made the difference.

Bruce Markielewski took Nigh's place and lost, 5-0. Jeff Ketter, Rex Bindrich and Al Schmidt won their 2nd matches against no set-backs. The score was tied at 21-21 going into the heavyweight bout, in which the Indians' Mike Donath was edged, 2-1. Other Kewaskum winners were Dale Secor and Glen Asch.

The JV's also lost, 36-18, and the freshmen in their first appearance won 32-29.

Saturday the varsity traveled to Kiel for an Invitational meet and placed 3rd. Denmark won the meet with Kiel taking 2nd. Denmark totaled 105 points to Kiel's 91 and Kewaskum's 72, followed by West Bend West 59, Appleton East 27, Sheboygan South 25, Ho-

wards Grove 21 and Oostburg 12. Kewaskum had 4 boys who reached the finals. Al Schmidt, at 135 lbs., was the champion in that class. A junior, he pinned all three of his opponents, the fastest in 22 seconds. Schmidt is the Indians' lone undefeated wrestler with 5-0. Seconds by Kewaskum were recorded by Steve Ruplinger at 101 lbs., Asch at 119 and Bindrich at 145.

Ketter of Kewaskum lost his first bout, won one wrestle back but lost again later. The Indians took 132 and Nigh (138) and a 4th by soph Dale Secor (98).

Lakes Team Loses Another Close One

For the second week in a row, the Kewaskum Lakes team came up on the short end in a tight ball game Sunday night. The team wore their flashy new red, white and blue uniforms for the first time but Grafton spoiled the occasion with a 4th quarter surge that carried them to a 69-63 victory. A good sized crowd was on hand for the game which was truly an exciting one from the fans' point of view.

Actually the outcome was still in doubt with 22 seconds remaining when Kewaskum, trailing 67-63, missed the first free throw of a bonus situation. Kewaskum's poor free throw shooting throughout the game definitely hurt their chances of coming through with a win. They hit only 9 of 22 from the line for a paltry 40.9%, with a number of the misses coming in the bonus situation.

It was a very physical, hard-fought game marked by numerous loose-ball scrambles, collisions, rugged rebounding, and players taking some nasty spills. Grafton tried to pressure Kewaskum into mistakes by using a full court press at various times but Kewaskum met the challenge and bat-

led them all the way to the end. Grafton led 37-30 at the half and 54-49 after 3 quarters. Kewaskum stayed close, though, and rallied in the 4th quarter to take a 1 point lead with about 6 minutes left in the game. But then Grafton got some key baskets, regained the lead and didn't relinquish it after that. Kewaskum had their chances to take command but missed some big free throws and was guilty of some costly turnovers at crucial times.

Due to the tough defense played in the game, neither team's shooting percentages were impressive. Grafton hit on 29 of 96 shots for 30.2% while Kewaskum made 27 of 81 for 33.3%.

Chuck Boegel Kewaskum in scoring with 20 points but more impressive was his super total of 37 rebounds. Mike Coulter had 15 points and Bill Backhaus added 14. Grafton had a balanced scoring attack with 9 players breaking into the scoring column. Gary Ruffert led them with 17 followed by Hal Thiele with 16 and Randy Holder with 12.

Kewaskum coach Mark Eichstedt was encouraged with the

way the team bounced back when it appeared Grafton might break the game open. "We were down by 10 points a couple times but we hung in there and fought our way back," he said. However, he expressed disappointment with the team's failure to run its fast break. "We worked on the fast break for 5 weeks before the season started and we still aren't working it right yet," he said.

Kewaskum will attempt to break into the win column Sunday night when it will play with Horicon there. The team has also announced that Sunday night, Dec. 17, will be Kiwanis Night. Members of the Kewaskum Kiwanis Club and their wives will attend the game with Slinger that night. Starting time of the game is 7:30.
