Village Tax Rate Down \$3.82 Per Thousand; Lowered to \$35.92

The Village Board adopted a 1973 budget Monday night that will mean a savings to the taxpay er here of \$3.82 per \$1.000 of assessed valuation over last year. The net rate will be \$35.92

Due to an increase of about \$1,750,000 in the assessed valuation, board members were able to chop \$2 from the gross tax rate bringing the gross rate to \$40.33, compared with \$42.33 last year. And a state tax credit of \$4.41 per \$1,000 of assessed valuation, compared with \$2.59 last year, dropped the rate another \$1.82.

The record high 1973 budget totals \$1,034,490.14 and calls for a tax levy of \$714,775.68. Last year's budget was \$986,279 with a tax levy of \$676,077.

The 1973 tax levy is alloted as follows: general property taxes for village purposes, \$148,771.57; state, \$5,416.08; county, \$101,200. 95; school district, \$431,606.06; vocational school, \$27,022.83; and handicapped school tuition, \$758. 19.

In other action, the board accepted the proposal of the Municipal Ordinance Service of Madison to revise the village ordinances, print them into one volume and then furnish the village with 25 copies. It is expected the total project might run \$3,000. The revised edition will include the new zoning and subdivision and platting ordinances which were recently adopted.

Also accepted was the bid proposal of Robert's Janitorial Serand wax all floors in the municipal building; clean all windows inside plus the outside of the library windows; and clean all entrance doors, inside and out at a total project cost of \$210.85. Al Tennies, representing William Ruth, an area realtor, appeared before the board to ask if the village has made a decision on the direction of the proposed extension of Western Avenue. He was told that the village has asked the state highway commission to recommend the eventual direction of the street. It will run in a northeasterly direction and could intersect with Highway 45 or Highway 28. Board action awaits state recommendation. Village Attorney Roger McKenna suggested that Tennies be given the pertinent sections of the new subdivision and platting ordinance that outline the procedures for obtaining a preliminary plat. McKenna suggested that Tennies meet with the village Plan Commission for a preliminary consultation to be sure the plat is satisfactory, since approval of any preliminary plat rests with the commission.

After the concert there will be an old fashioned Christmas carols sing-a-long, followed by refreshments. There is no admission charge.


Ludwigs Observe Golden Wedding

Editor:

It has become known to the Wisconsin Federation of Women's Clubs that there is still a newer way of disposing of solid wastes.

It is in response to the solid waste disposal problems in Washington County and many other counties that we wish to make Wisconsin residents aware of a new system in operation today, other than the three systems of open dumps, sanitary landfill and incineration. It is called the pulverization system.

"New Earth" is the popular term for pulverized and recycled garbage. It is a process which has been in successful existence in Madison, Wisconsin, for a period of five years. Through pulverization, garbage is broken up, converting it into a "free flowing stream" of particles about the size of your hand.

Once pulverized, garbage management is simplified. Ferrous metals are removed magnetically for resale and reuse by industry. Glass is reduced to its natural state-sand. And, in addition, the Forest Products Laboratory of the University of Wisconsin is now working with Madison on an air pressurized system which collects all paper products and light plastics for reuse. The City of Madison also employs a successful newspaper collection in conjunction with its regular garbage pickups.
