## Sno-Chiefs Club to Conduct Safety Training Program; Warns Snowmobilers

The Kewaskum Sno-Chiefs Snowmobile Club will conduct a Safety Training Program after Jan. 1, 1973.

In order to do this, they would like all young people between the ages of 11 and 16 years to register. This registration will take place on Saturday, Dec. 23, between the hours of 10 and 11:30 a. m. at the Kewaskum Municipal Building.

This course is open to anyone from the Kewaskum area. The law reads that after Oct. 1, 1973 no one between the ages of 12 to 16 can drive a snowmobile without a safety certificate. The course is also open to older people if they wish to attend.

There will also be a Safety Training Program taught in Junior High School during the activity period, starting the second semester. The students who enroll in this course will have at their disposal two new John Deere snowmobiles through the efforts of Laubenstein Lawn & Garden Mart, our local John Deere snowmobile dealer. The insurance for these machines will be paid for by the Sno-Chiefs Club.

The Sno-Chiefs have two safety instructors. Club President Bob Staehler and John Martin. They have both completed their instruction at Trees for Tomorrow in Eagle River, Wis. and are now certified instructors. Jan Rosenthal will be the instructor at the Jr. High School.

The cost of the safety course is \$2.50 per student. This price is set by the snowmobile law. At a hour.

recent meeting on Dec. 5 the Sno-Chiefs agreed that members of the club whose children take the course and receive the safety certificate will be reimbursed the \$2.50.

The Sno-Chiefs had their first cookout and bonfire on Dec. 12, which was a huge success with over 100 people attending. On Sunday evening, Dec. 17, the club had its Christmas party at Holy Trinity Church hall. A potluck supper was served and Santa came and distributed gifts to the youngsters and their parents. The party was also a huge success.

A word of caution to the snowmobilers who have poor eyesight and cannot read too well. If violating continues on the trail at the west end of the village, that section of the trail will be closed and posted (for use of Sno-Chiefs members only). To the person or persons who destroyed some of their markers the club says this: "Intelligent people do not destroy or trespass on other people's property. To you people who do, we do not think you are very bright."

## Snowmobile Trails Opened in This Area Of Kettle Moraine

Snowmobile trails and areas were opened on the Kettle Moraine State Forest - North Unit last Sunday. A twenty-five mile forest-long snowmobile trail is available for snowmobilers. In addition, there are ten access trails totaling fifteen miles, as well as 2,000 acres of open snowmobile area available on the forest.

Snowmobilers are cautioned that they must stay on designated trails (marked with orange diamond shaped signs), or within the boundaries of open areas. The three open areas are located: off Highway 28 east of Kewaskum, off SS and G east of New Prospect, and off County Trunk A north of Parnell.

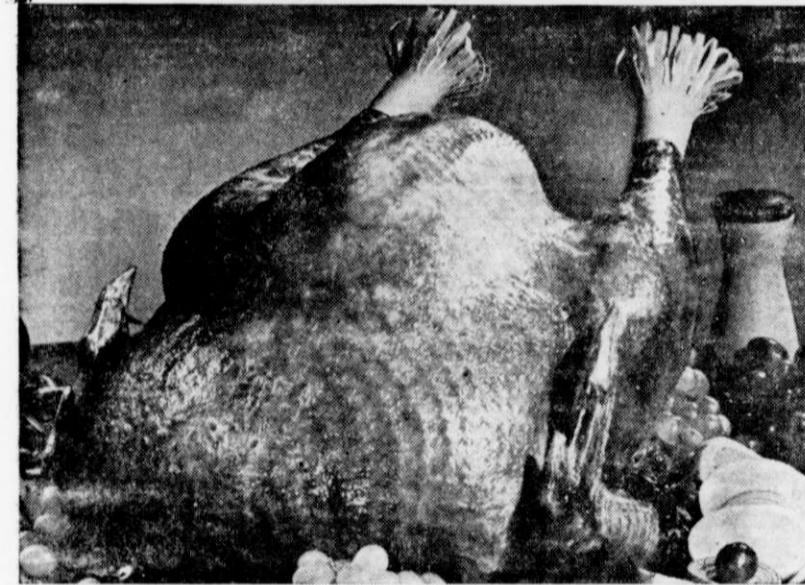

**LETTERS TO THE EDITOR**

Editor, Kewaskum Statesman:

It is time to wake up and shake up the county board, highway committee and department.

\$743,750 has been authorized for improvements and construction on county roads for 1973.

It appears that they have forgotten that there is a Town of Kewaskum and Highways V and S. Both have little or no shoulder.

S has a very narrow bridge near the county line near the Etta farms. V has two narrow dangerous hills.

The hill at the Harold Krueger farm, has been the scene of many accidents.

\$22,500 is to be used on Highway X. This road has very little traffic and is in good shape. While V and S are used by many people, Fond du Lac County has seen the need for widening these roads, and has done so.

I do not know who is sleeping on the job, but some one should see that these places and roads could use rebuilding. If V and S were in the southwest part of the county, they would be in good shape.

In my opinion, supervisors Miller and Dettmass have been doing good work on the board. The Town of Kewaskum has really had no representation for the past few years.

We need a new five-man highway committee, and an age limit on County Board members.

Better management is needed to eliminate road hazards that have been there too long.

The busy Indians also played 2 non-conference tilts the past week and lost both of these, bringing their overall record to 1-7. Last Wednesday they took on Hartford of the Little Ten Conference there and were soundly rapped by the Orioles, 84-46. Tuesday they hosted Horicon of the Flyway Conference and were defeated, 63-52. The Marshmen's record was even worse than Kewaskum's as they were 0-6 coming into the game, but notched their first victory. However, the Indians were without their top rebounder and one of their leading scorers in soph Mike Koepke, who was out with a sprained ankle.

Facing a good Oriole team at Hartford last Wednesday, and though beaten quite badly, the Indians managed one of their better games. After starting out cold and falling behind 9-0, Kewaskum fought back to tie the score and go ahead in the 2nd quarter, 26-23, but that's where it ended as the Orioles regained the lead, 31-28, at halftime. The 2nd half was all Hartford as they outpointed Kewaskum 24-12 in the 3rd period and 29-6 in the final stanza to bring the final count to 84-46. Scoring ace Jim Gaedtke and 6-4 center Dan Beaudoin went wild in the 2nd half as their press gave the Orioles some easy shots.
