Board Studies Possibilities Of Sanitary Landfill Site

A representative of the Waste Management Corp. told members of the Village Board of the services his firm offers in refuse disposal when they met here in regular session on Monday night.

The present incinerator must be abandoned because it does not meet the new air pollution emission standards. And the village trustees are faced with making a decision between installing a new incinerator or going to hauling refuse to a sanitary landfill site.

Harvey Larson of West Bend told the board his firm offers hauling to its sanitary landfill site by village employees. Or his firm can install a compactor-holding unit into which village crews can dump refuse. When the unit is filled, his firm will slide it out and replace it with an empty.

The unit would be located in or near the present incinerator and would be available to local business places who haul their refuse directly themselves. Larson said he will give the village some price quotations on both types of services.

The village was to have had an approved plan for refuse disposal in the hands of the Department of Natural Resources (DNR) by Jan. 1, 1973 but it has asked for an extension until July 1. Village Commissioner William Martin said there has been no reply on the request to date.

Action on a certified survey map from Mrs. Selma Backhaus was tabled because the proper procedure as spelled out in the new zoning ordinance was not followed. It states that a preliminary map must first be drawn up and given to the Plan Commission for rejection or approval. Instead, Theodore Meilahn acting for Mrs. Backhaus, brought in a final certified map.

The matter was referred to the Plan Commission for its recommendation. The map covers a parcel of land just north of the Backhaus home, lying between Highway 45 and the C & NW Railway tracks. According to the map, this parcel is to be separated from the main parcel.

Insurance agent Gene Bohn was present to explain that flood plain insurance under the National Flood Insurance Act now is available, and for the first time at budget sized rates. It is available to persons living in flood plain areas, only if the village passes an ordinance authorizing the insurance plan. It offers flood and mud slide insurance. With the passage of the new village zoning ordinance last year, areas within the village have been designated as flood plain.

A building permit was approved for Wimmer-Blatter of Milwaukee to construct a one-family dwelling in Bel-Ric Acres. An application for remodeling a building at 131 Main St., purchased by Paul Albinger of West Bend from Roger Jacobs, was tabled because it was not certain if Albinger will need state approval. The building houses Jacobs' barber shop and several apartments.

5-Year-Old Child Seriously Hurt In Bus Accident

Julie Stranke, five-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Stranke of R. 1, Allenton, was seriously injured in a school bus accident in the Town of Wayne Friday morning while on her way home from attending kindergarten. The Washington County Sheriff's Department reported that the mishap occurred in front of the child's home on Sunset Drive, southwest of Kewaskum about 10:55 a. m.

The Johnson school bus was driven by Richard LaFleur, R. 2, Kewaskum, who did not know of the mishap until he was notified after he returned from his afternoon high school bus run which starts at approximately 1:30 p. m. The accident was not reported to county officers until 3:09 p. m., according to the police report.

Earlier this week the mother still did not know exactly what happened. She said she cannot see out to the road from a window, but that on Friday she happened to look at the clock when it was 11:15 and wondered if something was wrong. Mrs. Stranke said Julie was always home by 11:00. She then went up the driveway and saw her daughter lying there screaming.

Mrs. Stranke said she ran to call her neighbors, the Volms. They helped her get the girl into the car and she then took the girl to St. Joseph's Hospital, Milwaukee, from where the Strankes moved three years ago. It was from there Mrs. Stranke called the Johnson Bus Company to inform them of the accident. She said she didn't have time to call them before that and had called only the Volms and the doctor before leaving for the hospital.

The child is expected to be confined to the hospital at least two months according to her mother, who said her daughter is suffering a great deal. Mrs. Stranke reported that Julie's pelvis is broken as is one of her legs, that there was some bladder damage, and that there is still a possibility of internal hemorrhage. The girl has been receiving blood and intravenous feeding.

The Sheriff's Department was still investigating the accident this week and reported they were sending a detective to Milwaukee Tuesday to talk with the girl and her mother to try to determine what happened.

Julie is a morning kindergarten pupil at the Wayne Elementary School. Her mother believes she would like to receive cards. The hospital address is St. Joseph's Hospital, 5000 W. Chambers, Milwaukee.

LaMarche Departs For England With Student Group

About 60 students from the University of Wisconsin-Stevens Point departed Thursday, Jan. 4, for semester abroad programs conducted by their alma mater either in England or Malaya.

Seventeen upperclassmen are part of the "Semester in the Far East" which is being offered for the first time, with headquarters in Kuala Lumpur, Malaya. Their experiences will be marked with the personal touch of Dr. and Mrs. Marcus Fang who are natives of that area and returning to it for the first time in about a decade. Dr. Fang is a member of the psychology faculty and a staff member at the university counseling center.

The group bound for Great Britain, in a program started nearly four years ago, is headed by Dr. and Mrs. Fred Leafgren and Dr. and Mrs. John Bernd. Leafgren is director of housing and Bernd is a professor in the education department. Their wives are serving as counselors.

Students enrolled in the British group include one from Kewaskum. He is James LaMarche, an art major, of 1338 Roseland Dr.

The English group will be headquartered in an international friendship house on the outskirts of London and take some courses at colleges and universities in the city. The 42 students involved will end their semester on a study tour of the European continent. Members of both groups left Milwaukee on Jan. 4 and flew from Chicago to Amsterdam and then traveled together to London where the Far Eastern contingent left on a different flight for its destination.

Village President Cyril Wietor has announced that he would not seek reelection this spring. Of the three incumbent trustees whose terms also expire, two are still undecided and a third said he does not contemplate running.

Village Commissioner William Martin said Thursday that thus far only one candidate has filed nomination papers. He is Daniel Schmidt, who will be a candidate for one of the trustee offices. The deadline for filing nomination papers is 5 p. m. Jan. 30.

Wietor became president when president-elect Carl Freehauf resigned because of ill health. His term and those of the trustees expire April 16. Wietor was a village trustee for 10 years and served as president for four years. In the 14 years he served on the board, the population of the village more than doubled, growing from 1,000 to the present estimated 2,300.

Many projects were completed during Wietor's term in office, among them a new village garage, blacktopping Main St., a \$490,000 addition to the sewage treatment plant, the Bel-Ric Acres subdivision, the Zemlicka and Rosenthal subdivisions, a new building code, a new zoning ordinance, and a new sub-division ordinance. Projects now begun are the new park project (which would include ball diamonds, a pool, tennis courts, basketball courts), work on the question of a new incinerator or sanitary landfill, and another subdivision on the northwest side of the village.

Wietor is a shipping supervisor at Regal Ware, Inc. and has worked there for 27 years.

Of the three trustees Orval Behnke said he does not plan to seek reelection. He has served on the board for two two-year terms. The other two, Charles Miller and Alfred Kral, are both undecided about running for another term.

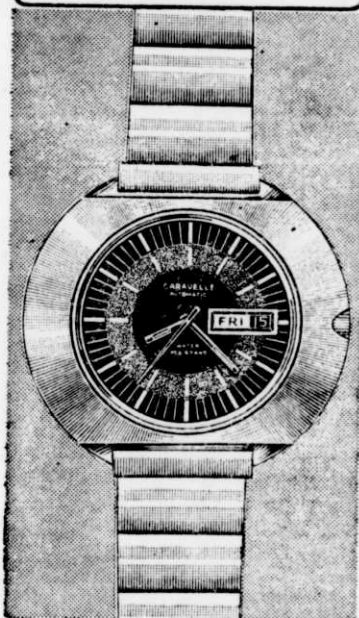

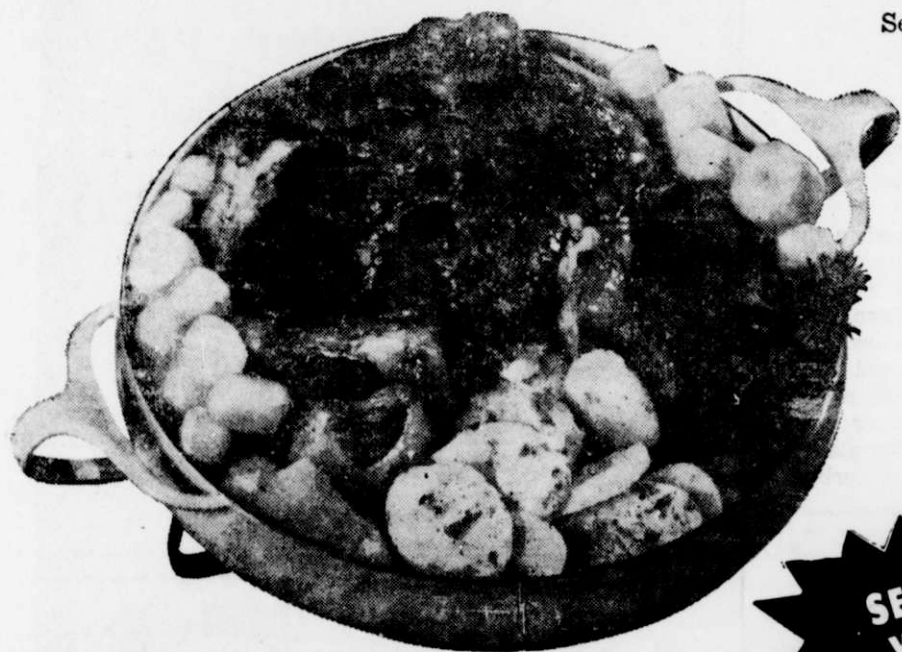

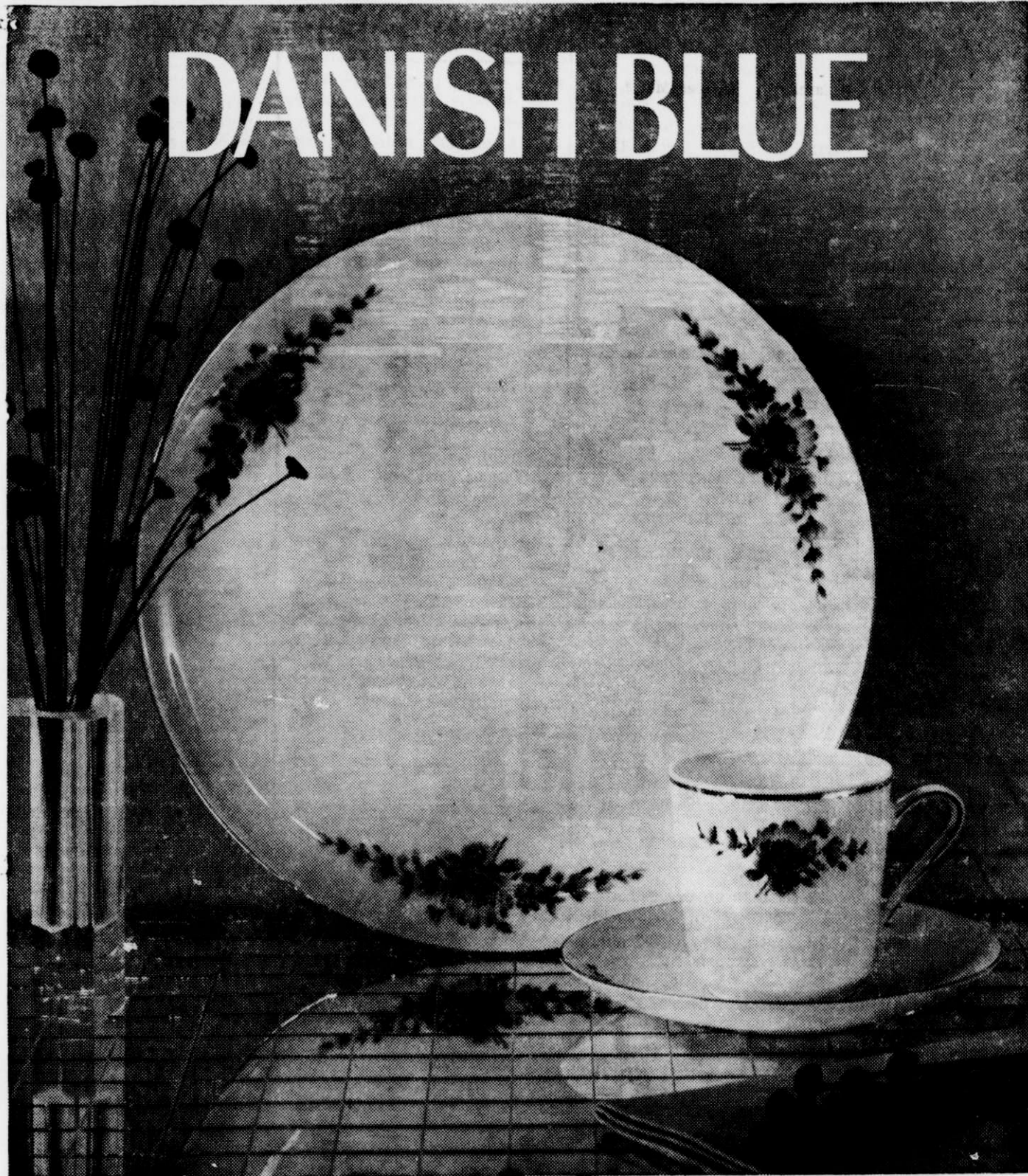

The Village Board of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, met in regular monthly session in the Council Room of the Municipal Building.

Hartland Rallies To Shade Indians In Overtime, 58-55

After leading for the entire game and holding a 10-point advantage at the end of the third quarter, 37-27, the Kewaskum Indians folded in the final period to allow Hartland Arrowhead to tie the score at the end of regulation time and go on to win in overtime, 58-56, here Friday.

The Indians led at the quarter, 10-4, and at the intermission, 26-21, in the low scoring contest. They outpointed Hartland, 11-6, in the third stanza for their 10-point bulge. Then Arrowhead came to life to outscore Kewaskum, 22-12, in the final period and tie the count at the final horn.
