Board of Education Sets General Direction for School Building

On a series of votes, the Kewaskum Board of Education set a general direction for school building in the district at its January 15th meeting. There was consensus that the necessary building must be done to eliminate split shifts.

The Citizen Planning Committee had recommended to the board that grades K-6 be kept in all of the outlying schools. This policy was adopted by the board on a 5-2 vote. This vote was necessary in order to determine the building approach required to handle enrollments in the various schools.

On the basis of preliminary building cost estimates from two builders, it appears that the building program necessary can be accomplished within the \$1,600,000 cost figure set earlier by the board. The board therefore authorized Mr. Brenholt to have the necessary papers drawn so that the board can authorize through a board resolution, borrowing this amount of money in promissory notes. This approach means that a referendum will not be required unless there is a petition for a referendum. On a 5-2 vote the board decided to use this approach rather than going immediately to a referendum. Dr. Ogi and Richard Theusch voted against the motion. The actual resolutions will be voted on at a later meeting, probably Jan. 29.

No final decision was made on the exact building approach. With the decision concerning grades to be maintained in the outlying buildings, more detailed plans and enrollment figures will be presented to the board at the next meeting.

It was agreed that a turnkey approach would be used in the buildings, since cost comparisons seem to indicate a savings through this method. Bids would be taken on a total package rather than on a series of individual contracts such as heating, plumbing, painting, general, floor, etc. The turnkey builder not only submits a price but included in his package is the designing. This means plans are not drawn first by an architectural firm and then bid by builders. The hiring of an architect by the district is eliminated, except possibly on an hourly basis as a consultant. Some discussion was held as to retaining a firm in this capacity, but no decision was made.

In other business, the board voted to retain the free lunch policy adopted last summer rather than change at this time to a free and reduced price policy.

Mrs. Arkenberg, who was hired last fall to work in the Kewaskum Elementary library as an aide resigned since her husband is working in the Milwaukee area. The board approved Mrs. Brenholt as a substitute this year, and approved tentatively the hiring of a qualified librarian for next fall.

The resignation of Miss Sandra Rowley, submitted for personal family reasons, was accepted. A contract was approved for J. Richard Fahrenkrug to replace her.

Approval was given to adding four courses to the Junior and Senior High school curriculum of

Man Overcome By Gas Fumes At Area Home

A rural Kewaskum young man, Allen Broecker, of R. 2, Kewaskum, was overcome by escaping gas fumes Friday at his home located about 1 3/4 miles south of Kewaskum on Sandy Ridge Road.

Broecker was partially overcome by the fumes which escaped from a gas leak in the garage and seeped into the house.

The Kewaskum firemen's rescue squad received a call at 1:05 p. m. from Broecker. All he said was "send an ambulance to the Broecker home." Then he apparently lapsed into semi-consciousness and was unable to give any further information as to what Broecker home or where it was located. An alert county sheriff's department radio dispatcher who took the call then called Postmaster Harry Koch in an effort to find out the location of a Broecker home in the area. Koch directed them to the Norber Broecker home (Allen's father) and this was the right one.

Chief Armin Oppermann, one of the members of the rescue squad who answered the call, said when they arrived, he and his partner, David Nigh, could smell strong gas fumes when they entered the driveway. They opened a front door and called out but received no answer. Pinching their noses to escape the gas, they entered the home, opened another door and called out but again no answer. Returning to another outer door they found Broecker in a semi-conscious condition lying on the floor and trying vainly to reach the door knob.

The rescue squad members removed Broecker from the home and revived him in the fresh air. Then they returned to the house and opened the doors to let the gas escape before removing Broecker to St. Joseph's Community Hospital, West Bend. Enroute they radioed officials to report the gas leak.

Broecker was later released from the hospital and was recuperating from his narrow escape earlier this week. He is back at his place of employment at the Sentry Foods store in Kewaskum.

Post Office Will Sell Tax Booklet

A booklet that gives information on how to fill out federal tax returns will be sold at the local post office, Postmaster Harry E. Koch announced today.

"Your Federal Income Tax" was written by the Internal Revenue Service and contains many examples to illustrate how the tax laws apply to actual situations. A special feature of the booklet is the sample, filled-in return, form 1040, keyed to pages where explanations can be found for each entry on the return.

The booklet will be on sale Friday, Jan. 19, and costs 75 cents a copy. "By selling this booklet at the postal facilities in the Kewaskum area, we are offering a convenient service to our customers," Postmaster Koch said. "We are participating in a nation-wide program to make this authoritative tax booklet available to the public."

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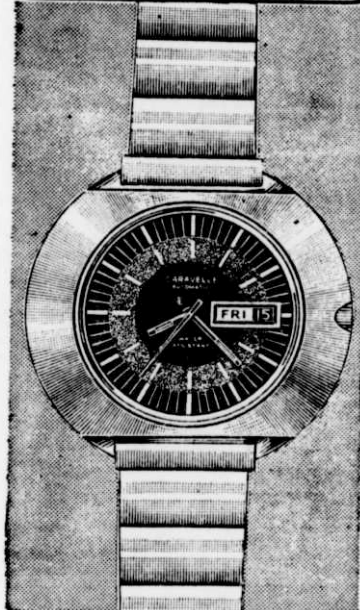

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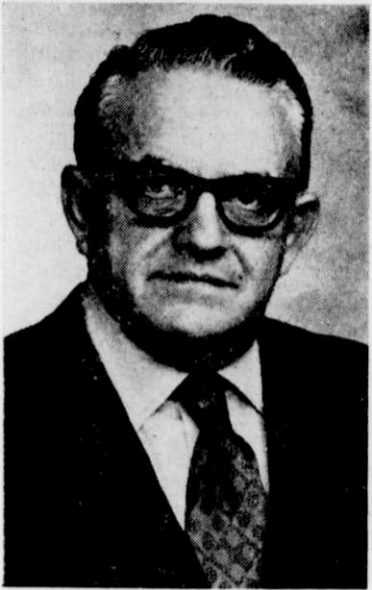
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Joins '25 Year Club' at Regal
