## Savings and Loan Association Reports Excellent Year of Growth

KEWASKUM OFFICE SAVINGS GROWS TO OVER \$1 MILLION; ENVISION EXPANSION HERE

West Bend Savings and Loan Association reported an excellent year of growth, savings and mortgage loan activity. At the association's annual meeting held Jan. 17, Richard A. Larson, West Bend Savings President, indicated that total assets of the association had increased 25% to over \$30,500,000.00 for the 1972 calendar year. He announced that the association's total savings deposits experienced the largest growth in the history of the association and increased 32% during the year, to a total of \$25,718,000.00.

Mortgage loan activity was the keynote of 1972 and during the year the association closed over twelve million dollars in mortgage loans. After repayments, sale of participations and deduction for regular monthly payments by customers, the association's net loan portfolio increased 21%.

In forecasting 1973, the association's board felt that an active year of home building was in the offing and the association has a present commitment position of almost \$3,000,000.00. This is one of the largest commitment totals the association has ever had in January for home loans. Larson said that if the present trend were to continue through the first half of 1973 that over \$15 to \$20 millions of dollars of mortgage loans could be closed during the year.

During 1972 the Kewaskum Savings office of West Bend Savings and Loan Association was opened in the extensively remodeled former Kewaskum Mutual Insurance Building, with Dieter Bombien as Manager. At the annual meeting of West Bend Savings and Loan Association, the board indicated that the first nine months of operation in Kewaskum had exceeded their expectations and total savings had grown to over 1 million dollars during the first nine months. In view of the rapid increase in business in the Kewaskum area, and the growth of the Kewaskum office, the board envisions an expansion of the Kewaskum office during 1973.

C. J. Schloemer, Ronald J. Larson and E. J. Altendorf were re-elected to the association's board of directors at the annual meeting. Richard A. Larson, President of the association was named Chairman of the Board and President. Richard Lemke, who joined the association during 1972, was named Data Processing Supervisor.

## Registration for Kindergarten Pupils Feb. 13-14

This year's annual "round-up" for the parents of prospective kindergarten pupils in the Kewaskum school district will be held during the day on Tuesday, Feb. 13, and Wednesday, Feb. 14, from 9:00 a. m. to 12:00 noon, and 1:00 to 3:00 p. m. in the Beechwood Farmington, Kewaskum and Wayne school offices. Please register your child at the school in your area. It is not necessary to bring the child while registering.

To be eligible for enrollment in kindergarten, children must have attained their fifth birthday prior to Sept. 1, 1973. Evidence of date of birth, either a birth certificate or a baptismal certificate, must be brought to the office at the time of enrolling.

Parents of bus pupils will need their section number and fire number as well and also fill out busing forms.

Parents will register their children for next year's term and get the necessary health forms. If you know of any new families in this district, please pass this information on to them.

## Village Workers Granted Raises; Officer Resigns

At a special meeting of the village board last week, Kewaskum village employees were voted a raise amounting to about 15 cents per hour. The raise amounts to about 3½ cents across the board and varies with each individual and what he is presently earning.

The board also voted to pay the entire health insurance premium for employees which amounts to an additional \$9.66 per month. Heretofore the village was paying just a portion of the health insurance.

The raise was voted for all full-time village employees which includes four department heads, three employees under Armin Oppermann, superintendent of public works, one under Peter Albers, superintendent of sewage treatment, and two under Police Chief Donald Hlavaty.

Part-time personnel were also granted raises but these figures were not released.

Village President Cyril Wietor also announced that one of the village's full-time patrolmen, David St. Louis, has left the force to take a position with the County Sheriff's Department. The board was to hold interviews for the position of patrolman on Thursday, Jan. 25.

## Four Candidates File for School Board Positions

Tuesday, Jan. 23, at 5 p. m. was the deadline for filing papers to become candidates for the position of school board member in the Kewaskum School District. Four candidates filed for the two positions which will be open on the board in the April election.

The four candidates to file all are from rural Kewaskum. They are Byron W. Gessner, R. 1, Kewaskum, Paul S. Berg, R. 2, Kewaskum, Gerald Secor, R. 1, Kewaskum, and David H. Wenzel, R. 2, Kewaskum.

The first to file was Berg, 19, a student in his third semester at the University of Wisconsin, Washington County Campus. He never sought office before but has been active in student government at UWVC. He has been on the Student Senate and on the Student-Faculty Collegium, which helps to set campus policies. Berg is also a reporter on the campus newspaper and is the editor of its literary magazine.

Wenzel is new to the Kewaskum area. He and his wife and three children moved to the Town of Wayne last spring from St. Louis, Mo. Wenzel is a pension specialist with Safeco Securities. Prior to the year in Missouri, he lived in Cedarburg. It is his first try for office.

After serving three years on the Kewaskum School Board, Secor was defeated last year as he tried for re-election. Secor, an engineer for Cutler Hammer in Milwaukee, who lives in the Farmington area, finished 7th out of 11 a year ago as Dr. Charles Ogi, Allen Tessar and James Oelhafen won seats on the board.

Gessner, a farmer, comes from the Beechwood area. He also was an unsuccessful candidate a year ago.

The two terms expiring in spring are those of Gerald Zimmel and Richard Theusch. Zimmel had announced he would not seek re-election, while Theusch said he is not running because of job responsibilities at the Gehl Co. Both have served on the board for three years.

State law now provides that a primary election must be held if there are more than twice as many candidates as there are openings. As there are only four candidates this year, there will be no need for a primary.

## 128 Ambulance Calls In '72 Set New High

Chief Armin Oppermann reports that the Kewaskum Fire Department responded to a record 128 ambulance calls and 16 fire calls during 1972.

The 128 ambulance calls set a new high for one year compared to 86 calls the previous year, an increase of 42 calls. This is an average of close to 11 calls per month.

The 16 fire calls included several in the village and nine in outlying rural areas. This figure is down from 1971 when 19 fire calls were answered. Fortunately none of the fires last year were major ones.

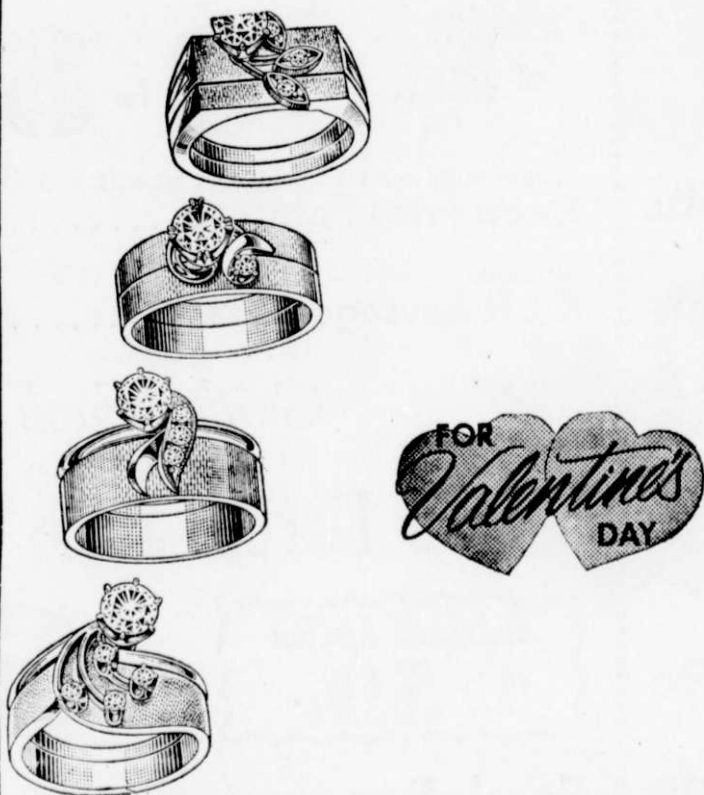

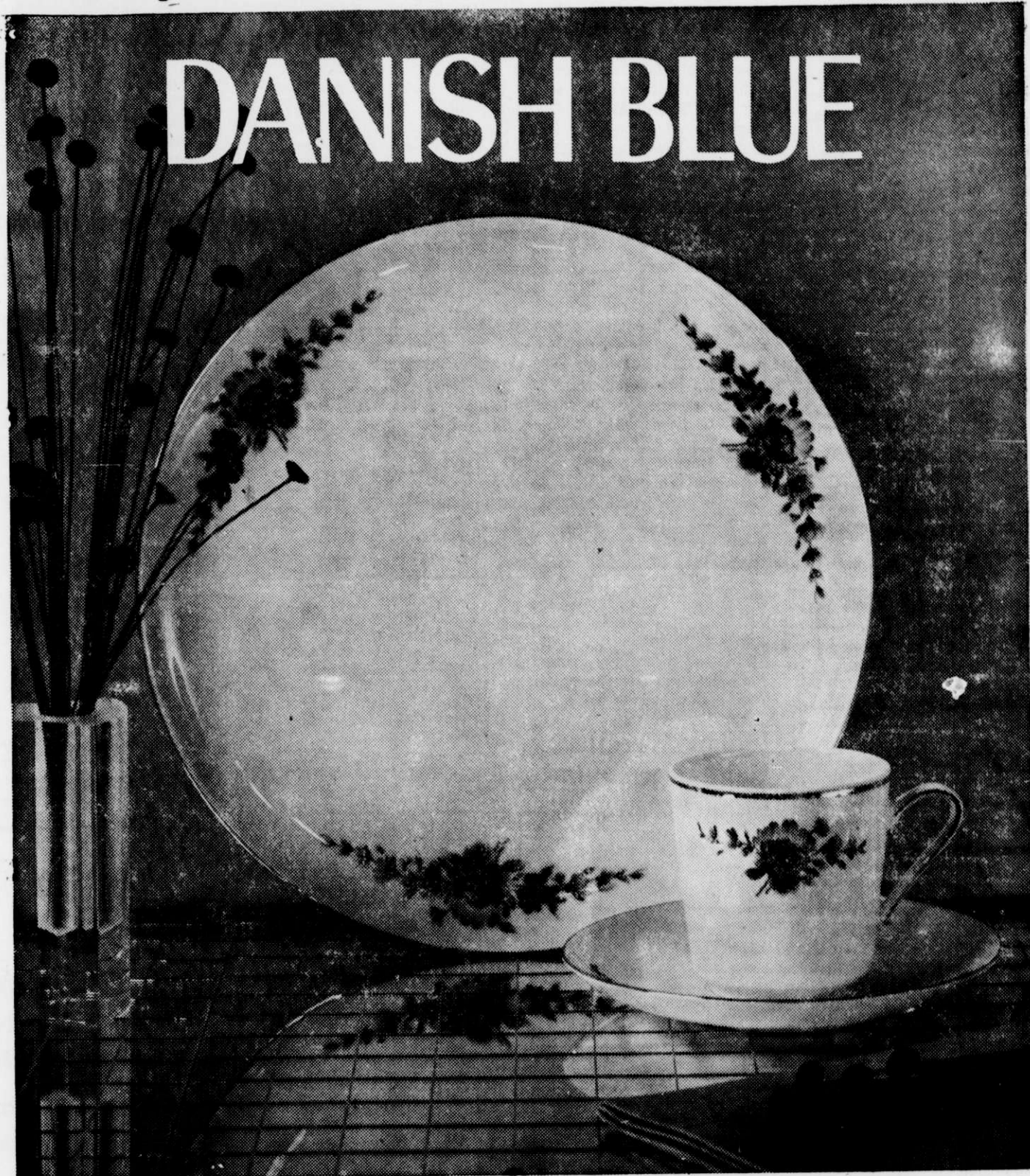

It was the same old story for the Kewaskum Indians over the weekend as they went down in defeat, only this time it was a double dose as they had two games on consecutive nights and lost both of them. Friday at Kettle Moraine they were submerged, 65-43, and Saturday at Mayville it happened again, 58-41, as the Indians are having their losingest season in many, many years. They are now 1-7 in the conference and 1-11 overall. The Indians are in a rebuilding year with 2 sophs and 1 junior in the present starting lineup and a pretty fair JV team coming up.

At Kettle Moraine the Lasers used a press to build up a big halftime lead of 30-14 and then coasted to a 64-43 victory, their 2nd over the Indians. Kettle went ahead 8-0 but Kewaskum came back to make it 8-7, mostly on free throws resulting from the press. The score was 10-7 at the quarter as the Indians made only one basket. In the second period the Lasers blew the Indians off the floor as they outpointed them 20-7. Kewaskum made only 4 baskets in the entire half.

In the third quarter Kewaskum was outscored by only 3 points, 14-11, to make it 44-25, but the fast-breaking Lasers continued to dominate the boards. In the 4th stanza the Indians had their best output of 18 points but Kettle was playing mostly second stringers. In this quarter the losers again were outscored by 3, 21-18.

Leading the Lasers were seniors Barningham and Maryarski, each with 16 points. Pacing Kewaskum were 2 sophomores, Mike Koepke with 11 points, 11 of them in the 2nd half, and Scott of Koth with 7. The Indians hit on only 15 of 44 shots while Kettle connected on 28 of 59.

Kewaskum didn't do too bad at Mayville Saturday night, considering the Cardinals are in 3rd place with a 7-2 mark, as they lost by 17 points, 58-41. Mayville set up the victory on its stingy defense. The Indians were able to hit only

13 of 41 shots against the Cardinals' usual aggressive defense. All season the Indians have been hurt by their poor shooting.

The Indians again got off to a slow first half, scoring only 6 points in the 1st quarter and 8 in the 2nd for a total of 14, while Mayville had 25 in the defensive first half. Kewaskum tallied 14 to the Cards' 13 in the 3rd stanza to cut it to 38-28 but Mayville once more outscored the Indians in the final period by 7 points to win by 17.

Mayville dominated the boards, 37-17. Junior Doug Bilgo started his first game of the year and responded with 9 points for the Indians. Not a single Kewaskum player scored in double figures, with Bilgo, Koepke and Scott Koth, all underclassmen, and Scott with 9 a piece. Gleisner with 13, Rentsch with 12 and Fisher with 10 points paced Mayville.

Kewaskum's JV's dropped below the .500 mark with back to back defeats at Kettle Moraine and Mayville. They lost to the Laser JV's Friday in a close one, 50-47, and were downed at Mayville Saturday, 31-24. The Jayvees are now 6-7.

It will be parents' night this Friday at Kewaskum with Germantown, tied for the conference lead, coming to do battle.
