

Approval of a parent transportation contract, approval for temperary berrowing until tax monies come in, if necessary, and approval of payroll and vouchers payable were the items of business at the Monday meeting of the Board of Education.

The bus contract was one with Clarence Busse for transporting his children to Oak Knoll and Our Savior Schools in West Bend.

Temporary borrowing was appreved on a resolution. This was approved to provide funds until tax monies begin to come in. Some areas have already made preliminary payments, so that borrowing may not be required. This will be determined by the rate at which tax money is forwarded to the schools by the various municipalities.

Once again, the major topic was the building program. Mrs. Clara Trapp informed the Board that a petition would be presented to require a referendum on the building proposal. Since the petition was not presented at the meeting, the Board passed a motion authorizing Mr. Brenholt, if the petition is submitted, to have the necessary forms drawn up to hold the referendum, and to begin any other actions which may be required in connection with the petitions and resolutions.

The regular meeting was adjourned to executive session for purposes of discussing teacher contracts for the 1973-74 school vear.
