Board of Appeals Denies Variance Request for Apartment Building

The Board of Appeals for the Village of Kewaskum has denied an application for a variance in the old zoning ordinance that would allow construction to continue as planned on the 16-unit apartment building at the corner of Railroad and First Streets. The decision of the five-man board was unanimous.

The application was made by Richard L. Edwards of Kewaskum, acting as agent for the owners, after the village issued a work stoppage order in mid-January because of a disagreement over side yard requirements. The southwest corner of the building is only 5.2 feet from the inside edge of the sidewalk. The ordinance under which Edwards applied requires 12 feet.

There are four points of consideration in a zoning appeals decision. They are: exceptional circumstances; preservation of property rights; absence of detriment and hardship not created by owner. The decision states: "Although we feel there is proof that exceptional circumstances exist and that the variance would not create substantial detriment, the evidence as presented does not support the preservation of property rights clause, or prove beyond a doubt that the hardship was not created in part by the owner."

Asked after the decision what his plans are, Edwards stated he is meeting with Westra Construction Co., general contractors and that he expects to present a proposal in a change in the structure to Zoning Administrator Richard Zarling for further consideration.

The Board of Appeals for the Village of Kewaskum held a public hearing on the matter last week. The hearing was presided over by Appeals Chairman Robert Zarling.

Also on the Board of Appeals are John Battaglia, secretary; Gene LaMarche, Eugene Bohn and Howard Zemlicka.

Last August, Edwards requested and was granted variances for setback and lot area per housekeeping unit by the Plan Commission. Zoning Administrator Richard Zarling said these variances were granted based on a drawing submitted to the Plan Commission. The drawing is no longer available; no detailed account concerning the variances was kept and minutes of that plan commission meeting were not taken in absolute detail.

"In all honesty, no one can say the building is or is not where it should be," Zarling admitted. "And all this is giving everyone hindsight, which is beautiful," he added.

Village Attorney Roger McKenna reviewed the happenings after the variances were approved. He said Edwards submitted his plans for state approval and he received a temporary order to proceed with footings and foundation walls. Prior to that, sewer and water mains were installed.

On Dec. 19, McKenna said, the village board met in adjourned session to discuss the permit and a motion was passed that stated "the permit as issued be approved

provided the set back lines approved by the Plan Commission be adhered to."

A temporary state order carries with it a requirement that if the building is not being put up according to the state approved specifications, the work must be removed and done over.

When asked for his comments, Edwards wanted to know why it took a month for someone to notice the building was too close to the sidewalk. "Why wasn't the work stoppage order issued when the footings were being put in, instead of waiting until the basement and foundation is in and between \$15,000 and \$20,000 is invested? After all, the building is being built right across the street from the municipal building. We had been building for a month under supervision of the village."

Robert Zarling asked Edwards, "do you feel in your own mind the building is standing where it should be?" Edwards replied, "I can't be sure."

The 35 or so persons who attended were also given time to be heard. One said he feels granting this variance will set a precedent. "What is going to stop other people from doing the same thing? You may as well take your rules and regulations and throw them away," he said.

McKenna retuted the statement that a precedent will be set for the reason that Edwards is applying for a variance under the old zoning ordinance under which he made all his applications. The village adopted a new zoning ordinance in November. It created the board of appeals and this is its first appeal case.

Various questions from the audience seeking to place blame for the confusion prompted Robert Zarling to say, "We are here tonight to consider a variance. We are not here to put the blame on anyone."

Kauffman Resigns As Dist. Attorney Effective Mar. 12



Washington County District Attorney Robert J. Kauffman this week announced that he has submitted his resignation in order to accept a position with the Criminal Division of the United States Department of Justice in Washington, D. C. The letter of resignation, addressed to Sheriff Clarence Schwartz, specified an effective date of March 12, 1973. By law, the Sheriff must give notice of the resignation to the Governor who, in turn, must appoint an attorney to fill out the balance of the term.

Kauffman, 37, is a native of Springfield, Ill., and a graduate of Marquette Law School. After graduation he was commissioned a First Lieutenant in the Judge Advocate General's Department of the Air Force. He and his family were stationed at Westhampton Beach, New York and Ankara, Turkey. He was discharged from the Air Force with the rank of Captain in 1965 at which time he came to West Bend and entered private law practice. He was also appointed part-time assistant to District Attorney Richard T. Becker of Hartford. When Becker chose not to seek a fourth term, Kauffman defeated West Bend Attorney Henry Renard in a Republican Primary election in September, 1966. After taking office, Kauffman later became Washington County's first full time District Attorney.

While in office in Washington County, Kauffman has been active in local affairs, particularly in the law enforcement field. He founded the Washington County Association of Police Chiefs and served as its first chairman. Later he was secretary of the group. He was appointed in August, 1969 by Governor Knowles to membership on the Wisconsin Council on Criminal Justice. He served for several years on the State Traffic Courts Technical Committee. He was active in the Wisconsin District Attorneys Association and served as its president during 1972, ending his term of office on Jan. 26, 1973.

Letters concerning his resignation were also sent by Kauffman to Gov. Patrick Lucey and to Police Chief Donald Hlavaty of Kewaskum, chairman of the Washington County Association of Police Chiefs.

The regular meeting was adjourned to executive session for purposes of discussing teacher contracts for the 1973-74 school year.
