The motion passed by the board "accepts the plans as presented Kiwanis Students and approves the recommendation of the Plan Commission in the placement of the building upon the lot, as shown on the plat of survey prepared by T. W. Meilahn, dated Feb. 16, 1973."

The building plans are approved with the provision that roof water be directed beneath the sidewalk on First and Railroad Streets.

The board also passed a resolution declaring that the village will levy special assessments for curb and gutter against property owners on all established streets in the Bel-Ric Acres subdivision.

The board also listened to a proposal from Don Rose of Sanitation Services in regard to solid waste disposal contract with the village. Though he offered no definite figures, he said he thought the cost for pick-up and disposal would run between \$2.20 and \$2.50 per househould unit per month. Each unity would be limited to a maximum of four 30-gallon cans per pick-up. He felt he could pick up from the entire village in one day. No action was taken.

# Plan at Hearing

Ten local citizens turned out Monday night for the public hearing held by the Village of Kewaskum on what is known as 'Amendment D" to the official

map of Kewaskum.

The amendment pertains to the proposed extension of Edgewood Road and one proposed access point each to Highway 45 and to Highway 28. There were no opinions, for or against, from the spec-

The only comment called attention to the fact that a petition was filed last July by residents of the area adjacent to Edgewood Road which asked that the village refuse to issue building permits in present streets would be inadequate to handle traffic.

Village President C. N. Wietor said the petition is being considered. Charles Strand of Stone and Robinson, consulting engineers the proposed streets and the anticipated traffic patterns.

He said he has discussed the proposed exits with the State Highway Commission and he has an indication from the commission that it would "look favorably" upon the proposed exits.

#### INFORMATION TO ELECTORS

(a) Upon entering the polling place, an elector shall give his name and address before receiving the ballot from the ballot clerk. The initials of 2 ballot clerks must appear on the ballot. Upon receiving the ballot, the elector shall retire alone to a voting booth and mark his ballot. A ballot clerk may inform the elector of the proper manner for marking a ballot, but he shall not in any manner advise or indicate for

(b) On referenda questions, the elector shall make a cross or other mark in the square at the right of the answer which he intends to give.

(c) The ballot should not be marked in any other manner. If the elector spoils a ballot, he shall return it to an election official who shall issue another in its place, but not more than 3 ballots shall be issued to any one elector. Not more than 5 minutes' time shall be allowed to mark the ballot. Unofficial ballots or a memorandum to assist the elector in marking his ballot may be taken into the booth and copied. The sample ballot shall not be shown to anyone so as to reveal how the ballot is marked.

(d) After the official ballot is marked, it shall be folded so the inside marks do not show but so the printed indorsements and ballot clerks' initials on the outside do show. After folding the ballot, the elector shall leave the booth, give his name to the inspector in charge of the ballot box, hand him the ballot to be placed in the ballot box, and leave the polling place promptly.

(e) An elector may be assisted by 2 election officials of different political parties in marking the ballot if he declares to the presiding official that he is unable to mark his bailot. If an elector declares that he is visually handicapped, he may have anyone assist him in marking his ballot or operating a voting machine. The presiding official may administer an oath as to a person's disability.
