## Board Okays Plan to Continue With Construction of Apartment Building

Members of the Village Board approved an amended building plan from Richard Edwards Monday night, giving him the right to continue with construction of a 16-unit apartment building at the corner of Railroad and First Streets.

The village issued a work stoppage order on the building in mid-January because of a violation of the building code. The southwest corner was only 5.2 feet from the inside edge of the sidewalk. According to village requirements, it should be 12 feet. The basement and foundation have been completed.

Edwards, one of the owners, asked for a variance from the village so as to be able to continue as is, but the board of appeals denied the request.

Edwards then contacted his general contractors, Westra Construction of Waupun, who prepared the amended plan that calls for removing that portion of the building that is too close to the sidewalk. The southwest corner will be angled off, rather than the conventional square corner. It will then be 12 feet from the sidewalk.

The motion passed by the board "accepts the plans as presented and approves the recommendation of the Plan Commission in the placement of the building upon the lot, as shown on the plat of survey prepared by T. W. Meilahn, dated Feb. 16, 1973."

The building plans are approved with the provision that roof water be directed beneath the sidewalk on First and Railroad Streets.

The board also passed a resolution declaring that the village will levy special assessments for curb and gutter against property owners on all established streets in the Bel-Ric Acres subdivision.

The board also listened to a proposal from Don Rose of Sanitation Services in regard to solid waste disposal contract with the village. Though he offered no definite figures, he said he thought the cost for pick-up and disposal would run between \$2.20 and \$2.50 per household unit per month. Each unit would be limited to a maximum of four 30-gallon cans per pick-up. He felt he could pick up from the entire village in one day. No action was taken.

Board members are seeking an alternative to disposing of solid waste faced with the fact that the village incinerator has been ordered to be abandoned because it does not meet the new standards for pollution emissions set by the Department of Natural Resources.

## No Opinions Voiced on Street Plan at Hearing

Ten local citizens turned out Monday night for the public hearing held by the Village of Kewaskum on what is known as "Amendment D" to the official map of Kewaskum.

The amendment pertains to the proposed extension of Edgewood Road and one proposed access point each to Highway 45 and to Highway 28. There were no opinions, for or against, from the spectators.

The only comment called attention to the fact that a petition was filed last July by residents of the area adjacent to Edgewood Road which asked that the village refuse to issue building permits in the area unless an access road is provided. The petition noted that present streets would be inadequate to handle traffic.

Village President C. N. Wietor said the petition is being considered. Charles Strand of Stone and Robinson, consulting engineers employed by the village, explained the proposed streets and the anticipated traffic patterns.

He said he has discussed the proposed exits with the State Highway Commission and he has an indication from the commission that it would "look favorably" upon the proposed exits.

The commission has specified, however, that the exit to Highway 45 should be located 850 feet south of its intersection with Highway 28; likewise the exit to Highway 28 should be located 850 feet west of the intersection of Highways 28 and 45.

(c) The ballot should not be marked in any other manner. If the elector spoils a ballot, he shall return it to an election official who shall issue another in its place, but not more than 3 ballots shall be issued to any one elector. Not more than 5 minutes' time shall be allowed to mark the ballot. Unofficial ballots or a memorandum to assist the elector in marking his ballot may be taken into the booth and copied. The sample ballot shall not be shown to anyone so as to reveal how the ballot is marked.

(d) After the official ballot is marked, it shall be folded so the inside marks do not show but so the printed indorsements and ballot clerks' initials on the outside do show. After folding the ballot, the elector shall leave the booth, give his name to the inspector in charge of the ballot box, hand him the ballot to be placed in the ballot box, and leave the polling place promptly.

(e) An elector may be assisted by 2 election officials of different political parties in marking the ballot if he declares to the presiding official that he is unable to mark his ballot. If an elector declares that he is visually handicapped, he may have anyone assist him in marking his ballot or operating a voting machine. The presiding official may administer an oath as to a person's disability.

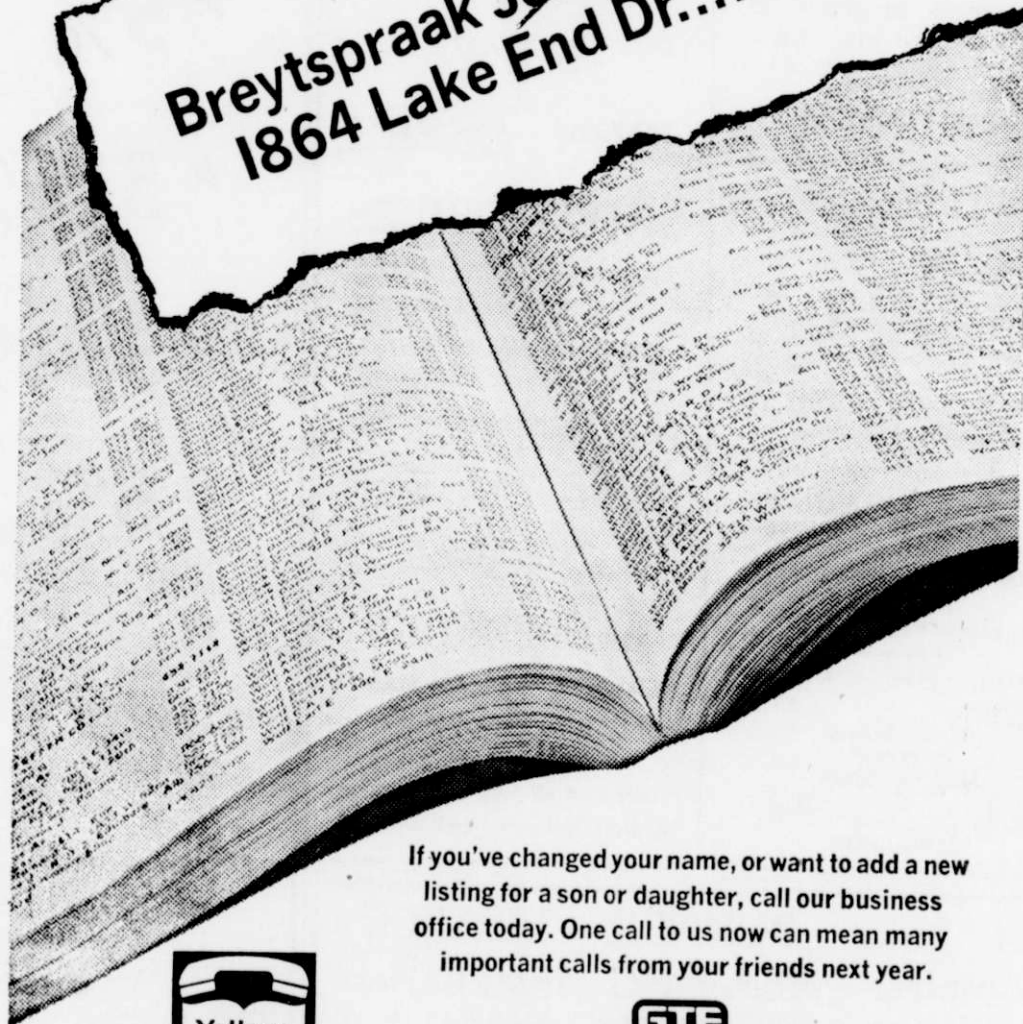
