## School Referendum to Be Voted On at Primary Election Tuesday

Tuesday, March 6, is spring primary election day throughout the State of Wisconsin. Locally the polls will be open from 9 a. m. until 8 p. m. and voting in the village will take place at the municipal building.

A special referendum will be held by Kewaskum Community Schools, Joint School District No. 2, on the question of whether to borrow the sum of \$1,600,000 for the purpose of paying the costs of making permanent improvements of lands, to-wit: construction and equipping a new middle school in Kewaskum and remodeling, building and equipping additions to the Farmington, Kewaskum and Wayne Elementary Schools and the Kewaskum Community High School.

The school bond referendum

was necessitated as the result of a petition circulated by electors in the school district recently. Three official and one advisory referendums were defeated within the last two years on a building program.

Polling places and times at the various polling place in the school district appear in a notice of special referendum on page 7 of this issue.

Voters will also have an opportunity to cast their ballots on candidates for state school superintendent. There are a total of 15 candidates on the primary ballot for this position.

Various townships will either hold caucuses on Saturday or vote at the primary election Tuesday to nominate candidates for the April 3 election.

## Combined Total of 60 Years Service

### Seefeldt, Amerling Will Not Seek Re-Election in Township

A Caucus will be held in the Town of Kewaskum on Saturday, March 3, from 2 to 4 p. m. at the Labor Center Hall in Kewaskum for the purpose of nominating candidates for the town offices in the Spring Election on April 3.

Two veteran officials of the township, with a combined total of 60 years of service are not candidates for re-election and will not have their names on the Caucus ballot. They are Alfred Seefeldt, who has served as town clerk for 40 years, and Arnold Amerling,

who has served as a town supervisor for 20 years. Both are retiring from public office.

## Blood Bank to Be Here Mar. 20; Goal 200 Pints

The Kewaskum blood bank will be held on Tuesday, March 20, from 1 to 7 p. m. in the gym of the high school. The local chairmen, Mrs. Wayne Rempel and Mrs. Mark Rodenkirch, have set this year's goal at 200 pints.

If you are in good physical condition, blood can be donated every 10 weeks from age 18 to the 66th birthday, but no more than five times in 12 consecutive months. A history of jaundice, malaria, diabetes, cancer or heart disease would be cause for permanent rejection.

If for some reason you are not able to give blood, suggest a member of your family, a friend or neighbor donate. With the cooperation of all community members, blood will always be available if YOU need it.

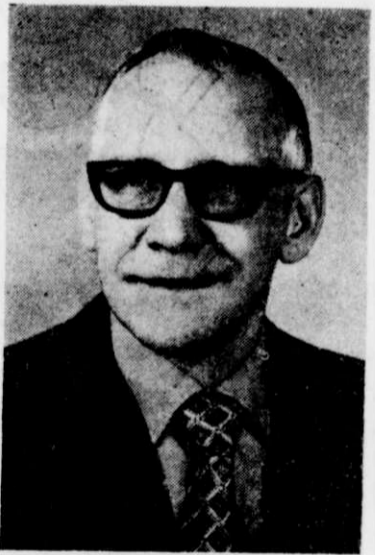
## Volm, Baiert Promoted by Mallard Coach

### Father Roman Stoffel Passes Away Tuesday

Father Roman Stoffel, 77, a native of Kewaskum, died Tuesday, Feb. 27, of Parkinson's disease at St. Anne's Home for the Elderly, 3800 N. 92nd St., Milwaukee.

Father Stoffel had lived at St. Anne's since his retirement in 1969 as pastor of St. Cloud Catholic Church, St. Cloud, Wis. He had been assigned to St. Cloud since 1951.

Born in Kewaskum, a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Simon Stoffel, he was ordained in 1920 at St. Francis Seminary. He was an assistant at St. Boniface Catholic Church, 2627 N. 11th St., Milwaukee, for a few months before being appointed chaplain at St. Nicholas Hospital in Sheboygan. He worked there until his appointment to the St. Cloud parish.

Father Stoffel was an honorary member of the Knights of Columbus, Fond du Lac chapter.

Survivors include two brothers, Father Clarence N. Stoffel of Martinsville and Nicholas Stoffel of Kewaskum and three sisters, Mrs. Lawrence (Agnes) Schmitt of Fox Point, Mrs. Cresence Kern of Wauwatosa and Mrs. Jerome (Mildred) Mix of Racine.

Funeral services will be at 11 a. m. Saturday at the chapel of St. Anne's Home. The body will be at the chapel after 3 p. m. Friday. Burial will be in Holy Cross Cemetery.

The family suggested memorials to St. Anne's Home.

## FORENSICS TEAM PLACES 6TH AT WATERFORD MEET

Kewaskum's forensics team traveled to Waterford High School Saturday. They placed 6th out of the 18 schools participating. Students receiving all A's were Kris Meilahn, Jane Krueger, Nancy Proeber, Robin Bier, Joanne Garman, Maggie Roeder, Jeanne Karl, and Tom Hensiak.

Those students who received 2 A's and 1 B were Pattie Gundrum and the play acting group.

The team will participate in the conference meet Saturday at Hartland Arrowhead High School.

An increase of approximately \$500,000 in state aids to the Kewaskum district would result from passage of the Governor's budget. This fact was reported to the Board of Education Monday night by Floyd Brenholt, Superintendent. He also reported that if that budget is passed, the local tax rate next year would drop to about 15 mills, including the new building proposal to be voted on March 6. This compares with a tax rate of 18.84 mills assessed for the current school year.

The Governor's proposal will be extensively debated since it makes an effort to more nearly equalize tax rates throughout the state. The effect of this would be that 23 schools in the state would actually pay property tax money into the fund rather than receiving aids. This results because these districts have a large property valuation in comparison to their student enrollment.

In other business, the board accepted the resignation of Erv Fellenz, effective at the end of May.

The meeting was then adjourned to executive session to discuss administrator salaries and contracts.

Editor, Kewaskum Statesman:

Split shifting, a projected doubling of the county's population by 1990, thirty new homes and one apartment building in the Village of Kewaskum in 1972 are all obvious truths reflecting upon an equally obvious educational need. Inflationary construction costs leading to equally inflationary taxation are the only rewards to a community unwilling to accept or recognize that need. Today's adults, whose education was paid and provided for by an earlier generation of parents and non-parents, should not shirk societal responsibilities and cannot avoid payment of community dues.

Kewaskum area businessmen ask only that their elected officials plan educational facilities adequate for more than two or three years and voters respond responsibly on Tuesday, March 6, 1973.

Dear Editor:

On Tuesday, March 6, 1973, the electors in the Kewaskum School District will once again have an opportunity to vote on a new building program. After the defeat of three official and one advisory referendums within the last two years, the Kewaskum Board

of Education voted last winter to form a Citizens Long-Range Planning Committee, with each member of the school board selecting one member of the committee. In addition, the Kewaskum teachers and high school students each elected their own representative. The committee, we feel, is a cross-section of the entire district composed of individuals representing each of the following areas: Beechwood, Farmington, Town of Kewaskum, Village of Kewaskum, and Wayne.

One of the principal duties of the Planning Committee was to study the overall building needs of the entire district, set priorities and present to the School Board what we considered to be the most feasible plan for the money. Beginning in April, 1972, the committee has met regularly once or twice a month studying existing conditions, bussing, population projections, cost figures, etc., all with the prime objective of providing the best possible education for the students of the Kewaskum School District. One might well ask, "How is this plan different from all the others?"

1. First of all, by thoroughly studying alternate building methods, etc., one million dollars has been cut off the previous referendum and over 1.3 million off the first referendum offered to the public two years ago. With construction costs continuously rising, we feel this is a commendable feat. This referendum is for 1.6 million.

2. For the first time the bussing between Beechwood and Farmington can be eliminated. Each school will now be able to have grades K-6, but with the more rapid population growth in Farmington, it will be necessary to add some classrooms onto the Farmington School in order to accomplish this goal.

3. We are proposing a Middle School for 7th and 8th graders. For the first time the junior high students will have their own school and thus eliminate the split-shifting now in effect in both the junior and senior high schools. All elementary schools will feed into this Middle School, and it will be expandable so if the district decides at a future date to add either the 6th or the 9th grade to the Middle School it can be done.

4. Due to the increased enrollment in the Kewaskum Elementary School, we will be adding some classrooms. Presently, in many of the rooms, the enrollment is over 30, and there is no room for additional desks to be placed.

In addition, three items will be included that have been part of previous referendums, and as enrollments have increased these areas have become even more over-crowded.

1. Wayne Elementary now has two grades holding classes all day in their gymnasium. This plan

will give Wayne additional classrooms plus a library which will enable these students to experience a normal classroom situation as well as being able to use the gym for physical education classes.

2. A new gymnasium will be built adjoining Kewaskum High School. Presently we are the only school in our conference playing on a tiled floor. Our seating is also grossly inadequate, and there is no space for the wrestling team, girls' sports activities or intramurals. Half of the old gym will be used for large group instruction area and as an auditorium for the high school drama and musical productions. The other half will be used for the wrestling team, intramurals and girls' sports.

3. A vocational addition of approximately 6,000 square feet including auto mechanics, metals and building trades will be added to the high school. This was recommended by the Vocational Planning Committee, most of whom were citizens from our school district and representatives of area businesses.

In the past few weeks since the Board of Education formally adopted the Planning Committee's recommendation, it has been most disconcerting to hear many mis-truths being perpetuated as reasons for not supporting this building program. Two of these, in particular, we would like to clarify.

First of all, it has been erroneously stated our debt service is one of the highest in the entire area. On the contrary, a survey was conducted among 17 schools that are located in our general Cooperative Educational Service Agency area as well as those in

our athletic conference, and in terms of our present indebtedness as compared to our total potential borrowing power, we are the lowest of all the schools surveyed. Our present indebtedness is only 16% of our total legal borrowing power. It is planned that our entire debt is to be paid off in ten years.

Secondly, many feel there will be a tremendous raise in property taxes. In reality the estimated raise will be approximately \$0.62 per thousand of equalized evaluation; i.e. if your home is valued at \$18,000 your additional building tax for next year would be \$11.16. We feel this is a small investment for a better education for our young people.

For the above reasons, the entire Citizens Planning Committee urges everyone to forget their territorial grievances, unite as one school district and vote for education by voting YES on Tuesday, March 6.

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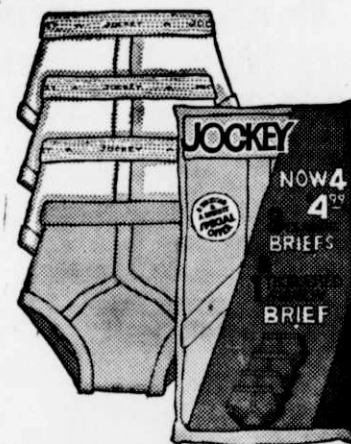

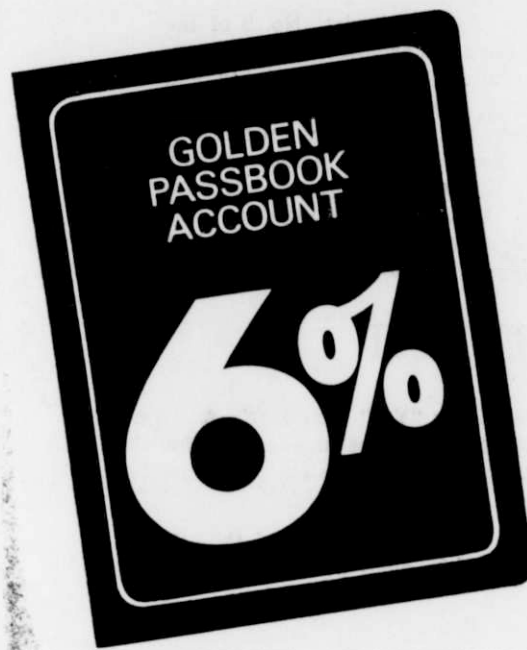

## INFORMATION TO ELECTORS

(a) Upon entering the polling place, an elector shall give his name and address before receiving the ballot from the ballot clerk. The initials of 2 ballot clerks must appear on the ballot. Upon receiving the ballot, the elector shall retire alone to a voting booth and mark his ballot. A ballot clerk may inform the elector of the proper manner for marking a ballot, but he shall not in any manner advise or indicate for whom to vote.

(b) On referenda questions, the elector shall make a cross or other mark in the square at the right of the answer which he intends to give.

(c) The ballot should not be marked in any other manner. If the elector spoils a ballot, he shall return it to an election official who shall issue another in its place, but not more than 3 ballots shall be issued to any one elector. Not more than 5 minutes' time shall be allowed to mark the ballot. Unofficial ballots or a memorandum to assist the elector in marking his ballot may be taken into the booth and copied. The sample ballot shall not be shown to anyone so as to reveal how the ballot is marked.

(d) After the official ballot is marked, it shall be folded so the inside marks do not show but so the printed indorsements and ballot clerks' initials on the outside do show. After folding the ballot, the elector shall leave the booth, give his name to the inspector in charge of the ballot box, hand him the ballot to be placed in the ballot box, and leave the polling place promptly.

(e) An elector may be assisted by 2 election officials of different political parties in marking the ballot if he declares to the presiding official that he is unable to mark his ballot. If an elector declares that he is visually handicapped, he may have anyone assist him in marking his ballot or operating a voting machine. The presiding official may administer an oath as to a person's disability.

## Kewaskum, Plymouth Winners in Split-Regional Tournament Here

Survivors in the WIAA Split-Regional tournament hosted by Kewaskum Tuesday night are the Indians of Kewaskum and Plymouth, who won their games over Random Lake and Campbellsport respectively.

In the tourney opener the Indians won their third game of the season in convincing fashion when they blasted hapless Random Lake, 79-57. In the nightcap Plymouth's tall team surprisingly had their hands full for three quarters before turning the contest into a rout in the final period to down smaller Campbellsport, 84-60.

Kewaskum and Plymouth now advance to Regional semi-finals at Plymouth tonight (Friday) where the Indians and favored Panthers square off in the opener and Sheboygan North (which eliminated Sheboygan Falls Tuesday) and Sheboygan South face each other in the second game.

In their game Tuesday, Random Lake and Kewaskum both started out wild and cold. The Rams took an early lead but Kewaskum soon streaked to a 15-7 advantage at the quarter. Random Lake never came close again. A big third quarter, in which the Indians outdistanced the Rams, 23-12, put the game out of reach. Jim Gaffke, the game's top scorer, put on a sparkling performance on outside shooting and at one time the Indians led 25-7. Random tallied 10 straight points to close the gap to 7 points at one stage in the third quarter but then the Indians turned it on again to go ahead by 20. Gaffke totaled 27 points, probably his high for the season, followed by soph Scott Koth with 14 and Mike Koepke with 12. For the Rams it was all Mike Cline, the big senior, who scored 22 points and dominated the boards. The Rams led in rebounding but their poor shooting and turnovers killed them. The Rams finished the season winless.

In the nightcap Plymouth, which came in with a fine 12-5 record, had all it could handle against Campbellsport (7-11) for 3 quarters. But when senior Mike Blaine fouled out early in the 4th quarter the Cougars fell far behind. With Dan Serwe and Ken Ketter hitting from outside the Cougars led until near the end of the 1st quarter. The lead changed hands several times in the 2nd period before Plymouth, with a big height

advantage, began to wear down Campbellsport on the boards. Plymouth led 36-28 at halftime but the Cougars cut the lead to 44-41 at one stage in the 3rd stanza. A big final quarter, in which the Panthers outscored the Cougars, 28-14, iced the contest, Plymouth has 8 players on its squad 6 feet tall or bigger with junior Scott Wilke tops at 6'6". William Siech paced Plymouth with 22 points, followed by 6-4 Adams with 19 and Wilke with 15. Serwe led Campbellsport with 18.

## Hartland Defeats Indians in Finale

The Kewaskum Indians brought the regular conference season to a close Friday at Hartland where Arrowhead High defeated them, 73-64. Thus the youthful Indians, in a rebuilding year, finished the season in 7th place with a 2-12 mark. They are now 3-15 overall, including their split-Regional tournament victory Tuesday.

Although Kewaskum was outscored in each quarter by very slight margins, Hartland had to hold them off in the final period to preserve the victory. Arrowhead led at the quarter, 22-20, and 39-34 at the intermission. After 3 quarters it was 57-50 and Hartland hung onto its lead in the fin

al stanza to win by 9 points.

Mike Koepke helped keep the Indians in the game by scoring 19 points and snaring 13 rebounds. Right behind him in scoring was Jim Gaffke with 17, hitting on many from the outside. Keith Chapman of Arrowhead was the leading scorer with 21 points, followed by Rich Lenadwhr with 18. John Solwold, 6-4 forward, also scored 12 points and hauled in 14 rebounds.

Hartland's JVs also won over Kewaskum, 54-50, in the final seconds, going ahead from a 50-50 tie in the last 2 minutes. The JV's wound up with a 9-9 record.

Germantown and Grafton both won their games to grab a share of the Scenic title. Grafton trimmed Mayville, 59-46, and Germantown had trouble beating last place Pewaukee, 73-64. In other action Slinger nosed out Kettle Moraine 48-47. Mayville had won the title the past two years.

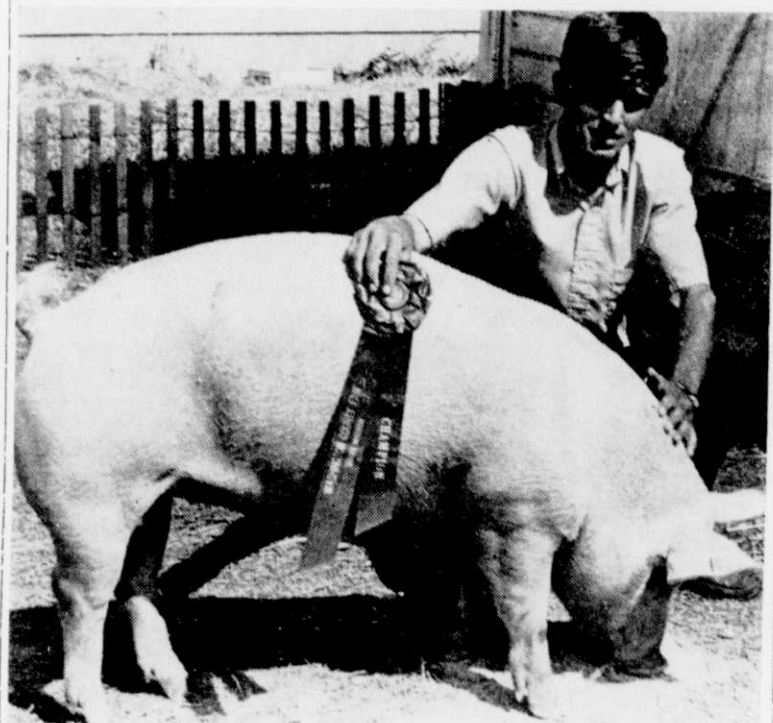
