Village Board Declines Change in Fire Fighting Contract With Town

Seeking to negotiate a fire fighting contract based on the number of fires fought rather than on equalized valuation, members of the town board of the Town of Kewaskum met with the village board Monday night. Village trustees declined and the contract offer will remain as is.

Town officials asked for the meeting in view of the fact that the township's bill from the village is up about \$1,100 over last year. Renewed annually, this will be the third year the contract exists. Town officials were present with Atty. William Hickmann of the Schloemer law offices, West Bend. Several local firemen also attended.

Town officials said they are not dissatisfied with its fire protection services but feel a rate based upon the number of fires fought would be more equitable.

After discussion, village trustees refused to consider such a contract and town officials instructed Atty. Hickmann to have the matter settled by Friday.

Under the existing contract, fire protection is given to the township at the rate of \$1 for each \$1,000 of equalized valuation. In 1972, the town paid the village the sum of \$8,800 based on 1971 valuation figures. But its 1972 equalized valuation rose to \$9,897,900 which brings a rounded out figure of \$9,900 for fire fighting costs this year.

That cost covers the first 15 fires. Beginning with no. 16, the cost is \$300 for the first hour for the use of the pumper and equipment truck. For the use of the tanker it is \$100 for the first hour and \$50 for each additional.

It was pointed out that it costs more to fight a rural fire because four pieces of equipment, each with a driver, go out instead of two within the village. Village residents receive free fire protection in that it is picked up through taxes. There is a village budget appropriation for the fire department and firemen hold a picnic every summer to raise money. Firemen responding to a rural fire are paid \$3.50 per hour, per man.

Martin said the department is planning to buy a new fire truck and it has been given a cost figure of around \$40,000 compared with \$25,000 spent for the present 1963 model.

During an adjourned board session that followed, board members decided to advertise for bids for curb and gutter installations in the Bel-Ric Acres subdivision and to decide later if they care to proceed with the project.

There was considerable opposition from residents of the area at a public hearing on March 5. Some said they were told the lot was an "improved" one when they bought the home and thought the curb and gutter "came with the house." A show of hand vote indicated nine persons in favor of the project and 14 against.

Baumhardt also won a Youth Artists Talent search a year ago which merited him a monetary prize as well as an opportunity to play with the Milwaukee Symphony Orchestra.

School Board Discusses Building Plans, Approves Sale of Notes

Clark Pearson to Direct Summer School Program

Clark Pearson, Kewaskum High School principal, will serve as director of the summer school program in the Kewaskum School District this year. He replaces Paul Schoenberger, a guidance counselor, who directed the program last year.

The school board approved payment of \$1,000 for this position. According to Superintendent of Schools Floyd Brenholt this is the same salary that was paid last summer's director. He also stated that presently principals are paid three-fourths of the full rate during the summer months and that this position will give Pearson fulltime summer status.

Summer school will begin on Monday, June 18, and will run for six weeks with a full break at the Fourth of July holiday.

Information concerning summer school will be sent out in the school district's April newsletter, according to Pearson. This will include information on course offerings and registrations. The program will be basically the same as it has been the past few years.

The Kewaskum Board of Education held a special meeting Monday evening to discuss building plans and to approve the sale of notes for the new buildings. At the meeting, the board also reconsidered the school calendar and considered a request by the local baseball team to sponsor a slow-pitch tourney this summer, using school property.

Approval was given to hold a slow-pitch tourney this summer and to set up a concession stand, including the sale of beer. This approval was given provided there are no legal problems with it which are not evident at this time, and providing it violates no village ordinances. Other conditions attached include purchase of liability insurance by the organization, clean-up, specific dates which do not conflict with school activities, law enforcement officers are on duty, concessions be closed at the end of the games or 10:30 p. m., whichever is earlier, and with the understanding that this is a one-time permit.

Following the presentation of further information, the board voted to reconsider its decision on the calendar and then voted to approve the calendar for 1973-74 as presented, with classes beginning Aug. 29. The votes were 4-1, with Dr. Ogi casting the "no" vote.

May 10 was set as the date for the sale of notes for financing the building program. First Wisconsin National Bank was authorized to advertise the sale and to make all necessary preparations for the sale.

In its discussion of building specifications, the board voted to carry Builders Risk insurance rather than requiring contractors to do so. Since the cost would be approximately the same to the district, it was felt it was more advantageous to carry all insurance, particularly since there are a number of additions. In this way there would be no question of whose insurance would cover in the event of problems in attaching additions to the existing buildings.

The board will continue its discussion of building specifications at the March 26 meeting.

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
