Kral, Schmidt, Strack Elected Village Trustees; School Board Posts Won by Secor and Gessner

Approximately half of the eligible voters in the village turned out to cast their ballots in Tuesday's election. A total of 560 votes were cast.

Charles Miller was elected village president to succeed Cyril N. Wietor, who was not a candidate for re-election. Miller, who was unopposed, polled the most votes of any candidate. He received 465 out of the 560 votes cast. Miller, who served as a trustee for the past three years, will assume the president's post for the second time. He served as president for about 12 years in the 1940's and 50's.

In a five-way race for village trustees, voters chose incumbent Alfred Kral, Daniel Schmidt and Roger Strack. Strack polled 434 votes, Kral 312, and Schmidt 291 over John Tessar with 275 and Robert Staehler with 235 votes. Strack and Schmidt will fill vacancies on the board left by Miller and Orval Behnke, who did not seek re-election.

In a four-way race for the two positions on the board of education of Kewaskum Community Schools District, Byron W. Gessner and Gerald Secor won three-year terms. The vote in the district was Gessner 1,119, Secor 1,070, Paul Berg 1,008, and David H. Wenzel 633. Gessner was beaten twice previously in running for the office. He is from the Town of Scott. Secor, from the Town of Farmington, served on the board from 1969 to 1972 but was defeated in his bid for re-election last year.

In the village balloting Secor outpolled Gessner by far, receiving 365 votes to Gessner's 243, followed by Berg with 264 and Wenzel with 181.

Gessner and Secor succeeded Gerald Zimmer and Richard Theusch, who did not seek re-election. Gessner previously spent 15 years on the Beechwood School Board prior to the K-12 formation.

Broken down in the district, the vote went as follows: T. Barton—Secor 19, Berg 35, Wenzel 18, Gessner 36; T. Scott—Secor 50, Berg 73, Wenzel 35, Gessner 108; T. Auburn—Secor 72, Berg 72, Wenzel 31, Gessner 108; V. Kewaskum—Secor 365, Berg 264, Wenzel 181, Gessner 243; T. Wayne—Secor 157, Berg 132, Wenzel 121, Gessner 169; T. Farmington—Secor 246, Berg 239, Wenzel 135, Gessner 281; T. Kewaskum—Secor 161, Berg 193, Wenzel 112, Gessner 174. No votes were recorded from the small areas in T. Scott and T. Ashford.

For justice of the supreme court Bruce F. Beilfuss won a second 10-year term. Village voters also favored him over Robert J. Beaudry, 287 votes to 181. For superintendent of public instruction Mrs. Barbara Thompson won a smashing victory over Ernest J. Korpela. In the village Mrs. Thompson won by a narrow margin, 267 to 247.

In the referendum to legalize

bingo in the state, Wisconsin voters favored it by nearly a 2 to 1 margin. Legalizing bingo won by an overwhelming margin of more than 2½ to 1 in Kewaskum. Locally there were 387 votes for and only 152 against legalizing the game. The Equal Rights Amendment was defeated by a narrow margin in the state and the same held true in this village where the vote was 215 yes and 298 no.

TOWN OF KEWASKUM

In the Town of Kewaskum newcomer Mervin Thompson was elected chairman, defeating incumbent Carl A. Meilahn by a vote of 195 to 142. Elected supervisors were Jerome Herriges, incumbent, with 217 votes, and newcomer, James Andre with 180 votes, over David Dorn, 111, and Edwin A. Seefeld, 96. Arnold Amerling, a supervisor for 20 years, did not seek re-election. Mrs. Barbara Fickler Hinz was elected town clerk, defeating Mrs. June Berg, 253 to 86. Mrs. Hinz succeeds Alfred H. Seefeldt, who retired after 40 years as clerk. William A. Bruhn, treasurer, and Raymond Schaefer, assessor were elected unopposed. Donald Below received 16 write-in votes for assessor.

TOWN OF WAYNE

In the Town of Wayne supervisor posts were won by Daniel W. Coulter with 230 votes and Leo Zehren, incumbent, with 199. Incumbent Merlin Ernisse lost out with 169 votes. For clerk Orville Kern received 203 votes to defeat Gerald Schulz, who polled 153. Chairman of Supervisors John Oelhafen with 288 votes, Treasurer Raymond Kudek with 335 and Assessor Alvin Wiesner with 233 were re-elected without opposition on the ballot. H. S. "Squeaky" Schwichtenberg received 94 write-in votes for assessor and Barney Strobel was elected constable with 34 write-in votes.

TOWN OF FARMINGTON

In the Town of Farmington Vaughn Brown was elected chairman with 328 votes over 143 for Daniel Rodenkirch. Brown succeeds Norbert Dettmann, who did not seek re-election. Isadore Stahl, incumbent, and Carl Hauch were elected supervisors with identical votes of 238 each, defeating Eugene Laatsch with 191 and Lawrence Staehler with 197. All other officials were unopposed. They are Elmer Plaum, clerk, Kenneth Ramthun, treasurer, Thomas Gundrum, assessor, Carolyn Butts, constable.

TOWN OF AUBURN

In the Town of Auburn Roger Schleif was returned as chairman over Richard Giersch, 264 to 100. The race for two supervisory jobs saw Hilary Hoepner re-elected with 222 votes and Donald Stoffel elected with 179 over Richard Dreher, 131, Allan Weaver, 67, and Henry Ketter, 79. Norbert Gatzke won the assessor's race over Edward Kreuser, 315 to 51.

A Bicycle Safety Clinic will be conducted on Tuesday, April 17, and Wednesday, April 18, at the Kewaskum High School, from 9:30 a. m. to 11:00 a. m. This clinic is being co-sponsored by the Kewaskum Police Department and the Kewaskum Jr. Woman's Club in the interest of promoting bicycle safety.

Tuesday's session will be held in the high school gym and will include a film on bicycle safety and a talk by a policeman. There will also be a question and answer period. Children may bring their bikes on Tuesday to practice for the skill test on Wednesday.

A 1973 contract covering fire fighting services to the Town of Kewaskum was approved by the Village Board Monday night pending clarification of a clause inserted in the contract by the town. The charges for the year will be \$9,900.

The clause requests that the town receive a written report from the Kewaskum fire chief, at least monthly, "of all fires responded to." Chief Armin Oppermann was instructed to contact town officials to determine whether "all fires" means every fire the Kewaskum department responds to or "all fires" in the Town of Kewaskum. Oppermann was authorized to sign the contract after clarification.

The fire fighting cost is based on the equalized valuation of the Town of Kewaskum. Last year it was \$8,800. In view of the increase, town officials met with the village board last month and requested a contract based on the number of fires rather than on equalized valuation. Village trustees declined that proposal.

This is the third year of the contract between the two municipalities. It is renewed annually. The report the town requests is to include such data as date of fire, extent of damage, cause of fire, number of firemen responding, etc.

Board members decided to advertise for bids for collection and disposal of solid waste in Kewaskum. Since the village incinerator was shut down Feb. 28, village crews have been collecting garbage and disposing of it at the Acme landfill site in the Town of Polk. Non-burnable refuse is deposited in the village dump.

Village workers were instructed to keep an account of costs involved for the month of March. Sylvester Schmidt reported Monday night that it cost the village \$652 to pick up and dispose of garbage and \$238 to collect and haul rubbish. This covers gas and oil for the truck and salaries for the village men but it does not include depreciation on equipment nor fringe benefits, salary-wise, to village employees.

Beginning April 1, also on a 30-day trial basis, garbage is being hauled to a sanitary landfill site operated by Phil Majerus of Lomira. Village employees were told to continue keeping an account of expenses involved until a final decision is made on solid waste disposal.

Bids will also be sought on a compactor which would be set up on the incinerator site. This would have a portable unit which, when filled, would be replaced by another.

Board members accepted a proposal from Alster and Associates, Inc., of Madison under which the firm will provide aerial maps of Kewaskum at a cost of \$800. They will cover 4 square miles from a flight altitude of 3,000 feet above the

Charles Strand of Stone and Robinson, consulting engineers outlined the value of the maps. He said the aerial maps would yield topographic maps which would be of help to the village. "You won't have water problems," he said. The real savings, he said would come from preventing a blunder in laying sewers and installing unneeded lift stations.

The topographic maps project would be an additional \$10,750 but according to Strand,

could be spread out over a four-year paying period. The aerial maps will be flown before trees leaf out.

Board members authorized purchase of a tape recorder for use by the village board, plan commission and board of appeals and a fireworks display for July 4. The fireworks will cost between \$480 and \$495.

The first draft of the comprehensive park plan has been completed by the state and is in the hands of village trustees for study. Three possible sites have been looked at, President

Cyril Wietor said but none can be purchased without state permission or state aids will be lost.

"Who will make the decision?" William Geidel wanted to know. "The board, with the

help of the state," answered Wietor. When Geidel questioned further, "what about the people?" he was told that "we will

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Firemen Summoned When Roast Burns

Kewaskum firemen answered two calls late last week.

At 6:45 p. m. Thursday firemen extinguished a grass fire on the property of Kilian Honeck just south of the Johnson Trailer Court in the Town of Kewaskum near the south village limits. The fire evidently started from a rubbish burner. There was no damage.

The next night, at 5:45 p. m. Friday, firemen were called to the Kenneth Rehbein home at 706 Pleasantwood Dr. in Bel-Ric Acres to put out an oven fire in the home. Mrs. Rehbein had been cooking a meat loaf and left it while she went to check on her children. While

she was gone the pyrex dish in which the roast was cooking apparently burst from the heat and the juices from the roast ran out and caused a grease fire. The glass panel in the oven door also shattered from the heat and flames and smoke were visible in the oven. Firemen used a dry chemical to extinguish the flames. Besides a burned meat loaf which was taken outside by firemen, there was damage to the stove and minor smoke damage. Twenty-

three firemen responded and spent about a half hour at the scene.

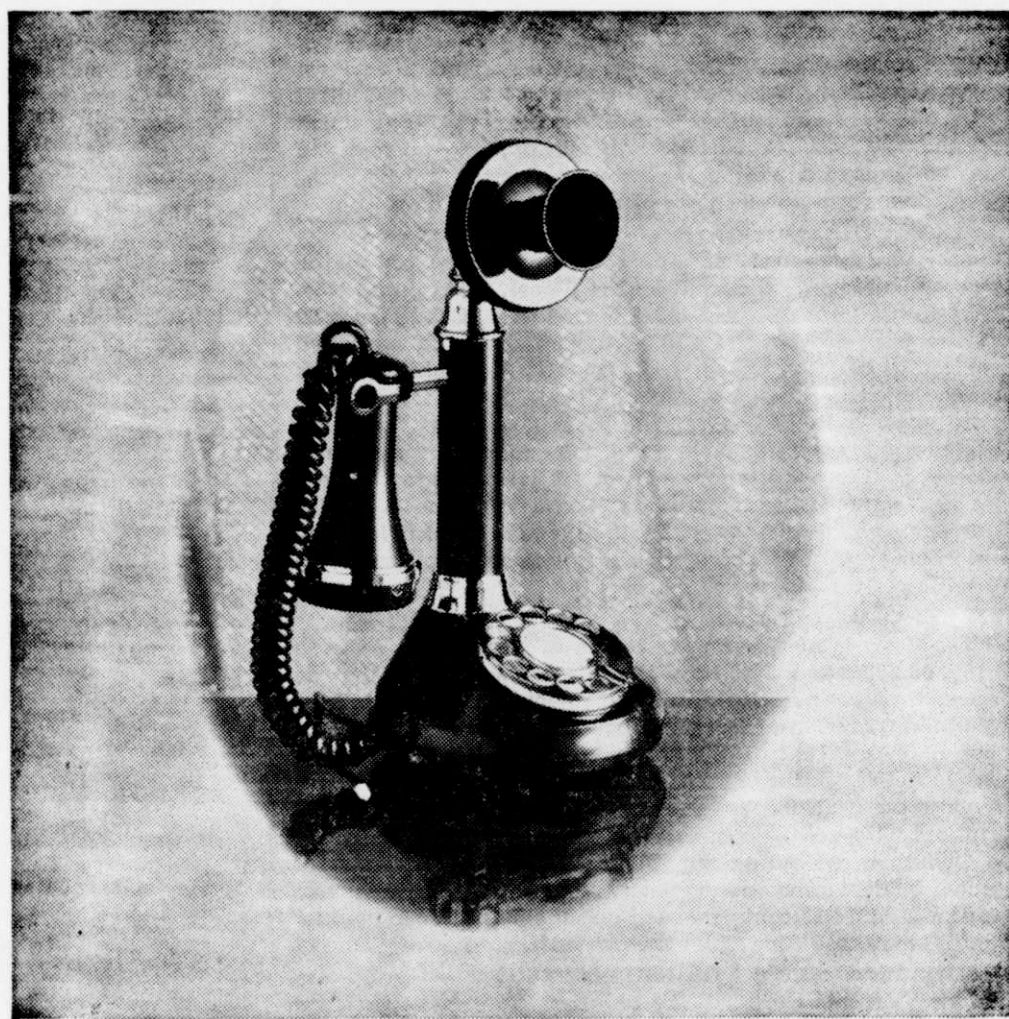

By reserving a prefix, a Holstein dairyman establishes a "trade mark" which is used in all published information concerning the performance of his cattle.

The origin of prefix names often stems from farm names, family name combinations or unique geographical or historical features of the farmstead. Members of the immediate family of the person for whom the prefix is recorded may also be allowed to use the prefix on animals they own when the animals are all handled as one farm unit.
