Area Family Escapes Injury When Fire Guts Housetrailer

A 14x70 housetrailer owned by the Victor Arnold family of R. 2, Kewaskum, located about two miles north of the village on CTH V, was gutted by fire early Saturday morning, leaving the family homeless. Fortunately the family escaped injury in the blaze, which destroyed all of their personal belongings.

The family was asleep at the time and Arnold was awakened when the fire alarm system in the trailer went off. He got up to find the trailer's heating unit in flames and immediately awakened his wife, three children and his mother, who fled the trailer. Arnold then called the Kewaskum Fire Department.

Firemen were called out at 7:03 a. m. and 28 men responded within minutes. They spent 1½ hours putting out the fire and had to use a considerable amount of water in dousing the flames.

Fire Chief Armin Oppermann said the trailer was practically a total loss and stated that the Arnold family was fortunate in having the fire alarm system. Arnold also felt that it possibly saved his family.

The fire department was called to the scene a second time at 10:15 a. m. when sparks again flared up from the wall of the trailer. Again 20 firemen responded.

No injuries were reported in the fire, which was the most serious in this area since the Louis Ebert home in this village was ravaged by flames last Sept. 1.

Members of the Arnold family have been staying at the Frank Werhanowicz residence at R. 2, Kewaskum until another trailer they have ordered arrives. The trailer and its contents were covered by insurance.

Mr. and Mrs. Arnold, their two sons and daughter, and his mother, could use more clothing and bedding and anyone wishing to donate items could take them to the Werhanowicz home or the Kewaskum Savings.

The rummage sale scheduled Monday evening and Tuesday morning at the Fifth Avenue United Methodist Church, West Bend, was cancelled due to the snowstorm and all usable clothing was contributed to the Arnold family.

REPORT ATTEMPTED BREAK-IN AT SCHOOL

An attempted break-in at the Kewaskum High School was reported Monday and local police believe it may have occurred sometime Sunday night or early Monday morning. The glass in the southeast entrance door was broken but the door was padlocked and the intruder failed to gain entrance to the building.

A break-in at West Bend's Green Tree School Sunday night netted thieves over \$100 in electronic recording equipment and a break-in was also attempted at Germantown's Hillside School the same night. They may be connected with the local break-in attempt.

Florence Hansen Named Member of Lakeland Council

Mrs. Florence Hansen, Peace UCC, Kewaskum, has been appointed a member of the Lakeland College (Sheboygan) Church Council for 1973.

Formed last December, the council's purpose is to recruit members from all 273 Wisconsin United Church of Christ congregations to improve communication between the UCC and Lakeland College.

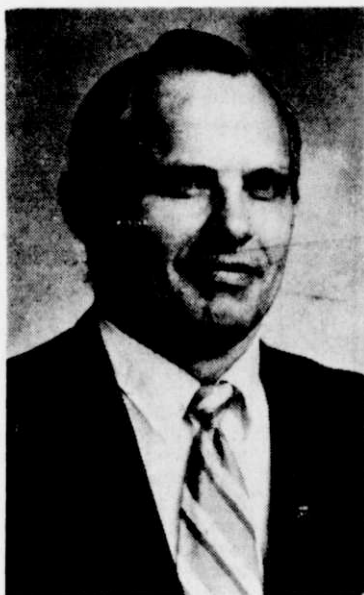
\$171.38 COLLECTED IN T. AUBURN HEART FUND

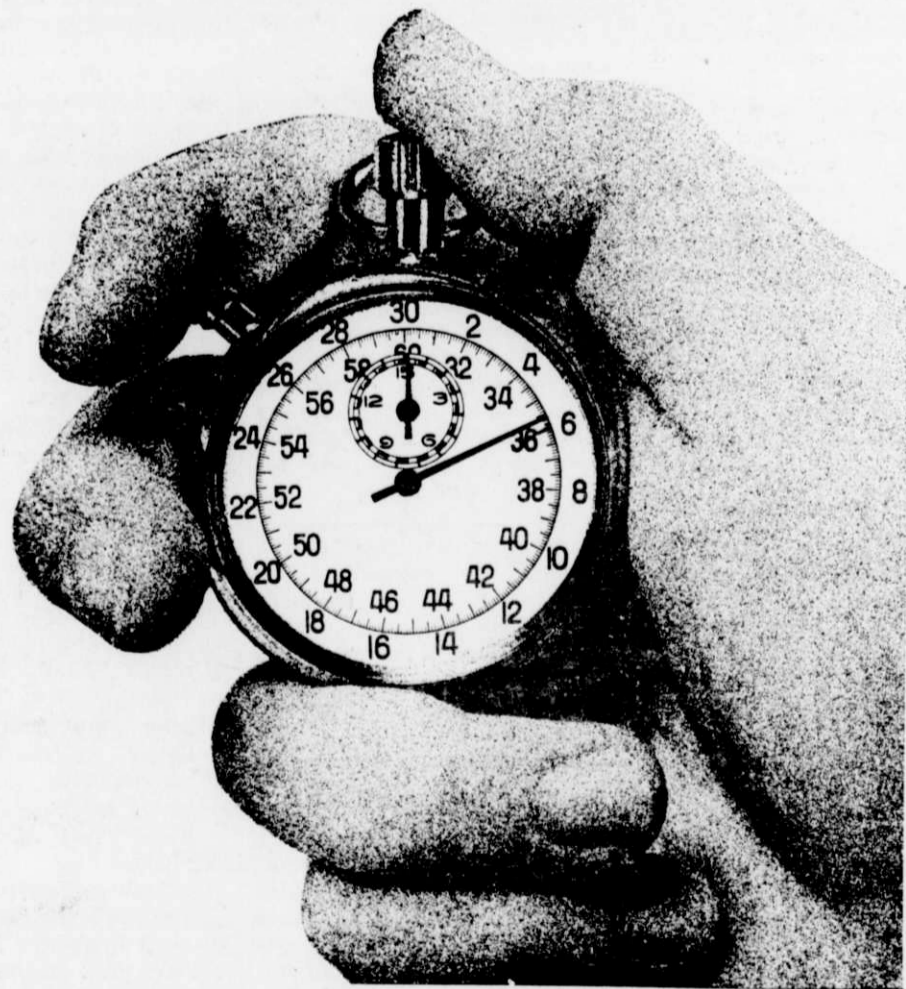

Area Cancer Drive Volunteers Named

Total receipts in the state of Wisconsin last year to continue the fight against killer cancer came to \$892,141. Of that total, over \$14,000 was raised here in Washington County. "We want to 'wipe out cancer'" claimed county fund drive chairman Ralph Kies, "and in order to do that, our share, this year has been increased by a thousand dollars." Last year, \$356,000 of the state money was sent on to the national office for research with another \$312,536 allocated for program's service such as: state research, public education, professional education, patient services, and local community services (all right here in Wisconsin).

Kies noted that on a national level, research grants in the amount of \$575,625 were made to the University of Wisconsin and another \$20,933 to Marquette University. Kies pointed

out that the federal government helps in furnishing facilities for research, but the cost of staffing and actual investigative work must come from our contributions.

Regal Cookware Featured in S & H Green Stamps Book

Percolators, broilers and other cookware manufactured by Regal Ware, Incorporated in Kewaskum is featured this year in the nationally-known S & H Green Stamps Ideabook. The supply contract for 1973 was recently signed by the local firm and The Sperry and Hutchinson Company.

The cookware appears in the 1973 edition of the full-color, 148-page catalog, which has an annual nationwide distribution of about 30 million copies. Regal Ware products, as well as those of 18 other Wisconsin manufacturers, are being distributed by more than 750 S & H Green Stamps redemption centers throughout most of the United States. The 1973 Ideabook was available in late February in states other than Wisconsin.

Because Wisconsin is one of only three states that prohibits

the redemption of trading stamps for merchandise, S & H does not distribute its Ideabook here. A bill to strike the 56-year-old prohibition from Wisconsin law failed by one vote to pass the state assembly last year. It is expected that a similar bill will be introduced this year.

All four states bordering Wisconsin—Minnesota, Iowa, Michigan and Illinois—permit redemption of trading stamps for merchandise. When redeemed in this way, the average value of a filled S & H Green Stamps Saver Book (1200 stamps) is \$3. In Wisconsin, that same book can be redeemed only for \$2 in cash. More than 1,500 businesses in the state offer S & H Green Stamps.

Despite Wisconsin's prohibitory law on redemption of trading stamps, the state has long (since 1905) been a major source of merchandise for The Sperry and Hutchinson Company. In the past 12 years alone, S & H pur-

chases from Wisconsin companies have totaled more than \$70 million.

About 70,000 retail outlets across the country give S & H Green Stamps. S & H distributes merchandise through eight warehouses to its redemption centers.

The Sperry and Hutchinson Company, originator of S & H Green Stamps in 1896, is the nation's oldest and largest trading stamp service.

RESOLUTION NO. 73-1 PRELIMINARY RESOLUTION DECLARING INTENT TO EXERCISE SPECIAL ASSESSMENT POWERS UNDER SECTION 66.60, WISCONSIN STATUTES OF 1969

RESOLVED, by the Village Board of the Village of Kewaskum, Wisconsin:

2. The damages to be awarded for property taken or damaged by said improvement.

3. The net amount of benefits over damages for such improvements.

4. The total assessment against each parcel.

5. Upon completion of such report the Village Engineer is directed to file a copy thereof

in the office of Village Commissioner for public inspection. 6. Upon receiving the report of the Village Engineer, the Commissioner is directed to give notice of public hearing on such report as specified in Section 66.60(7), Wisconsin Statutes. The hearing shall be held in the Council Room in the Municipal Building of the Village of Kewaskum at a time set by the Commissioner in accordance with S. 66.60 (7), Wisconsin Statutes.
