1st Draft for Outdoor Recreation Plan Approved by Village Board

The first draft for an outdoor recreation plan prepared for the Village of Kewaskum by the Department of Natural Resources (DNR) was approved by the members of the Village Board during an adjourned session Monday night.

Copies of the plan were placed in the hands of village trustees for study about two weeks ago. The rough draft now goes back to the DNR for further work.

The village is seeking funds through the state O.R.A.P. program toward purchase of land for the proposed park which will be suitable for an outdoor swimming pool and other recreational facilities.

The first requirement was that the village have a comprehensive park plan and it called upon the D.N.R. for its services. Three possible sites for the park are being considered, and in compliance with DNR requirements, have been appraised. No options have been taken.

Opening of bids for construction of about 8,500 feet of curb and gutter in the Bel-Ric Acres subdivision also came up Monday night. No action was taken until the bids are checked by the consulting engineer and until members of the board decide if they will proceed with the project at all. There was a considerable amount of objection from residents of the subdivision when a public hearing was held on the curb and gutter proposal last month.

The four bids read as follows: Lifetime Construction Co., Oconomowoc, a unit price of \$3.24 per foot for a project total of \$27,540.

K. R. Szohr Contractors, Milwaukee, a unit price of \$2.94 for a total of \$24,909.

Rennhack Construction, Reeseville, a unit price of \$2.67 for a total of \$22,695.

Sommers Construction, Shiocton, a unit price of \$2.97 for a total of \$25,245.

The cost of the project would be charged to the property owners involved, based on a per-foot basis.

Easter Egg Hunt Saturday in Park

Kewaskum High First in Scenic Math Contest

Placing first at a Scenic Moraine Conference Math Meet held April 11, Kewaskum High students beat their closest opponent by 104 points. Kewaskum scored 231 points with Kettle Moraine, Arrowhead and Mayville high schools having 127, 94, and 57 points respectively. Kettle Moraine had recently placed 11th in 7a state math contest.

Participating on the varsity team were seniors: Nina Wulff, who obtained a perfect score of 30 points, Tom Hensler, Lance Schulz, and Ned Stoffel, and juniors: Robin Bier, Rick Edwards, Bruce Markielewski, and Jane Zehren.

The meet was divided into four categories—"Algebra and Its Application," "Geometry and Its Application," "Trigonometry and Its Application," and "Theory of Number and Probability." Each student had to participate in three of the four classifications. A time limit of 15 minutes was given to do the three problems in each category. Problems had a point value of either 2, 3, or 5. Six problems were also given to each team to complete in 15 minutes. Kewaskum solved each of them worth 10 points apiece correctly.

A junior varsity team also competing had to solve the same problems. Kewaskum's students placed second with 81 points, losing to Kettle Moraine with 92 points. Arrowhead High School scored 27 points.

Local People In Accidents

Washington County and West Bend police files included reports on several Kewaskum area residents who were involved in traffic accidents.

An accident occurred between cars driven by Jack E. Tessar, 1325 Brooklane Dr., Kewaskum, and Marlene Kukla of Beulah, Mich., on April 10 on Lincoln Dr. W. at Eder Lane in West Bend. 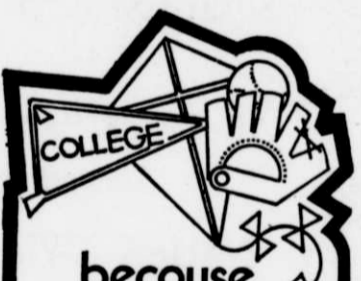
