The first draft for an outdoor First in Scenic recreation plan prepared for the Village of Kewaskum by the Math Contest Department of Natural Resources (DNR) was approved by the members of the Village Board Monday night.

Forty-two students of Kewaskum High School are spending their Easter vacation visiting the mountains in Switzerland, the Rhine River, Heidelberg, Munich, and many other sights on a trip to Germany, Austria and Switzerland.

The students, accompanied by their German teacher, Mike Schweighardt, and his wife and Spanish teacher Kathryn Spencer, are spending 11 days in these countries on a student tour.

The tour was prepared by Lufthansa German Airlines of Thursday afternoon and arrived in Cologne Friday at 3:30 a.m. Kewaskum time or 10 a.m. German time to start the excursion.

The tour includes visits to Cologne, Heidelberg, Karlsruhe, Lucerne, Gregenz, Salzberg, Munich, Rothenburg and Frankfurt. The students travel by motorcoach and also spend much time walking. Special highlights include a steamer cruise down the Rhine River, tour through the Castle of Neuschwanstein, which was built for King Louis II of Bavaria, and an excursion to Dachau, the famous World War II concentration camp. Also included is the winter sport resort at Innsbruck, the site of the Winter Olympics.

The students also have much time for shopping and free time for exploring cities and places in small groups without the guide. The tour package includes flight, most meals, transportation in Germany and hotel accommodations. Students are limited to 44 pounds of baggage.
