## Seefeldt Honored; 40 Years As Town Clerk Leave Treasured Memories

A collection of treasured memories, gathered together over a 40-year period as town clerk, were unfolded here last week, when Alfred H. Seefeldt was honored by fellow town officials.

Seefeldt and his wife were guests of honor at a dinner at the Glacier Inn, hosted by the six officials in whose hands are the reins to guide the affairs of the Town of Kewaskum.

A plaque recognizing Seefeldt's 40 years of service to the township in which he was born was presented by Mervin Thompson, town chairman. It bore his signature together with those of Jerome Herriges and James Andre, supervisors; William A. Bruhn, treasurer; Ray Schaefer, assessor; and Seefeldt's successor, Mrs. Glenn (Barbara) Hinz.

Seefeldt closed the public service chapter in his life by choosing not to seek re-election in the last election. He said he had considered giving up his job for some time but, until Barbara, no one came along who was interested to the point of finding out what work was involved.

"You know," he said, "after 40 years you get kind of attached to the job and you would hate to see someone take over who wouldn't do a good job." He was quick to add that, "I am stepping down to someone who will do a better job than I did."

Mrs. Hinz assisted Seefeldt since January. He said it was a pleasure to have her become a candidate. He endorsed her to the township's constituents, and she won election handily.

Seefeldt was asked to share some of his memories which he did in an "off the cuff" style, noting that "there were some interesting days and some that weren't so good." The problem in giving "off the cuff" remarks, he observed, is that one is likely to forget the important things and remember the trivial.

Harold, his wife Shirley and their two sons reside at R. 2, Kewaskum.

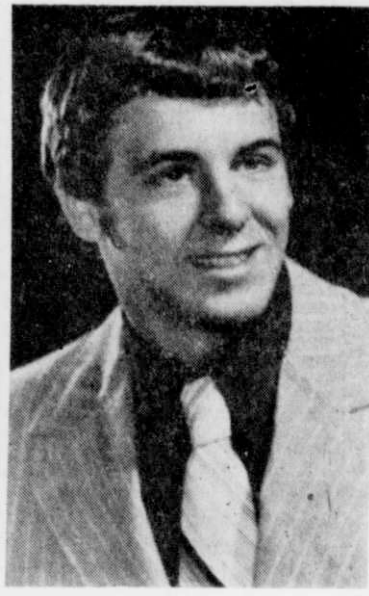
## Art Show Sunday At High School

## Board Gives Final Approval on New Kindergarten Age Policy

### SET JUNE 4 TO OPEN BUILDING PROPOSALS

Final approval was given on a new kindergarten age policy at the Board of Education meeting Monday evening. Under the new policy, a child must be five years of age on or before Dec. 1 to be eligible to attend. The previous policy set Sept. 1 as the deadline date. The new policy results from a Wisconsin Supreme Court decision which set Dec. 1 as a standard date for all schools.

A resolution paying off the note on the Beechwood School building was passed. The principal amount to be paid on the note is \$47,300.00.

Discussion was held on the question of hiring a half-time administrative assistant, as recommended by Mr. Brenholt, School Superintendent. The board questioned whether a full-time business manager would be of more value to the district. The matter was tabled and the board instructed Mr. Brenholt to attempt to determine the approximate salaries presently being

paid for this position.

Contracts were approved for Larry Ammel for the high school instrumental music program, and for Christine Weith for general music and high school vocal music. They will replace John and Linda Rindo, who have been with the district two years. At his request, Clyde Brehm will take over the elementary and junior high instrumental music program and Ammel will handle the duties presently assigned to Brehm.

The board set a special meeting for June 4 to open building proposals. The date was postponed from May 14 because of delays, caused by rain, in getting soil tests.

He recalled that when he became clerk in 1933, the country was in the throes of the depression. Nearly everyone was short on money and found it difficult to pay taxes; people lived very conservatively. It was a time when jobs were difficult to get, a time when the town clerk was in charge of all relief—now known as welfare. But it was handled differently then, Seefeldt recalled.

A grocery list was made out for the "relief family." The grocer would give the groceries to

the family, and it was charged to the township. He remembered making out grocery lists was "quite a job. One time I was almost thrown out of my own house because I wouldn't give a man what he wanted."

Jobs were hard to come by but some "relievers" didn't go out of their way to look for one. One such person complained that coal ordered for him by the town turned out to be soft coal and that it was necessary to take down his stove pipes daily to clean them out. "Then you'll have something to do till you find a job," was Seefeldt's reply.

There were only a few snowplows in the 1930s, Seefeldt said. In the memorable snow of 1936, some families were snowed in for five weeks. Piled high as the telephone poles, it stayed until spring. Keeping record of vital statistics and delivering library books to students were part of his duties in 1933.

For years, the town board had practically all meetings in taverns, Seefeldt noted, but that policy changed in 1933. Elections also were held in taverns and "the fellow who bought the last drink usually got the vote," he quipped. In 1855, the town clerk's salary was \$15 per year but he didn't have much work because there were something like 12 voters then.

The Town of Kewaskum was organized in 1847, Seefeldt noted, and until 1933 no records could be found of town board meetings. Then, in 1933, referred to by him as "my inheritance," the main record book in a sheepskin cover was found in the attic of a former clerk. Though mice had chewed on the covers, the record was in good condition and revealed assess-

ment records dating back to 1847. Another group of papers was found, rolled up, in a cabinet in a chicken coop. "I spent the winter unrolling them," Seefeldt stated.

Seefeldt and his late wife, the former Margaret Diesner, were parents of three children: the Rev. Fredric Seefeldt, an ordained minister in the Lutheran Church of America but now serving as home secretary for Cong. William A. Steiger; Atty. Aldwin Seefeldt of West Bend; and Miss Mariel Seefeldt, a teacher in Sabish Junior High School, Fond du Lac.

Asked if he misses his clerk's job, Seefeldt said, "I've been too busy to miss it." A man of many hats, he has been and still is a beekeeper; has been in the insurance business and in farming; has an income tax service; is presently on the Washington County Park and Planning Commission; and has served as a school board member and church officer, with possibly a few other jobs mixed in between.

What is he really looking forward to, he was asked. "Working with the bees — I've worked with bees for over 60 years. It's peaceful and quiet out there, with no telephone ringing," Seefeldt said.

He has lived and lives now about one-quarter of a mile from the log house in which he was born.

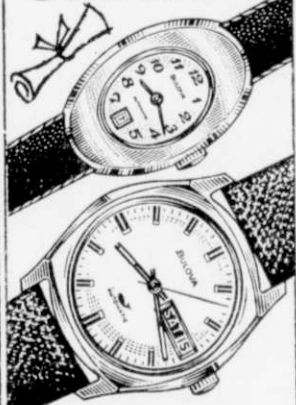

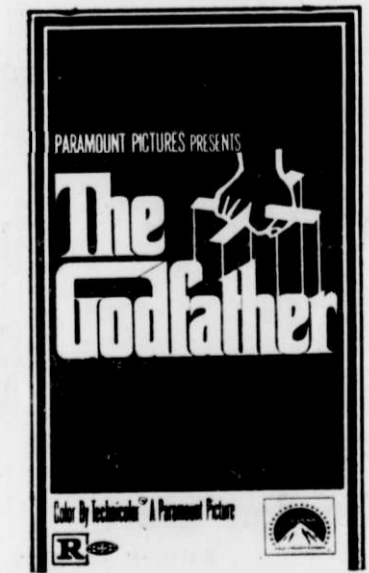
