Registration For Swimming Lessons June 2

The 1973 swimming season at the village park in Kewaskum will officially begin June 18. Registration for lessons is Saturday, June 2, from 9 a. m. to noon at the Municipal Building.

Stressing the safety factors in this year's swim season, parents are reminded that the beach area is not a place to relieve their responsibilities for a morning or afternoon, but it is an area for recreation, safety and constructive fun for themselves as well as their children. However, as a swimming pool, a safer, healthier and much more practical place to swim for relaxation and for learning is not available in our community, maximum cooperation is necessary.

To encourage parental participation in the operation of the swimming program, season passes will be issued to village residents taking lessons, and to non-village residents for a higher price. This minimal fee serves to supplement the cost of equipment, lifeguards, instructors and village facilities.

Parents are urged to make sure their children are conducting themselves properly at all times while in the beach area.

Lesson times and level suggestions will be printed next week.

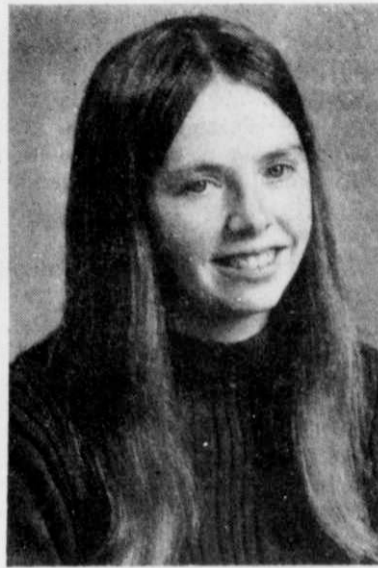

Allenton and Kewaskum Banks Merge

On Wednesday, May 23, the \$2.8 million-deposit Allenton State Bank in Allenton, and the \$15 million-deposit Bank of Kewaskum, Kewaskum, have merged.

The merger was recently approved by regulatory authorities and by their respective banks' board of directors in separate meetings. Effective July 1, 1973, the new bank will be known as "VALLEY BANK" and will provide full-service banking from offices in both Kewaskum and Allenton. The new bank will be affiliated with the \$209 million-asset Valley Bancorporation, a registered bank holding company. "We are pleased to have the opportunity to serve this ex-

cellent community," stated Wayland Tessar, president of the merged bank. Tessar added, "Allenton is in the heart of Washington County's richest farmland and we look forward to serving the people in that area."

"This merger will provide our bank with the capacity to offer expanded service to the people in our area through an increased lending capacity, as well as new trust and other banking services," explained Ray R. Umbs, of Allenton. Recently, Allenton customers learned they would receive free checking, instant interest on regular savings and higher yields on their certificates of deposit.

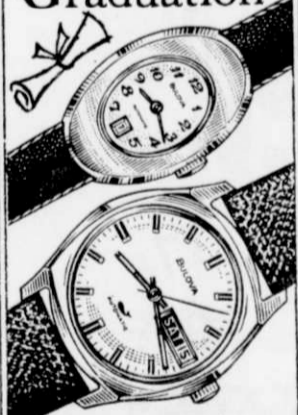
