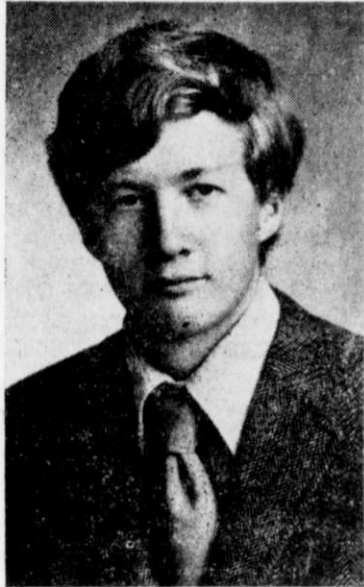

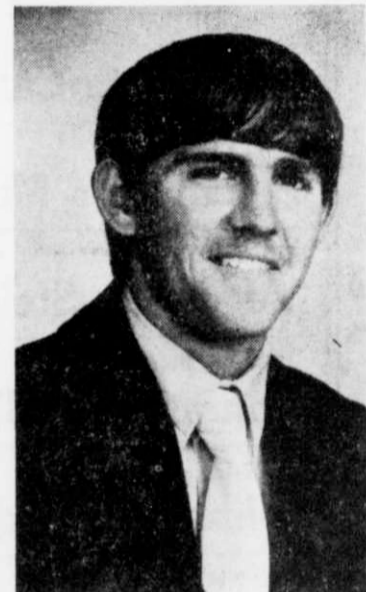
The Kewaskum Education Association awarded two scholarships this year. One was awarded to a student who will be attending a college or university and the other to a student who will be entering a technical school.

Peace United Church of Christ to Observe 75th Anniversary Sunday

Peace United Church of Christ, 343 1st St., Kewaskum, will observe the 75th anniversary of its founding on Sunday, June 3.

An anniversary worship celebration at the church at 10:15 a. m. will have Dr. Ralph Ley, Conference President of the United Church of Christ as speaker. A noon meal will follow in the high school gym along with a program and time for reminiscing.

Former pastors of the congregation planning to attend the festivities include the Rev. Richard M. Gadow, the Rev. William Schwemmer, the Rev. R. G. Beck, the Rev. Clarence Hammen, along with the Rev. Edward Nuss, who served as interim pastor during a part of 1964. The informal afternoon program will include music by a high school chorus under the direction of Mrs. John Rindo, words from former pastors and other recognitions.

Present pastor of Peace Church is the Rev. Daniel V. Schowalter. He assumed his pastorate in June, 1964.

It was on June 2, 1898 that a group of nine men gathered with a neighboring pastor, the Rev. Robert Gruenewald of Fillmore, for the purpose of considering the possibility of organizing an Evangelical church in Kewaskum. After some discussion, it was unanimously decided to do so, church records indicate. Rev. Gruenewald was

asked to conduct services every two weeks until a resident pastor could be secured. Services were held in "The Good Templar Hall" until a church was built.

The nine founders were Carl Doms, Sr., Charles Geidel, Ludwig Guth, Christian Schaefer, Sr., Nicklos Guth, Sr., George Schleif, Sr., William Prost, Henry Bruessel and Albert Backhaus. "The next day they decided upon the location of their future church by gratefully accepting the gift of a lot from Nicklos Guth, Sr.," the church history relates.

At another meeting on June 6, to which other interested persons had been invited, a constitution was adopted in the German language and it was decided to proceed with building a church. It was to be modeled after the Evangelical Church at Fillmore and adopted the name of "Friedens Evangelische Kirche."

There is one living charter member and she is Mrs. August (Caroline) Kirchner. At 97 years of age, she is alert, and resides at The Samaritan Home in West Bend.

Through the help of its members, the building was completed quickly. It was dedicated on Nov. 4, 1898. For approximately \$3,900 it was built and furnished. The Rev. A. Jahnke was its first resident pastor.

In 1901 a home was purchased. (Continued on page 2)

ed for a parsonage from H. J. Ebenreiter for \$2,000 and two years later a lot adjoining the church was bought for \$150. It was on this lot that an educational building that provided church school rooms, minister's office, library, church office, choir room and a lounge with an adjoining kitchen was added in 1960.

During the early 1930's, the church building was remodeled extensively to provide for a Gothic type chancel and a basement addition provided for a new heating system, a kitchen, toilet rooms, storage space and a rear entrance.

A 1967 project included re-decoration of the interior of the church and an enlarged vestibule, plus carpeting of both. In 1970, a new parsonage was built at 1036 Hillside Drive. Each year, since 1936, Peace Church has met in full its minimum benevolent goals as assigned to the denomination.

The congregation became Peace Evangelical and Reformed Church in the late 1930's when it joined the Evangelical and Reformed denomination. It became Peace United Church of Christ as a result of a merger between the Congregational Christian and Evangelical and Reformed Churches in 1957.

Pastors, other than those mentioned, who have served the congregation are Reverends Herman Erber, Fred Mohme, Henry Barth, Ernst Irion, J. C. Frohne, and F. L. Rodenbeck.

An anniversary booklet with pictures of the families of the membership and complete church history is being prepared.

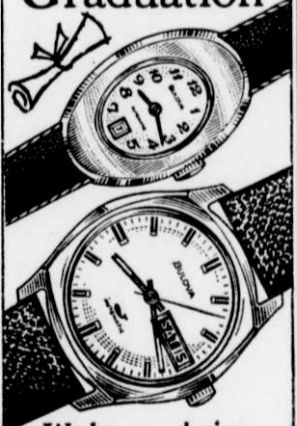

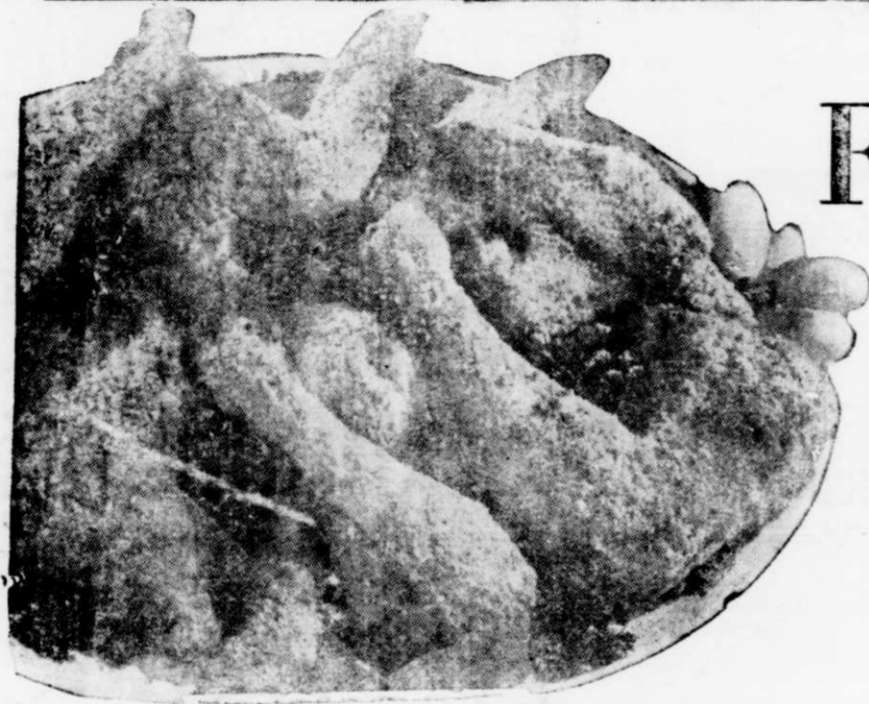

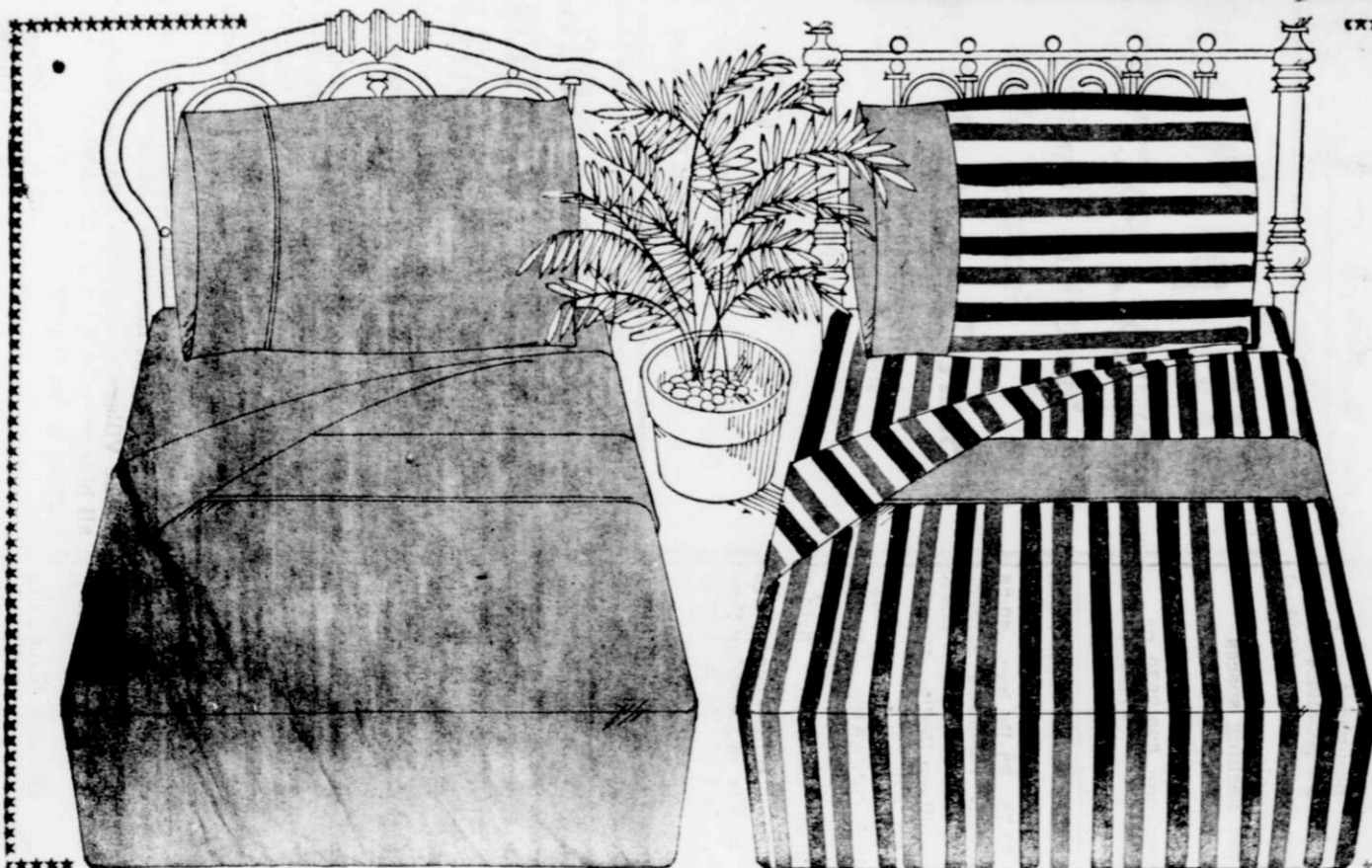

Board Approves Division of Lot For New Home

On recommendation of the Plan Commission for the Village of Kewaskum, members of the Village Board Tuesday night, May 22, approved the division of a 120 by 124 foot lot to clear the way for construction of another home on it.

The property at 334 Prospect St. is owned by Mrs. Adela Klukas who resides in a home located on the west side of the lot. The Plan Commission had earlier turned down a request from Mr. and Mrs. Byron Bunkelman to be able to build on the east half because the Klukas home is so situated that it is only 1.3 feet from the lot division line.

Atty. Gerald Kiefer, legal advisor on the matter for the vil-

lage, contended this would create a non-conforming use of the existing home, due to the 1.3 feet side yard. The lot division was approved on the condition that a seven-foot easement be included in the certified survey map, for the purpose of maintenance. The easement will apply only for the life of the existing home. The village requires a seven-foot side yard.

The Bunkelmans may now proceed to apply for a building permit. Their plans indicate that the rear of their proposed home will be just about in line with the front of the existing home, which is set back considerably on the lot.

At a meeting of the Plan Commission which preceded the Village Board meeting, Orval Behnke, a Plan Commission member recommended that the village board approve the land division because "it is an unusual condition." The plan Commission took the position a variance could be granted under the subdivision and platting ordinance. Kiefer stood by his contention that the board of appeals is the only group that can grant such a variance.

Five of the six members of the Plan Commission were present. All voted "yes" except Wayland Tessar. He declined to vote because he said he is "not sure of the legal rights of what we are doing. If I vote 'no' it will seem I am opposed and I

am not," he said.
Village Board members approved the land division on a vote of 5 to 2. Casting the "no" votes were Gregor Nigh and Alfred Kral.

Although eliminated in the Sectional, the Kewaskum golfers had a banner season. They finished the season with a perfect 11-0 mark, added the Scenic Moraine crown and placed 2nd in the Regional at Sheboygan Riverdale to qualify for the Sectional.

In winning the Scenic title with a sparkling 305 total (compared to a 348 in the Sectional), medalist Jeff Koth of the Indians carded a 69 on rounds of 34 and 35 for his total of 3 under par at Hon-E-Kor. Koth's 69 is a competitive course record, also a Kewaskum school record and a Scenic Moraine record. (The old record of 75 was held by Slinger's Brian Schmidt).

The Indians took home the team trophy and 3 of 4 conference medals. Their team total of 305 is also a conference record.
